## Third Verse Same as the First (and 2nd) As Hico Cops State Judging Title

Third time is charm, then first and second must also be, as Hico FFA Chapter's Range & Pasture judging team won the state title for the third time in as many years at contests held at Tarleton State

College last Friday. The team had finished fourth in earlier Area competition.

Members of the team and their advisor, Harold Walker, left Tuesday morning for Oklahoma City where they will compete with other teams from over the U.S. in the 20th International Land, Range and Pasture School and Contest. They are expected to return Friday.

In the state contest, Hico scored 815 points to win the title over 30 other teams. Runnerup was Harper with 812, Stanton was third

with 797, Rising Star fourth with 766, and Grandview fifth with 763. All five teams qualified for the nationals.

Glenn Hyles, sophomore member of the Hico team, compiled a score of 293 points to win individual honors in the State contest. His total was only 25 points from a perfect score. Other members of the team include another sophomore, Roy Dale Edwards, and two freshmen, Wayne Hyles and Jim Turner.

For his individual efforts, Hyles was awarded an engraved silver belt buckle, and a semester scholarship to Tarleton State College.

Assisting Mr. Walker with team coaching was Carl Guthrie, TSC student who is doing his practice teaching under Mr. Walker's leadership.

Hico's first State Championship team was in 1969, when Lee Ramage, Rickie Jaggars, Billy Stearman and Randy Christian teamed to win first place. Ramage was also high individual in that contest.

In 1970, a Hico team composed of Jon Bonner, Chuck Bowden, Benny Bailey and Brian Jones won the state title. Bailey was high individual in the state that year.

The 1969 team finished ninth in the nationals, and the 1970 group placed 12th.

Parents of the 1971 team members are Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Hyles, Mr. and Mrs. Leo Edwards, and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Turner.

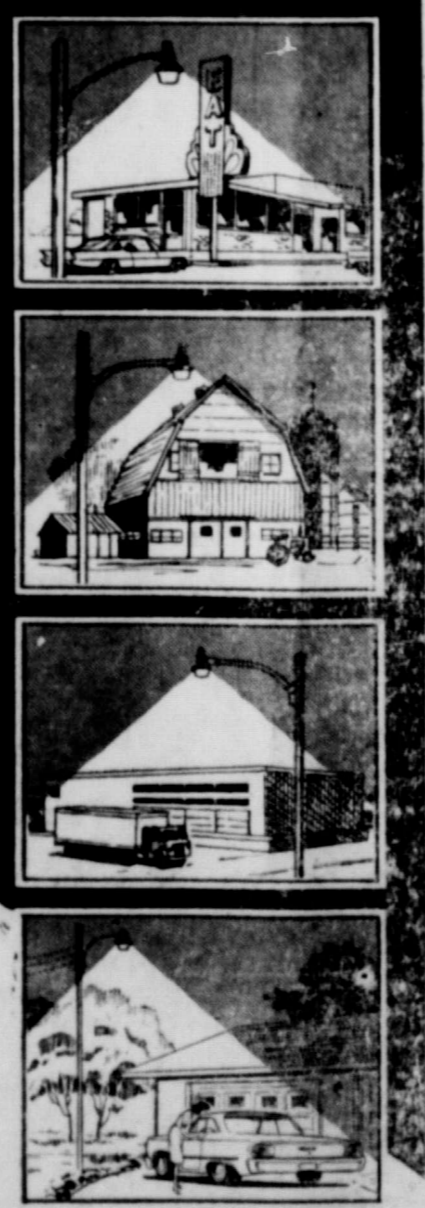

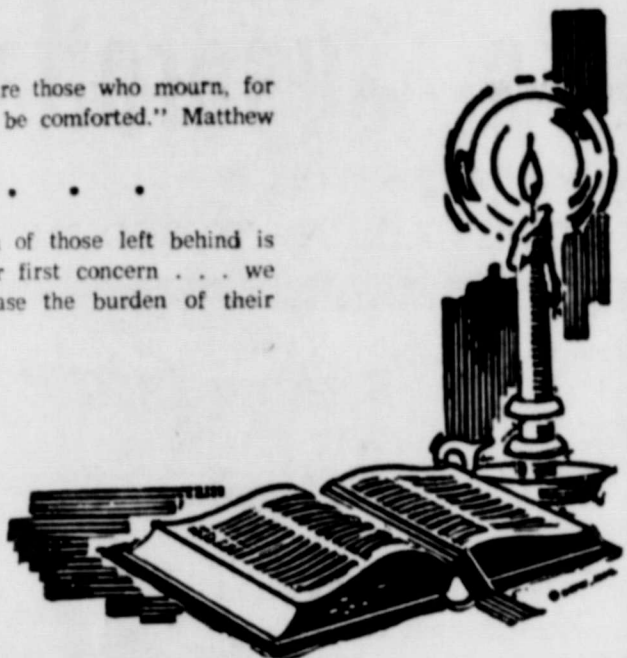

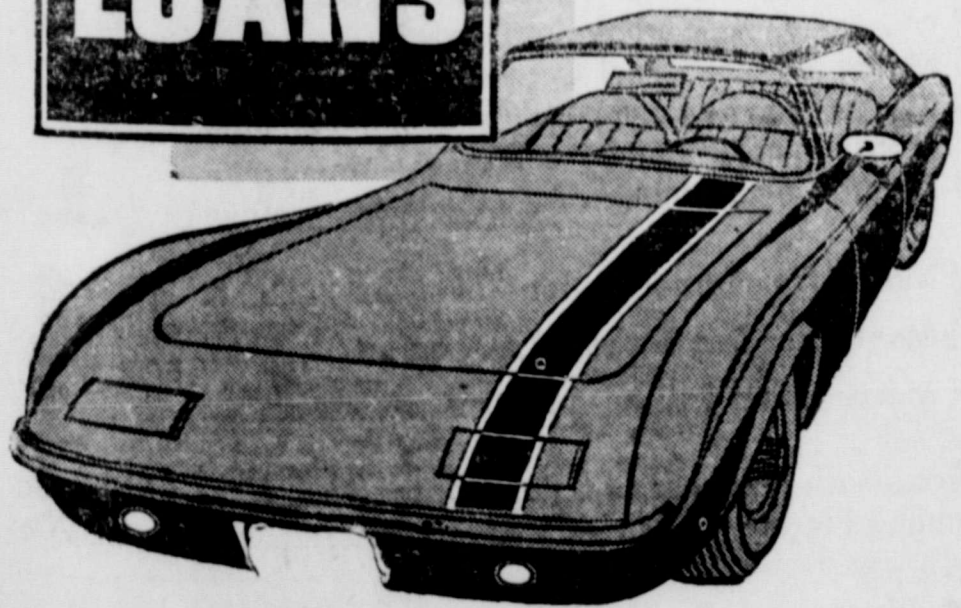

## HICO WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD HOSTS CLEBURNE DISTRICT MEETING LAST SUNDAY

Wesleyan Service Guilds from Cleburne, Clifton, Glen Rose, Weatherford, Burleson, Fort Worth and Hico were represented Sunday afternoon at the Cleburne District W. S. G. meeting held in Hico United First Methodist Church.

Special music was presented by Mrs. Norman Johnson, organist.

Mrs. Ruby Gann of Glen Rose, District Chairman, presided at the business session. Mrs. Etta Holt Brown of Fort Worth made announcements of forthcoming events and programs.

Guest speaker for the meeting was Mrs. Edwin T. Tolon Sr. who presented first-hand information about the Cuban situation, and on Communism in Cuba. Mrs. Tolon, whose husband is a lawyer, has been in the United States for three and a half years. She and her husband are residents of Hico, and their son is a surgeon in the Hico City Hospital.

The speaker stated that all news

media was taken over in 1959 by the Castro regime, and today only one newspaper and one magazine are published in Cuba.

She said that before the Castro take-over, Cuba had 11 universities but presently only three are in operation, with many professors and teachers going into exile in the United States and other countries.

She pointed out that the revolution was the result of only a few Cubans. Many of the people followed Castro as they thought he was for the people and was fighting a social war; only when he overthrew the former government he then declared he was a communist. She stated that Cuba is not a communist country, it is an imposed form of government on the people.

Cuba was once a very rich and very prosperous country due to the close association with the United States, but since the communist take-over it is reduced to such a state that citizens are now rationed to only three ounces of meat per week per person and a small amount of rice and white beans. She stated that many people there are now wondering if the Castro regime is so good, then why do so many people want to leave the country.

She cited the example of the almost 1,000 young Americans who went to Cuba last year to assist with the sugarcane harvest, many had been involved in infamous acts of violence in the U.S., such as bombings, student uprisings, and terrorism across the nation. These young people have been taught, and taught well, the art of espionage.

The speaker pointed out that conditions are now worse than in 1962 during the Cuban Crisis. She stated that Cuba is presently a Russian base, as Russian ships and submarines now come and go to get all supplies they need in Cuban ports. Fish that was once caught off the Cuban coasts and freely distributed to the people is now shipped from the country in Russian ships, canned and sent to feed other communist countries.

"Never think it cannot happen here," Mrs. Tolon concluded. "The United States must be aware of the danger and be alert. Cubans did not think it could happen to their country at one time."

Following the program, members of the Hico Guild served refreshments in the Fellowship Hall.
