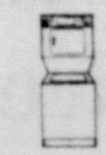

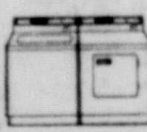

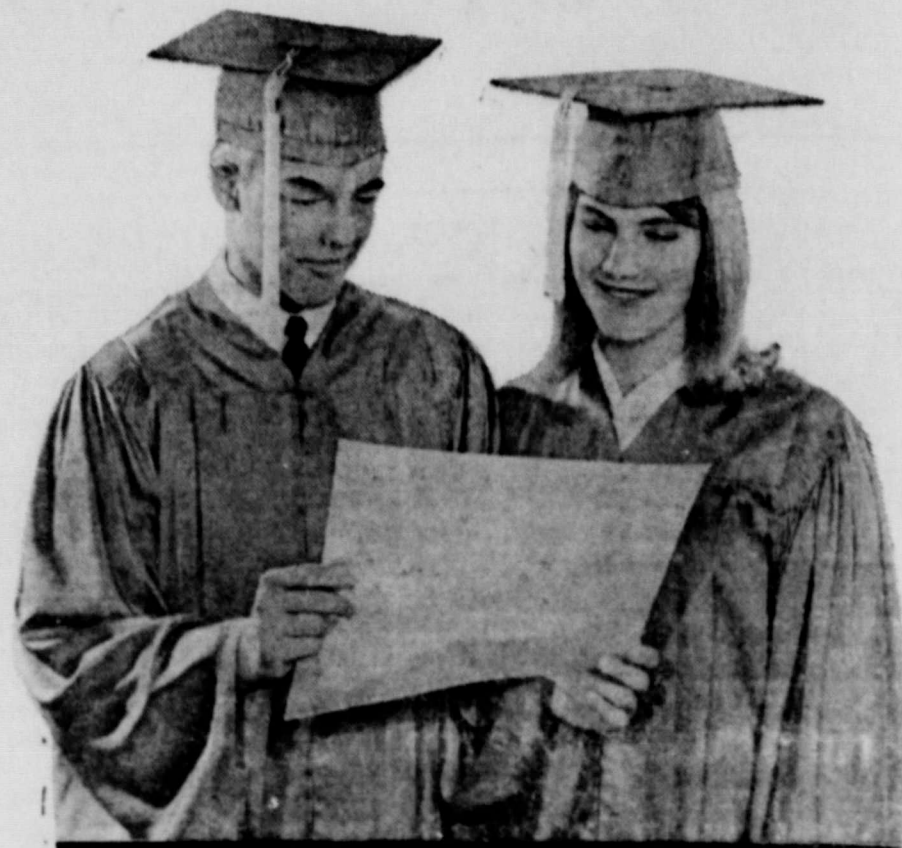

Former Hico Nurse Helps Tarleton Students Get Well

(From the Tarleton J-TAC)

The well-trodden path leads from the corner of the Student Center through the huge shade trees to the student's best friend, the Student Health Center. The sturdy red brick building, built in 1959 at a cost of \$204,000, is a welcoming sight for many ailing Tarleton State College students.

Once inside, the clean white walls, neat waiting room and the cheering appearance of Mrs. Ruth Self, LVN, helps the sick on their way to recovery.

Open for service 24 hours a day, with only emergency cases accepted after 9 p.m., the center is staffed with five licensed vocational

nurses and one aide. Dr. Leon Alptaras is also on call 5 days a week at 1 p.m. for one hour.

The clinic is operated like a hospital with its own charts and chart system. There are 36 rooms with 44 beds presently up in the center, but there is enough equipment for three beds to each room if ever needed.

The clinic, which is run mostly on student service fees, is prepared to handle not only medical, but emergency, post-operative cases, out-patient visits, care of acute illnesses, care for accidents and infirmary care in cases requiring hospitalization.

Most medical attention is free

to the students. However, off-campus students must pay \$1.50 per night and a slight charge for meals if they are admitted to the clinic.

Visiting hours for admitted patients are 2:00-4:00 p.m. and 6:30-7:30 p.m. daily.

Mrs. Self reported that in Sept. 1968, 358 students had come to the center for help. The number of students in September of 1969 had jumped to 1,067. An estimated 1,739 students were attended in February 1970, and 1,494 just last month.

The Student Health Center is open to provide students with medical attention when needed. This facility, often overlooked, is dedicated to seeing that the TSC students stay healthy.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Hamilton County is approved emergency feed and virtually of the feed dealers are cooperating in this endeavor.

Applications for emergency started on a Monday morning with about 15 applicants by noon. The program isn't perfect of course and there are a few objectionable points, but it is designed to relieve the drought hardships.

I would urge you to check in the ASCS office if you are in need of assistance.

Grain sorghum, oats, corn, rye and hay are all eligible for purchase assistance under the program.

Producers should watch for grain sorghum plants for the possible buildup of greenbugs. Several counties east of Hamilton are presently having greenbug problems. No greenbug infestations have been noted to date but many have been concerned over corn leaf buildups.

The greenbug and the corn aphid are often confused when detected in grain sorghum fields. Corn leaf aphid is generally considered to be non-economic in importance while the greenbug seriously damage grain sorghum.

I have had a report of chinch bugs in lawns. It is unusual to have chinch bugs this early in year but then this year has been everything but usual.

I would advise homeowners to check St. Augustine lawns frequently and treat immediately if chinch bugs are located.

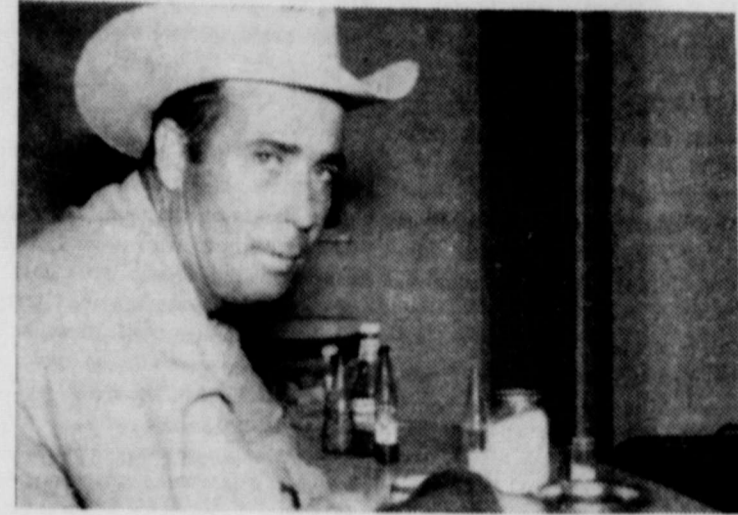

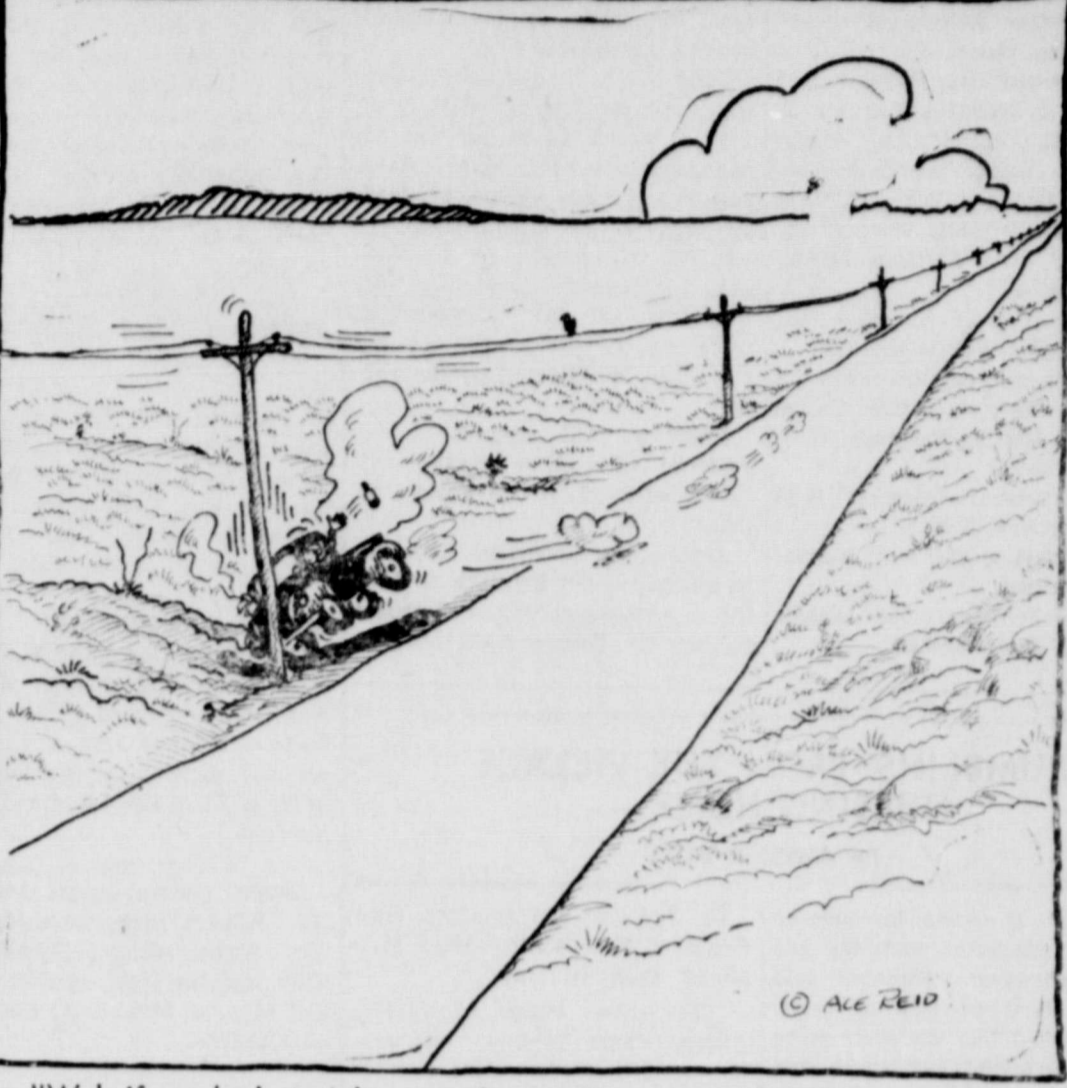
