Texas thus far recorded 138 cases this year.

# Tigers Use Stingy Defense To Blank Dublin Lions 12-0

Hico's Tigers survived two near-disasters in the opening minutes of their contest with the Class A Dublin Lions last Friday night, and a sticky defense could be credited for salvaging a 12-0 victory for the locals to keep their slate clean at 2-0.

The Tigers were burned on the opening kickoff when 170 pound John Hodges returned 53 yards to the Hico 39. But the long runback went for naught as the Tiger defense, led by the likes of Lee Ramage, Chuck Bowden, Cecil Holley, Kenneth Woolsey, Jan Christian and the entire secondary revoked the visitors as they took six stabs at the Tigers and ended up punting from the local's 34. Holley broke up a third down pass to force the punt.

Following the kick, which the Tigers put in play at the 20, three plays netted exactly nothing, and Dublin fielded the punt at their own 45 and returned to the Tiger 38. Three penalties, one incomplete pass, and two running stabs later, the Lions found themselves back at their own 42 and kicked the ball away. The defensive play was typical of the Tiger effort during the course of the game.

The Tigs, putting the ball in play at their own 22, proved to fans—and themselves—that they could move the ball against their larger opponents, and marched to the Lion 24 before relinquishing possession. A sure TD pass was dropped during the drive, one of four for the night that receivers were unable to hang onto.

Dublin was unable to make a first down with their next possession, and an exchange of interceptions set the motion for even still another interception, this time by Hico, leading to the Tigers' first touchdown.

Big Lee Ramage intercepted the next time out at the Dublin 14, setting the stage for the marker.

And it didn't take long. Galen Lindsey blasted three times, the first for no gain, the second for eight yards to the six, and the third time into the end zone to send the Tigers out front by 6-0.

After the kickoff Dublin put together a drive that carried to the Tiger 22 but here again, a stingy defense throttled the drive at that point. Ken Woolsey made two big tackles in the stalemate.

On the next possession, Hico suffered its second interception of the game, but Dublin returned the completion three plays later when they fumbled the ball away to the Tigers. Gaining possession at the 39, Hico marched to the Dublin 16

before attempting an unsuccessful field goal, which ended the first half.

In the third quarter, Dublin came up with a drive to the Tiger 22, but again Hico repelled the threat.

From their own 22, Hico started a 78-yard drive which ended in the fourth quarter with the TD that iced the game. Benny Baley scooted in from one yard out on a fourth down play to make the score 12-0. Two big plays in the drive were an 18-yard pass completion from Baley to Leroy Grice, and a 27-yard scamper by Lindsey to the Dublin 16.

The Tiger defense really became sticky on Dublin's next possession,

allowing the visitors only six plays before taking over. The Tigers took over on their own 30, and ran eight minutes off the clock to end the game. The locals were at the Lions' two when time ran out.

Not only winning the game in the scoring column, the Tigers led the Lions in every statistical department except penalties, where the locals were charged with 25 yards and the visitors 73.
