Cotton Farmers Vote to Keep Acreage in County

In their regular meeting January 14, the County ASC Committee determined they would not transfer cotton out of the county, either by sale or lease. Justification for this determination was based on the referendums held the last four years. The average vote against transfer in the four year referendum has been a little over 75 percent. Then on Monday night, Jan. 11 at a public hearing at which 130 people were present, cotton

producers present voted 58 against transfer to 33 for. In all probability any farmer who does not wish to plant in 1971 will be able to lease or sell his allotment within the county or, release to the county committee for allocation to other farmers who request more acreage.

For producers who do want to release to the county committee but would like to see their acreage go to a specific individual, they may draw up a transfer agreement with the individual.

The County Committee has re-

quested that all cotton producers who want to release cotton acreage by sale or lease, or want to release to the county committee, and those growers who desire more acreage for 1971 should let it be known at the county office by no later than February 25. The county office will keep on file for public inspection all acres released and requests for additional.

Coryell and McLennan counties have also determined they will not approve transfers out of the county.

Cotton Notices.

Notices of cotton acreage to all producers were placed in the mail Wednesday, Jan. 20. Producers who have questions about their allotment or yield may obtain information at the county office.

Producers who question their allotment or yield and wish to appeal have 15 days from the date of their notice to make written appeal to the county committee.

The cotton program will be different in 1971. To receive payment on cotton, producers must plant cotton in 1971.

Payments will be made on your base acre allotment, which is approximately 67 percent of the 1970 allotment.

There will be no increased payment for small cotton farms. To qualify for a 30 percent increase on small cotton farms, the producer must obtain 51 percent or more of his livelihood from the production of cotton and must live on the farm.

The signup period for 1971 farm programs will be March 1 through April 9. Before this date all producers will receive notice of their allotment, base acres, yields and payment rates. At the present time we do not have all the specifics of the programs.

New Conservation Program.

Announcement of the new Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP) formerly known as Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) will permit resumption of the Federal cost sharing on various beneficial conservation practices with farmers; but under a reconstructed program in line with modern day needs to better both the on and off farm environment that makes farmers partners in the venture between the Federal government and state, city and local governments in dealing with pressing problems of pollution.

Although the specific level of funding of 1971 has not been determined, the program will be funded

and the Congress will be requested by the administration to provide funds for a 1972 program.

Major consideration in authorizing cost sharing of any practice installation will be the resulting public benefits such as pollution abatement, enduring soil and water conservation, recreation, wildlife, and open space as well as the degree of permanency achieved.

In the 1971 program we will have an A2 practice (seeding and sprigging of grasses) and practically all practices we had before.

No signup date has been set for this program due to fact it has only been announced on the National level. No specifics have been given. As soon as full program details have been determined an announcement will be made that every producer will have equal opportunity to make application for funds available.
