'Protectors of America's Promise' is Reunion Theme

"Protectors of America's Promise" is theme for the 85th Annual Hico Reunion Parade, scheduled to open the homecoming celebration Wednesday afternoon, July 28, at 7 p.m.

Miss Louise Blair, general parade chairman, said this week that the 1971 parade and reunion would honor retired military personnel who served 20 or more years in a branch of the Armed Forces.

A tentative list of those veterans residing here numbers ten, composed of two men who served in the Navy, two in the Air Force, and six who were career Army men.

"Protectors of America's Promise" was adopted as theme for this year's celebration in keeping with that adopted a year ago when a local youth, Miss Barbara Bailey, was honored for her role in promoting Americanism and patriotism.

Miss Blair, who has served as parade chairman for several years, said that an invitation had been sent to the Fort Hood Band to again appear and take part in the parade, and was expecting acknowledgment of their acceptance. She also named committee heads to handle various parts of the parade. Mrs. Fred Rainwater will be in charge of reviewing stand

decorations; Mrs. Marilyn Johanson will have charge of reviewing stand activities; Jack Malone has agreed to construct the stand; and J. Louis Evans of Stephenville, a retired Army veteran, will be emcee.

Miss Blair said that invitations would be sent to several state and national dignitaries to participate in the program, and she expected acceptance from several of them. On the invitee list are U.S. Senators John Tower and Lloyd Benson, Cong. Omar Burleson, Cong. Bob Poage, State Senator J. P. Word and House Rep. J. E. Ward.

Sales Tax Net Is \$2,869 For First Quarter

The City of Hico received \$2,869.00 in sales tax payments for the first quarter of 1971, the State Comptroller reported last week. The city received \$2,768.22 for the same period last year, and the latest check represents a \$100.78 gain. Hico's payment for the first quarter was down about \$658.86, however, from that of the last quarter of 1970.

The payment is among \$35.4 million distributed to more than 500 Texas cities and towns which have elected to levy the one percent city sales tax.

Largest payment went to Houston at \$7.2 million; Dallas at \$5.3 million; San Antonio at \$2.4 million; and Fort Worth at \$1.8 million.

This membership should be in the county of participation. The contestant must be single and between the age of 16 and 22. The contestant must be 16 by Sept. 1, 1971, and not over 22 Sept. 1, 1971.

Queen Contest Chairman is Mrs. Lamar Johanson of Hico. "Any young lady that enters the County Farm Bureau Queen Contest shows evidence of the fact that she has taken a big step by showing her interest in not only her family organization, but also an experience that makes her a better individual," stated Mrs. Johanson.

Information for the contest may be obtained from the Farm Bureau Office in Hamilton or Mrs. Johanson. Contest entry deadline is Tuesday, July 20, 1971.

Sonny Christian Beats Drouth by Irrigating Crops

Many farmers in the Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District would like to irrigate their crops. Fortunately, Sonny

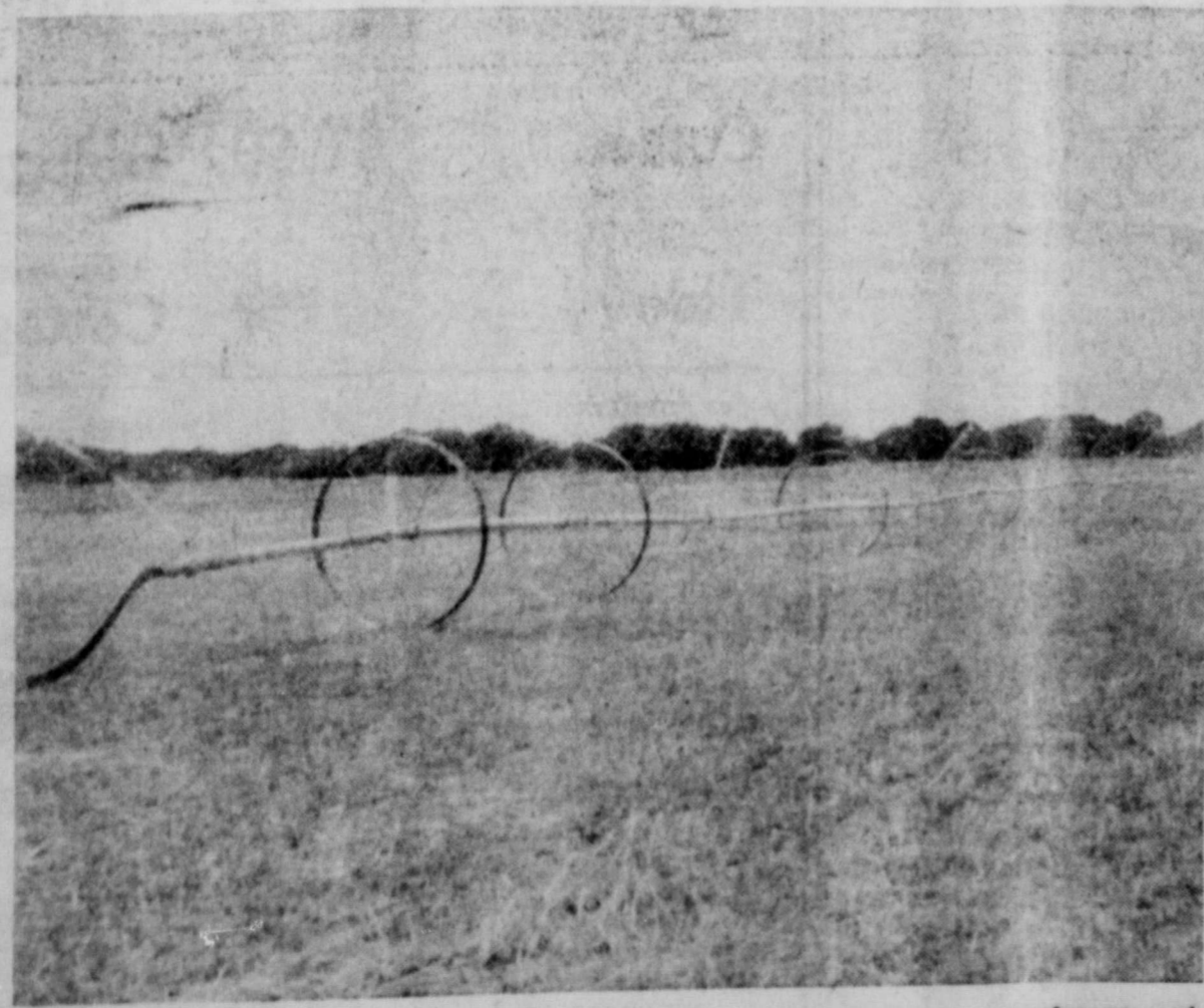
Christian, who owns and operates a dairy farm about one mile west of Hico, can do this. He has the water and a 120-head rolling sprinkler irrigation system. Approximately 130 acres of hybrid sudan grass is being irrigated now. He bales part of the sudan for hay and grazes part.

His dairy herd consists of 100 milk cows. The cows are grazed on a few acres daily and are confined to the area by use of electric fences. This permits controlled and uniform grazing. To get top production, he fertilizes with approximately 30-20-10 per acre following each grazing or baling. With this method of grazing and cutting for hay, he can produce another crop on the same land in 4 to 6 weeks.

Christian has about 50 large native pecan trees on his cropland. This area will be planted to coastal bermudagrass within the next two to three years. He has 14 acres of coastal in production now and plans to have about 60 acres when his grazing plans are completed.

Small grain will follow sudan on part of the land this fall. This crop will be fertilized with 100-40-20 per acre in three applications. The grazing will be managed about the same as with the sudan.

His dairy operation, irrigation, hay baling, and other jobs on the farm keep the Christian family busy all the time. Mrs. Christian is a nurse and works away from home. Aside from their work, they have time to participate in community activities, church, and recreation.

COUNTY AGENT

The prolonged drouth conditions call for gardeners to use special care in cultural practices that can conserve moisture and reduce the amount of irrigation water needed for lawns and woody ornamentals in the landscape.

Thorough waterings and judicious applications of fertilizer, insecticides are two steps that can help gardeners through the hot dry weather.

When applying irrigation water, do a thorough job, soaking the soil to a depth of six to 10 inches. If the soil surface is sloping or is compacted, water must be applied at a slower rate to prevent runoff.

Deep watering of landscape plants tends to encourage deep root penetration that ultimately provides a greater moisture supply for the plant. Frequent, light waterings encourages shallow root systems and once this happens, it is difficult to bring plants through extended drouth periods without considerable damage.

Fertilizers, insecticides, or fungicides should never be applied unless there is moisture in the soil because severe foliage burn can occur if these materials are applied when the soil is dry. Any fertilizer applications should be followed with a thorough watering.

Mulching should also be considered as a means of cutting down on soil temperature and water loss.

In caring for the lawn, raising the height of the lawnmower blade one-fourth to one-half of an inch during the hot weather will increase the length of the leaf blade, providing shade and reducing the water needed by the grass plant.

milk stool, then find a cow, and sit down and go to work. Pull and squeeze. Cow hair and dirt may, or may not, fall into the pail. But the milk will be strained a few hours later, and little specks of dirt will dissolve anyway.

"In summer, flies are everywhere. There isn't any breeze. The barn is steaming hot—you are sweating and tired before you start. The cow is switching her tail at the flies and hits you in the face and it stings and smells. When you finish one cow you move on to the next one. Forty-five minutes to an hour will milk four or five cows.

"Yesterday when I visited a modern dairy and saw the milk go from the milking machines to a tank and cooled to less than 40 degrees in just a few minutes, I thought, now that's progress."

I've milked a few cows myself and even though I didn't milk in the dark, I've milked in the heat with the cow's tail switching me in the face. If you happened to squeeze a little hard, the cow would sometimes kick, hitting the bucket and the milk would spill. I'm glad those good ole' days are over.

On the Home Range

Considering a long vacation soon? To lessen worries while away from home, plan and prep for safeguarding your properties before you leave. First, stop routine deliveries. Call or write businesses concerned; a note left on the door is a good way to let prowlers know you are away. Then check with the post office about holding or forwarding your mail. Ask a neighbor to remove circulars or notes dropped on the doorstep.

Notify relatives and neighbors of your itinerary so you can be reached in case of an emergency. Make sure fire insurance and other insurance policies on your home are in force and paid. You may also want to place valuables and important papers in safekeeping.

An unmowed lawn may indicate a vacant house, so arrange to have the lawn mowed if you will be away long. Store outdoor tools, appliances, furniture, ladders and hoses inside to avoid damage.

Window shades or venetian blinds should not be completely closed. When you are ready to leave, turn off heat and disconnect electrical appliances. Lock all doors, then leave a key with a neighbor so, if necessary, your house can be entered without breaking a window or lock. Never leave keys outside, under a mat or over the door.

then sticking to it. Fad diets, such as the rice or grapefruit diet, are popular now. But fad diets are not based on sound nutritional practices or recommendations.

Diets need to be formulated so that you can eat a variety of foods and at the same time include those foods that are favorites. A reducing diet should be easily adaptable to a regular eating program once you've reached your weight goal. Otherwise you'll be right back where you started—overweight.

Exercise is also a vital factor in weight reduction. A regular exercise routine should be practiced while you are dieting, not only to help strengthen and firm up flabby muscles and extra fat.

One of the soundest, easy-to-follow reducing diets is the Daily Food Guide. This guide, developed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is divided into four food groups. If you choose low calorie foods from each of these groups in the amounts recommended, you will consume daily approximately 1200 calories, a safe reducing level for most normal adults.

The Daily Food Guide includes two servings from the meat group, four or more from the fruit and vegetable group, four from the bread and cereal group, and two servings (for adults) from the milk group.
