**On the Home Range**

A thorough understanding of the structure and characteristics of meat can help one choose better methods of cooking. A cut of meat as it comes from the market includes muscle tissue, connective tissue, bone and fat.

The more connective tissue holding together the muscles, the less tender the meat. The older the animal and the more exercise the muscle has received, the less tender the cut of meat.

From a nutritional standpoint, meat is a highly digestible food which supplies abundant amounts of protein, fats, minerals and vitamins. One of the basic ways of cooking, dry heat, is best suited to the tender cuts such as ribs, roasts and loin steaks. Methods of dry heat cooking include roasting without a cover, frying and broiling.

The use of moist heat in pot roasting, stewing and braising can improve the less tender cuts such as round and chuck roasts and stew meat.

Wrought iron, used for some of the first outdoor furniture, is now mass-produced for use both inside and outside the home. Wrought iron furniture, also called "all-weather" furniture, is often made with expanded metal mesh table tops, chair seats and backs, finished to match the frames. The mesh permits ventilation and enhances the comfort of seating and

lounging pieces. Snap-on foam-filled cushions in a variety of patterns are also usually available for seating pieces.

When shopping for wrought iron furniture, check for smooth welds at joints and at points where decorations are fastened. Good quality wrought iron carries a guarantee against rust; a touch-up repair should also accompany the furniture.

The all-weather furniture comes in a variety of baked-on enamel finishes, ranging from pale colors to darker tones, such as brown and black.

Wrought iron furniture demands periodical care to preserve original appearance. It should be washed frequently or washed with warm water and a mild detergent then rinsed. In salt-air areas frames should be washed, rinsed and dried at least once a month to prevent corrosion.

For touch-up work, rub scratches or rust spots with steel wool and apply a metal primer coat. Touch-up paint on chipped or scuffed spots to seal breaks from moisture. An annual coat of automobile wax helps preserve the color of the finish.

Washington, D.C.—For the last several years a dense fog has hung over the Panama Canal—figuratively, that is.

Six years and \$21 million after it was created, the Atlantic-Pacific Inter-oceanic Canal Study Commission has submitted a report of more than 1,000 pages to President Nixon. From what has been seen and read of the report, it is more impressive from size than contents.

The Commission did recommend to the White House a site for a new sea-level canal across Central America, about 10 miles West of the existing lock canal, at a cost of \$2,800,000,000. Other than this recommendation the report seems to raise more problems than it solves.

The two great artificial waterways of the world, the Suez and Panama Canals, are in sharp focus now to all the world. The Suez Canal has long been closed by Egypt while the Panama Canal has never been closed by the United States except for repairs to locks.

Strangely enough, the nation most desirous of opening the Suez Canal is the Soviet Union, an ally of Egypt. Once the Suez is open, the winter-land-locked Soviets will have control of a warm water route from the Black Sea through the Suez and the Red Sea to the Indian Ocean. Soviet shipping is awaiting at Port Sudan and Aden and, as is well known, is greatly increasing their ship traffic in the Indian Ocean.

In time of war the enormous Russian fleet will be free to roam in about all the oceans and seas of the world.

This is mentioned to point out the strategic importance of the United States in maintaining control over the Panama Canal. It is a reason why the Communists have for years attempted to subvert United States sovereignty over the Canal and continue to do so.

It is disturbing, therefore, that the Presidential Commission, appointed in 1964, has now delivered to the President recommendations which would require the United States to give up its sovereignty in the Canal Zone and build a new

sea-level canal under international control. The report, if approved and implemented, would require the negotiation of new treaties, give Panama participation in the Canal operation, income and policies affecting the security of our nation.

The example of the Suez Canal should remind us that the British and French gave up sovereignty and ownership, treaty rights they maintained were of little value. The Soviets immediately moved into the vacuum left by the British and French and now they are in a position to gain what they have been seeking for 50 years.

It should be obvious that a defense treaty with Panama would be of little or no value if we did not maintain the right of sovereignty in the defense of the Canal. There would be little point in sharing the responsibility of defending it, if Panama should be given ultimate authority in decisions. The Panamanian Government is subject to instability, as has been seen a number of times in recent years.

Our strategic preparedness depends heavily on maintaining our treaty rights over the Panama Canal which we built and operate. Studies show that 70 percent of all shipping that goes through the Panama Canal is bound for or coming from U.S. ports. In World War II, the Korean War, the Cuban Crisis of 1962 and now the Vietnam War, the Canal has played a vital role in naval deployment.

It is true that the present canal will not accommodate some larger vessels including our larger warships. There is need for modernization of the present lock canal. Such a decision would require no new treaty and our sovereignty over the waterway linking two oceans would not be jeopardized. In time of emergency we should have control over security measures necessary for the Canal's safety. The Canal can be modernized at a fraction of the costs involved in building a new canal recommended by the Presidential Commission.

The Panama Canal is too important to us to surrender it into other hands.

**Social Security**

**Questions & Answers**

By CHARLES E. BASS

Question: I am a widow and soon will be 61 years old. Can I claim Social Security benefits?

Answer: Yes you can. A widow claiming benefits on her husband's account need be only age 60 or older. (Age 50 if completely disabled). A woman worker claiming benefits on her own work record must be at least 62 unless disabled. The same is true of a wife except that there is no disability benefit for a wife entitled only on her living husband's record.

Question: How old do you have to be to get Medicare?

Answer: Age 65. There is no exception to this in the present law. Congress has often considered lowering this age limit and to extend Medicare to those who are disabled, but no change has been made in the age limit.

Question: I am 47 years old and my doctor says I can't work any more on account of heart trouble. Can I get Social Security?

Answer: Yes. You should file a claim for disability benefits right away. Your benefits (monthly checks for you and your qualified dependents) can begin after you have been disabled for a month or longer.
