The payment is among \$35.4 million distributed to more than 500 Texas cities and towns which have elected to levy the one percent city sales tax.

Largest payment went to Houston at \$7.2 million; Dallas at \$5.3 million; San Antonio at \$2.4 million; and Fort Worth at \$1.8 million.

# Sonny Christian **Beats Drouth by Irrigating Crops**

Many farmers in the Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District would like to irrigate their crops. Fortunately, Sonny


Christian, who owns and operates a dairy farm about one mile west of Hico, can do this. He has the water and a 120-head rolling sprinkler irrigation system. Approximately 130 acres of hybrid sudan grass is being irrigated now. He bales part of the sudan for hay and

His dairy herd consists of 100 milk cows. The cows are grazed on a few acres daily and are confined to the area by use of electric fences. This permits controlled and uniform grazing. To get top production, he fertilizes with approximately 30-20-10 per acre following each grazing or baling. With this method of grazing and cutting for hay, he can produce another crop

on the same land in 4 to 6 weeks. Christian has about 50 large native pecan trees on his cropland. This area will be planted to coastal bermudagrass within the next two to three years. He has 14 acres of coastal in production now and plans to have about 60 acres when his grazing plans are completed.

Small grain will follow sudan on part of the land this fall. This crop will be fertilized with 100-40-20 per acre in three applications. The grazing will be managed about the same as with the sudan.

His dairy operation, irrigation, hay baling, and other jobs on the farm keep the Christian family busy all the time. Mrs. Christian is nurse and works away from home. Aside from their work, they have time to participate in community activities, church, and rec-

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# AGENT

The prolonged drouth conditions call for gardeners to use special care in cultural practices that can conserve moisture and reduce the amount of irrigation water needed for lawns and woody ornamentals in the landscape.

Thorough waterings and judicious applications of fertilizer, insecticides are two steps that can help gardners through the hot dry wea-

When applying irrigation water, do a thorough job, soaking the soil to a depth of six to 10 inches. If the soil surface is sloping or is compacted, water must be applied at a slower rate to prevent runoff.

Deep watering of landscape plants tends to encourage deep root peneetration that ultimately provides a greater moisture supply for the plant. Frequent, light waterings encourages shallow root systems and once this happens, it is difficult to bring plants through extended drouth periods without considerable

Fertilizers, insecticides, or fungirides should never be applied unless there is moisture in the soil bedause severe foilage burn can when the soil is dry. Any fertilizer applications should be followed

Mulching should also be considered as a means of cutting down In caring for the lawn, raising one-fourth to one-half of an inch during the hot weather will increase the length of the leaf blade, providing shade and reducing the water needed by the grass plant.

#### Hico Youth Hold Bible School in Cotulla Last Week

The youth of Hico First Baptist Church returned Saturday about 6:45 from a glorious experience in Cotulla, where they held a Mission Bible School.

Eight girls, the minister of music, and the pastor from Hico, along with a group of 19 others from Midlothian, held this Mission School the week of June 26-July 3 for the Latin American children in Cotulla.

The youth were in charge of the classes and planned every activity for these children. The school started at 1:30 and lasted until 4:30 each afternoon. The age groups were from pre-school through youth.

Activities were somewhat in this order: The children were picked up at 1 p.m. and brought to Cotulla First Baptist Church. They were led into the church, starting right into the joint worship service led by Lynn Christie, Rev. Bill Nichols, pastor at Midlothian, and Rev. Eddie Malphrus. The children learned the pledges to the American and Christian flags, and to the Bible during this time. Following this, they divided into their different classes, lasting until 4:30. This was pretty much the schedule Monday through Thursday.

On Friday, instead of the joint service, grades 3 and up were given a decision time. Out of an enrollerage attendance of over 180, twenty-four decisions were made for Christ. To some 25 may not seem like very many, but to the youth that taught these 24 this was something to praise God for.

Also in the evenings the group held a revival led by Rev. Nichols. The youth from Midlothian, Hico and Cotulla formed a choir and planned the special music for the services, directed by Christie. For the youth who held the Mission School this revival week made the greatest change they've ever experienced in their lives for Christ.

This is the motto developed by the youth from Midlothian and Hico: "It's great to be a Christian, but even greater to share Jesus and his love and power with others."

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

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
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

(Continued From Page 1) milk stool, then find a cow, and sit down and go to work. Pull and squeeze. Cow hair and dirt may, or may not, fall into the pail. But the milk will be strained a few hours later, and little specks of dirt will dissolve anyway.

"In summer, flies are everywhere. There isn't any breeze. The barn is steaming hot-you are sweating and tired before start. The cow is switching her tail at the flies and hits you in the face and it stings and smells. When you finish one cow you move on to the next one. Forty-five minutes to an hour will milk four or

"Yesterday when I visited modern dairy and saw the milk go from the milking machines to a tank and cooled to less than 40 dethought, now that's progress."

I've milked a few cows myself and even though I didn't milk in the dark. I've milked in the heat with the cow's tail switching me in the face. If you happened to squeeze a little hard, the cow would sometime kick, hitting the bucket and the milk would spill. I'm glad those good ole days are over.
