\$3,000 is County's Cancer Fund Goal

"We Want to Wipe Out Cancer in Your Lifetime," is the theme adopted by the American Cancer Society's 1971 Crusade Campaign which is now underway in the business and rural areas of Hamilton County.

Residential drives for both Hamilton and Hico will be conducted Tuesday, April 27. The Crusade goal for the county has been established at \$3,000.

This year's Crusade is headed by Mrs. Lamar Johanson. A. M. Abernethy of Hamilton is in charge of the rural community campaigns. Roy Ellenburg of Hico will conduct the local business drive, and Mrs. Dan Bell will be in charge of the house to house campaign.

The American Cancer Society is a voluntary organization of about 2.25 million Americans. The national organization fights cancer through balanced programs of research, education, and service to patients. The April Crusade has become not only a fund-raising event but an opportunity to alert the majority of the public to the seriousness of the cancer threat.

The American Cancer Society is not connected with the United Fund. The financial needs of ASC are determined by physicians, scientists and laymen closely associated with the cancer problem. "American Cancer Society is concerned with conquering cancer," stated Mrs. Johanson, "not just with money-raising projects."

In further discussing the Crusade, Mrs. Johanson pointed out the value of each person's dollar given to cancer. Cancer research entails 38 cents which is conducted in ten major Texas hospitals and medical schools. Physicians are kept informed on latest developments with 15 cents of the dollar. Free films, exhibits, and pamphlets are made available to all Texans through 21 cents of the same dollar.

Service to patients includes 23 cents and provides cancer patients with dressings, loan closet, comfort items, and speech rehabilitation. The remaining few cents are used for campaign, development of programs, and administration.

Annual Aggie Muster Slated At Country Club April 21

Hamilton County former students of Texas A&M University will Muster April 21 to mark the passing of comrades and honor them.

The meeting will be held at Bluebonnet Country Club in Hico at 7:30 Wednesday evening. Muster Chairman Harold Walker, Class of '47, reports that a dinner meal will be served to Aggies, their wives and special guests for \$1.50.

The Aggie Muster began April 21, 1903 and has been held annually ever since—wherever A&M men might find themselves on that day. Aggies have mustered on board ship, in foxholes on the battlefield, in the Swiss Alps, in airplanes, and on Corregidor shortly before the Japanese captured the island in World War II. More than 500 Musters will be held around the world this year, including many in Vietnam and doubtless in prison camps. For some A&M men, this will be their last Muster.

The Hamilton County group will have the opportunity to sign a letter to be sent to Hanoi asking for the release of 16 A&M graduates from Texas who are Prisoners of War and/or missing in action. The Hamilton County group will also honor 18 Texas Aggies who have lost their lives in Vietnam since the last Muster. Other recognition will be given to area residents and former classmates who have died during the past year.

The ceremony is the same in every location. This year's program will be presented by the following Hamilton County Aggies from Hico: Frank Bonner, Lamar Johanson, Jimmie Ramage, Johnny Putty and Harold Walker. Bill McCutcheon is serving as president of the county group and George Krupala is secretary. There are approximately 40 Aggies in the county according to association records.

Danny Jenkins, UT pharmacy student, spent a week of spring break in Acapulco, Mexico with 101 other students from UT, all of whom flew Braniff from Austin. While there he went deep sea fishing, parachute sailing behind a ski boat, as well as water skiing, yachting, scuba diving, and touring Acapulco and the general area. 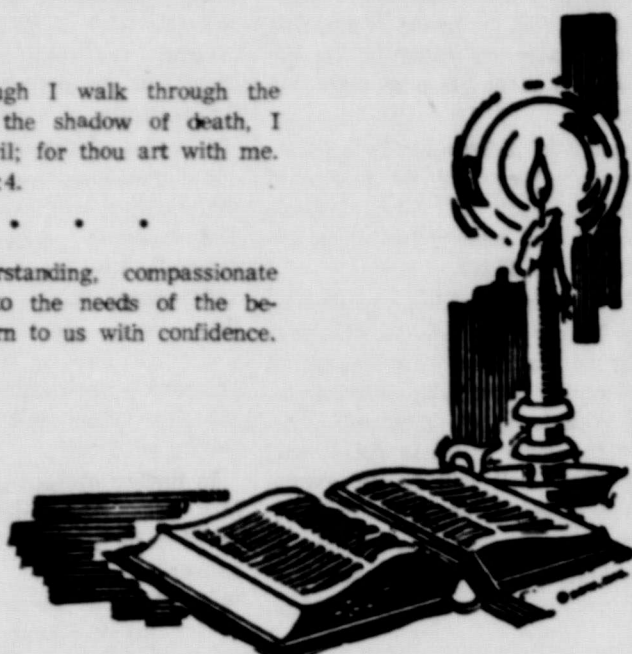

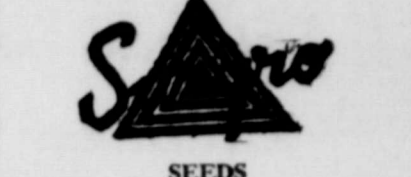

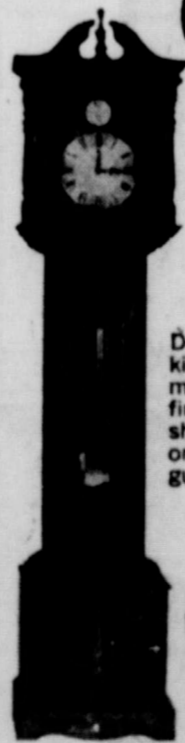
