Katy Depot Destroyed by Thursday Fire

One of Hico's oldest landmarks, the former Katy Railroad Depot, was destroyed by fire early Thursday morning, causing damage to building and equipment estimated at \$25,000 by City Fire Marshal W. R. Hampton.

Local firemen answered the alarm around 5:30 a.m., and had the blaze under control by 7 a.m. However, several of the volunteers were still on duty later in the morning.

The depot, which was purchased by the city when the railroad ceased to operate, was to be renovated into a modern Community Center by contractors who are building the housing project on the former railroad right-of-way.

Geo. C. Wright Construction Co., contractors on the housing project, suffered loss to lumber and supplies stored in and near the structure.

Firemen did a commendable job in containing the blaze to the general area.
