## Congressional Redistricting Affects Hamilton County

AUSTIN (AP)—Texas legislators have drawn new congressional district lines that are supposed to last until 1981.

But lawmakers who opposed the plan written by a 10-man House committee say the courts may void the lines. That would force the legislature to try again, because lines must be firm before the 1972 elections.

In the latest redistricting Hamilton County has been shuffled out of Congressman Omar Burleson's 17th District to Rep. Bob Poage's 11th District.

New districts had to be carved to reflect the population shifts to big cities shown by the 1970

census. The census showed Texas had gained enough people to get one more congressman.

The plan approved last Friday, the last day of a four-day special legislative session, reflects two novel ideas of the legislature's rural-dominated leadership:

—Since rural areas probably will lose people during the coming decade, they were given more than the 466,530 ideal population, which would satisfy the one-man, one-vote rule.

—Districts should not be built from urban population clusters outward to rural areas, but should be written to preserve as many rural incumbents as possible. This meant that large numbers of people from

Dallas, Tarrant, Bexar and Harris counties were given to rural congressmen who needed extra population to meet the one-man, one-vote rule.

Rep. Poage's district will be composed of the following counties: Bell, Bosque, Burnet, Coryell, Falls, Hamilton, Hood, Lampasas, McLennan, Milam, Mills, Parker, Somervell and Williamson.

Counties in Cong. Burleson's district are Borden, Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Cooke, Crosby, Eastland, Erath, Fisher, Floyd, Garza, Haskell, Howard, Jack, Jones, Kent, McCullough, Mitchell, Montague, Nolan, Palo Pinto, San Saba, Scurry, Wise and Young.

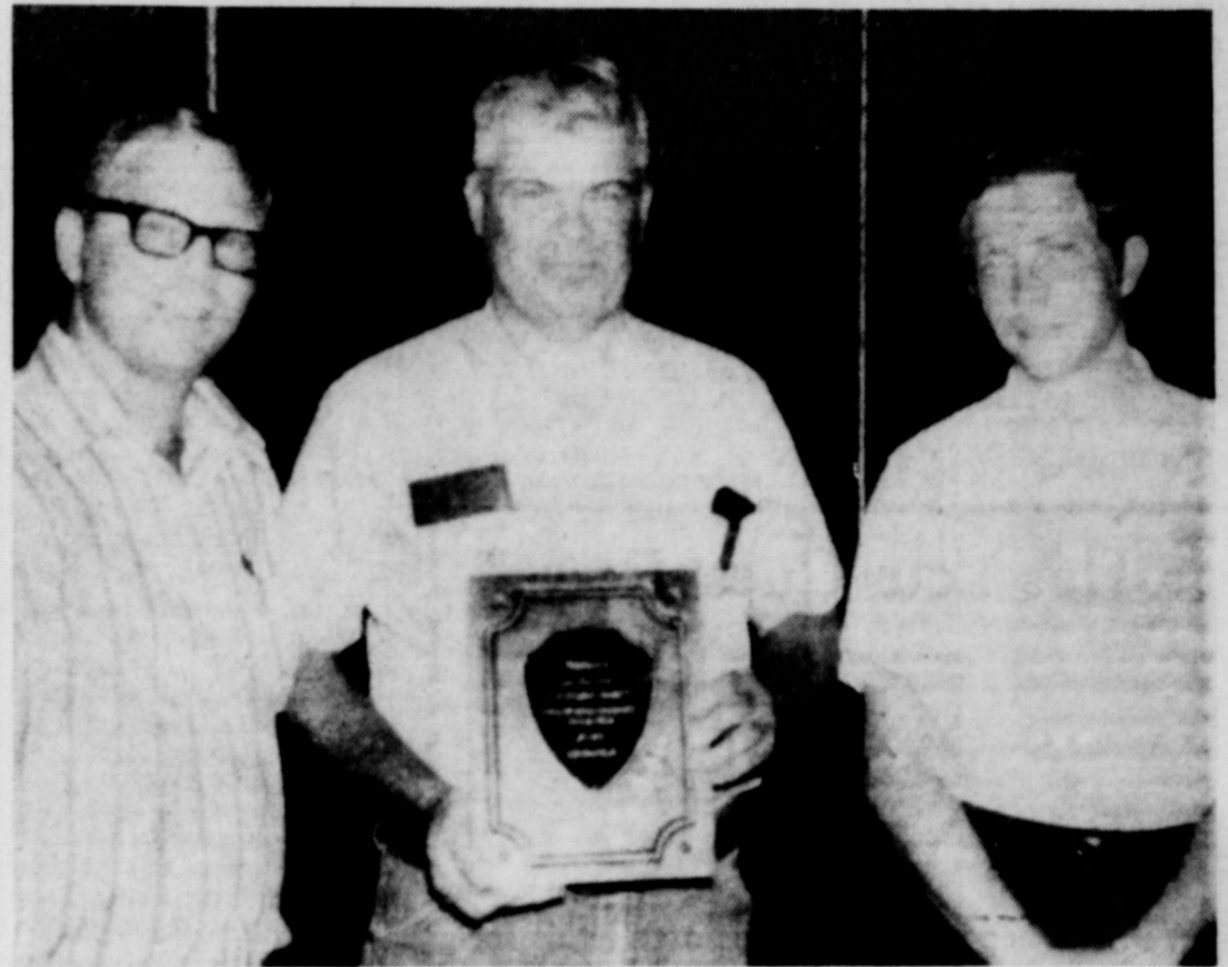

## Cong. Burleson Issues Statement on Lose of Hamilton County

Washington, D.C.—Congressman Burleson this week commented on the Congressional Re-districting just completed by the Texas Legislature. "By legal necessity," he said, "the State Legislature has gone through the most difficult job of re-apportioning Congressional Districts on the basis of population. The outcome of these adjustments on the basis of population is never calculated to please anyone and, as a matter of fact, they seldom please anyone completely. The Legislature does the best job it can, and it is no easy task."

Burleson's statement he laments the fact that Hamilton County was removed from his Congressional District.

In continuing statement: "It

has been my contention that factors other than population should enter into the consideration of drawing lines of Congressional Districts. The Courts, however, have held that population controls. It is my feeling that the interest of good government is not served unless a community of interest is maintained in a representative District. I also feel that the people's Representative in Congress should know those whom he represents and they should know him. To lose constituents with whom I have worked for a great many years is like losing something real personal and tangible. I put representation in the Congress of my constituents on a very personal basis. I like to know not only the interests of the broad community but the problems, the opinions and the attitudes of the individual."

"I regret exceedingly that I will not have the privilege of representing the people of Hamilton County after the 92nd Congress, but I shall maintain a personal interest in the communities and hope to keep contacts with the valued friendships established over this period of time."

**On the Home Range**

By BERNADETTE KOLAR  
Home Demonstration Agent

There are five points to success in freezing foods.

1. Good quality. Careful selection of foods to be frozen is important. The food coming out of the locker drawer or the home freezer is not better than it was before it was frozen and stored.

2. Careful preparation. Speed in preparation is necessary. Promptness in handling, chilling and freezing any product helps retain quality. Follow the instructions carefully in the preparation of any food for freezing.

3. Proper packaging. The purpose of packaging or wrapping food is to keep it from drying out and to preserve food value, flavor, color and pleasing texture. Packaging materials should be moisture-vapor-proof to prevent evaporation and to retain the highest quality in frozen foods.

4. Loading the freezer. Freeze fruits and vegetables soon after they are packed. Put them in the freezer a few packages at a time as they become ready, or keep packages in the refrigerator until all are ready. Then transfer them to the home freezer, or carry them in an insulated box or bag to the locker plant. Freeze at 0 degrees or below.

5. Length of storage. Frozen food undergoes slow changes in storage and will not retain its quality indefinitely. The length of time that frozen products may keep without loss of quality depends on proper handling before freezing.

Suggested lengths of storage for different foods are: Fruits and vegetables, 1 year or less; fresh pork and fish, 3 to 6 months; poultry, 4 months; Sausage and ground meats, 1 to 3 months; lamb and veal, 6 to 9 months; beef, 6 to 12 months; and cooked foods, storage varies greatly for different products.

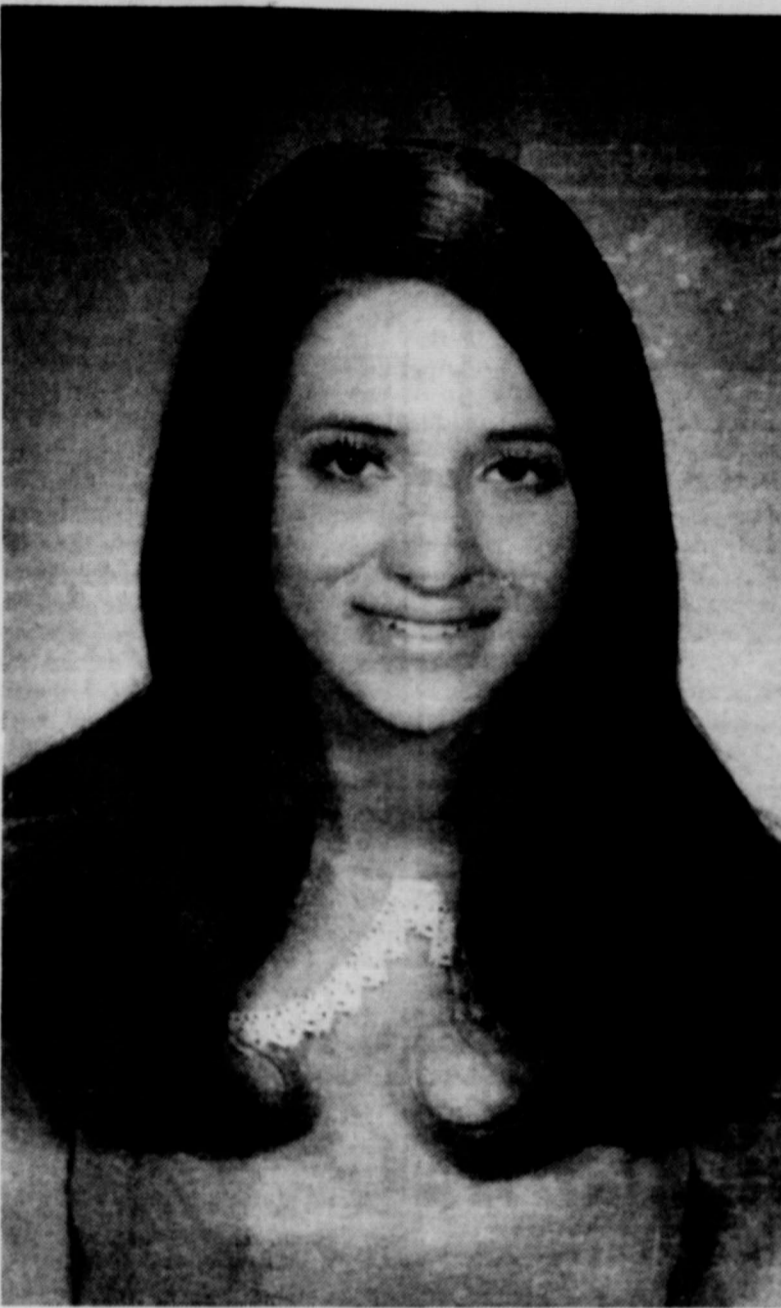

In effect by introducing new swine to your premises you would automatically quarantine your herd to your farm for 30 days except for slaughter purposes. Slaughter swine could be moved by obtaining a permit as before.

## Social Security Questions & Answers

Question: I collect monthly social security benefits as a widow. I have my own social security number, but I have never worked outside the home. Will my family be able to get a payment from social security to help pay my burial expenses when I die?

Answer: No. Your family would not receive a lump-sum death pay-

ment if you have never worked under social security.

Question: My husband and I are both retired and getting social security benefits on our own records. We just started working part time and will earn \$1,000 this year. Is it true that we will lose some social security benefits because our combined earnings are almost \$2,000?

Answer: No, it isn't. Your husband can each earn \$1,680 in a calendar year without losing any social security benefits. Question: I am 66 and still working full time as a teacher. How since I do not teach during summer months of July and August can I apply for monthly social security benefits for these months?

Answer: Yes. Benefits are paid for any month in which you do not earn over \$140.

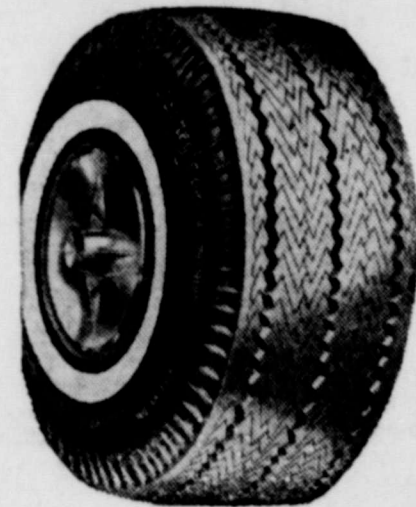
The Texas Animal Health Commission recently announced a quarantine order that re-imposes restrictions on swine movements in Texas placed in effect March 29, to control hog cholera.

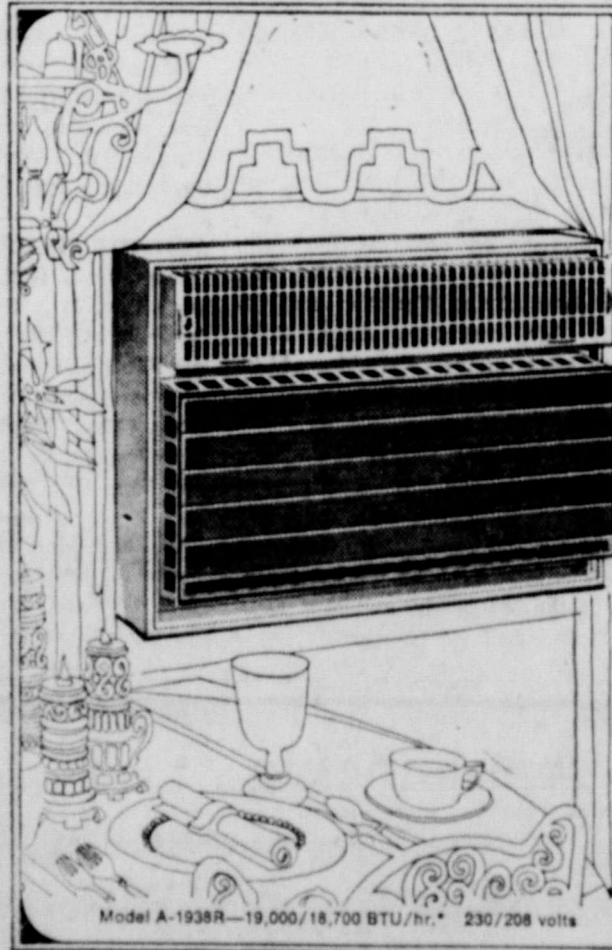

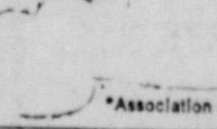
