Dr. Dayton Named Charter Diplomat By Med Board

Hico City, Mo. (Spl.)—Dr. B. C. Dayton of Hico has been named charter diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice as a result of passing a certification examination administered under the auspices of the ABFP.

To achieve diplomate status, Dr. Dayton, through an intensive 2-day examination, proved his competence in the areas of internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics-gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry, pre-medicine and other traditional specialties, and now is certified in medicine's newest specialty, Family Practice. The 3,285 diplomates, who earned their distinction, are the vanguard of a new type of highly competent "people doctor" who accepts responsibility for the patients' total care and serves as the

natural point of entry into the complex medical system.

These specialists must continue to show proof of competency in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by taking another exam and being re-certified every six years. No other specialty requires its diplomates to prove their competence on a continuing basis.

To qualify for the examination each doctor completed a 3-year family practice residency, or has been in family practice a minimum of six years and has successfully completed 300 hours of post-graduate medical education.

The list of charter diplomates released by the ABFP, the twentieth specialty board approved by the American Medical Association and the American Board of Medical Specialties, includes successful candidates from the first certification examination given in 1970, as well as those passing this year's examination. Most are members of the American Academy of General Practice, the national association

of family physicians headquartered in Kansas City. The AAGP is the organization chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for Family Practice in February, 1969.

Dr. Dayton, who has been associated with Hico Clinic since July 1, 1961, is a 1954 graduate of Southwestern University in Georgetown.

He is a 1959 graduate of the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston, and interned at St. Luke's Methodist Hospital in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He also completed a one-year surgical residency at Mason City, Iowa, before coming to Hico.

MASS INNOCULATIONS

330 Hico Students 'Shot'

Hico Public School children were faced with a new dilemma last Thursday when Texas Department of Health Official Tom Griffin visited the school and conducted one of three Immunization Clinics. Approximately 330 school children received either one or both oral polio and DPT vaccines. Four preschoolers were also included in this number.

Dr. B. C. Dayton, City Health Officer, screened the student permission slips and was on hand to answer necessary questions. Oral polio vaccines were administered by Hamilton County School Nurse, Mrs. Rudell Leeth, RN, and Griffin administered the DPT inocula-

tions.

Registration forms were given each student to take home and be signed by parents. Parents were asked to supply necessary information concerning vaccines given their children. No student received the free immunization without their parents consent.

Conforming to a new State law, all children will be required to receive polio, DPT, Smallpox, Rubella, and Measles vaccines before entering school next fall. Only children whose parents are conscientious objectors or children under a physician's care are exempted from this law. The local clinics are free to the students.

Hico Will Try For No. 4 at Grandview

Hico's Tigers, after feasting on Tigers, Lions and Wildcats, will get a taste of Zebra this Friday night when they journey east for the second straight week, going to Grandview to contest a better than average Zebra team.

The Zebras, who have been in a re-building stage the past few years, can only account for one victory this year, winning their season opener 6-0 over Abbott. They lost a 12-0 decision to Meridian after playing the Yellowjackets on even terms for three quarters, and last week dropped a 26-7 decision to a real good Wortham team.

Hico and Grandview have met three times previously, with the Tigers winning all three games. In 1968, the Zebras came to town sporting the highest scoring offense among Class A teams in Central Texas, and the Tigers upset the apple cart by downing the visitors 22-6.

In 1969 Hico spoiled Grandviews homecoming, trouncing the Zebras 31-0, and last year the Tigers delighted their own ex-students by winning the homecoming game 47-6.

The Tigers are reportedly in good condition for the 8 p.m. game, and should be favored to keep their slate clean against the Zebras.

Games this week involving other district members are: DeLeon at Gorman, Waco Moore JV at Evant, Blanket at Lometa, and Abbott at Meridian.

Tigers Trip Godley 28-6 to Remain in Undefeated Ranks

A 78-yard bomb on the game's last play gave Godley their first points of the year, but the score came too late to get the host Wildcats into the win column. Hico's Tigers were leading 28-0 at the time, and the six points didn't really mean anything.

The Tigers, rolling back along with two wins over Class A opponents, had to work hard for their 28 points, getting a TD in the initial stanza on a 46-yard drive, another in the third quarter on an 88-yard run-back of an intercepted pass, and two markers in the fourth quarter on 48 and 55-yard drives.

While the Tigers were racking up their third victory of the young season, some fans were hollering "what's wrong with the team." Appeared to be nothing wrong with team except a let-down from the previous two weeks.

Remember, if you will, that Hico went into the season opener against Glen Rose a definite underdog, but after the 48 minutes of play, Hico owned the scoreboard 19-12. Remember, also, that the following week a "bigger than big" Dublin team came to town, and Hico took the measure of the Lions by a 12-0 count. So what was wrong with the Tigers in the latest outing? They

simply had a let-down from two all-out efforts, and they were lucky that the fall came against a team such as Godley. But take nothing away from the Wildcats. They played perhaps their best game of the year against the Tigers, as they have always done in the past (with the exception of the slaughter last year.)

The Tigers were "flat", no doubt about it, but fans must realize that the kids are human, and they can't get "up" week after week for the next opponent, especially when the team is Godley.

The Tigers scored the first time they had possession, taking the opening kickoff and marching 46 yards for the counter. A fine run-back of the kickoff by Galen Christian set the stage for the TD. Danny Kennedy scored on a beautiful deceptive cross-back from 17 yards out.

That initial marker was the only scoring threat of the first and second periods for the Tigers, as a series of mistakes took their toll. The first half ended with Hico leading 6-0.

In the third quarter, a mishandled punt put Godley in business at the Hico 33, but after two incomplete passes, the Wildcats tried a third, which they shouldn't have. Galen Lindsey ran under the errant pass at the 12 and raced 88 yards for a more comfortable lead. Lindsey also kicked the extra point to send the Tigers out front 13-0.

Early in the fourth quarter, Benny Baley ran under another Wildcat pass and raced 75 yards to the end zone, but his efforts went for naught as a clipping penalty nullified the score. However, Hico had possession at the Godley 48, and the Tigers went the distance in eight plays, with Danny Kennedy getting the counter from the eight. Lindsey carried for the two point conversion, and the team was more secure leading 21-0.

Hico used but two plays and a penalty to notch their final marker. The Tigers recovered a Wildcat fumble at the 48, Baley hit Buddy Mayfield for 23 yards to the 33, and a 15-yard penalty moved the ball to the 18, from where Lindsey scooted in for the TD, kicked the extra point to give Hico a 28-0 lead, and end the scoring for the night

for Hico.

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On the Home Range

Fashion separates are made to mix and match. But the same isn't true for perfumes and fabrics. Perfume or cologne applied directly to clothing may result in dye rings, color removal and permanent stains. And upon aging, a disagreeable odor may result.

Garments and fabrics may also be stained by perfumed grooming aids such as hair spray and deodorants. For washable garments and fabrics, remove the perfume stain by washing immediately in a detergent and hot water solution,

followed with a bleach safe for the fabric.

For a solid perfume stain, first stretch the washable fabric over a bowl and drop warm alcohol over the spot, then rinse. Follow by laundering in a solution of detergent and warm water.

If the garment is not washable, immediately take it to a reputable dry cleaner. Be sure to identify the stain for the most satisfactory results. Perfumes and colognes should be applied behind the ears or at the wrists, to avoid contact with clothing.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Farmers and ranchers in Hamilton County, as well as others, should become familiar with the new vehicle brake law passed recently by the Texas Legislature.

The new law applies to every trailer, semi-trailer and pole trailer equipped with air or vacuum brakes and every trailer in excess of 3,000 pounds. These trailers must now be equipped with brakes acting on all wheels which can be amplified automatically and promptly and remain applied for at least 15 minutes upon break-away from the towing vehicle.

However, there are some exceptions to the law. Trailers with a gross weight of 3,000 pounds or less, and those weighing 40 percent or less of the towing vehicle are exempt.

Also farm trailers or semi-trailers moving 30 miles per hour or less and having a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or less are exempt from the brake law requirements if they are otherwise exempt from vehicle registration laws. Cotton trailers weighing 15,000 pounds or less moving temporarily at speeds

of 30 miles per hour or less are exempt if they are exempt from vehicle registration laws.

Other special brake requirements were added for mobile homes, certain vehicles in drive-away and tow-away operations, and certain trucks and truck-tractors having three or more axles.

Officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety have more specific information on the brake law as well as the effective date of the various provisions of the law.

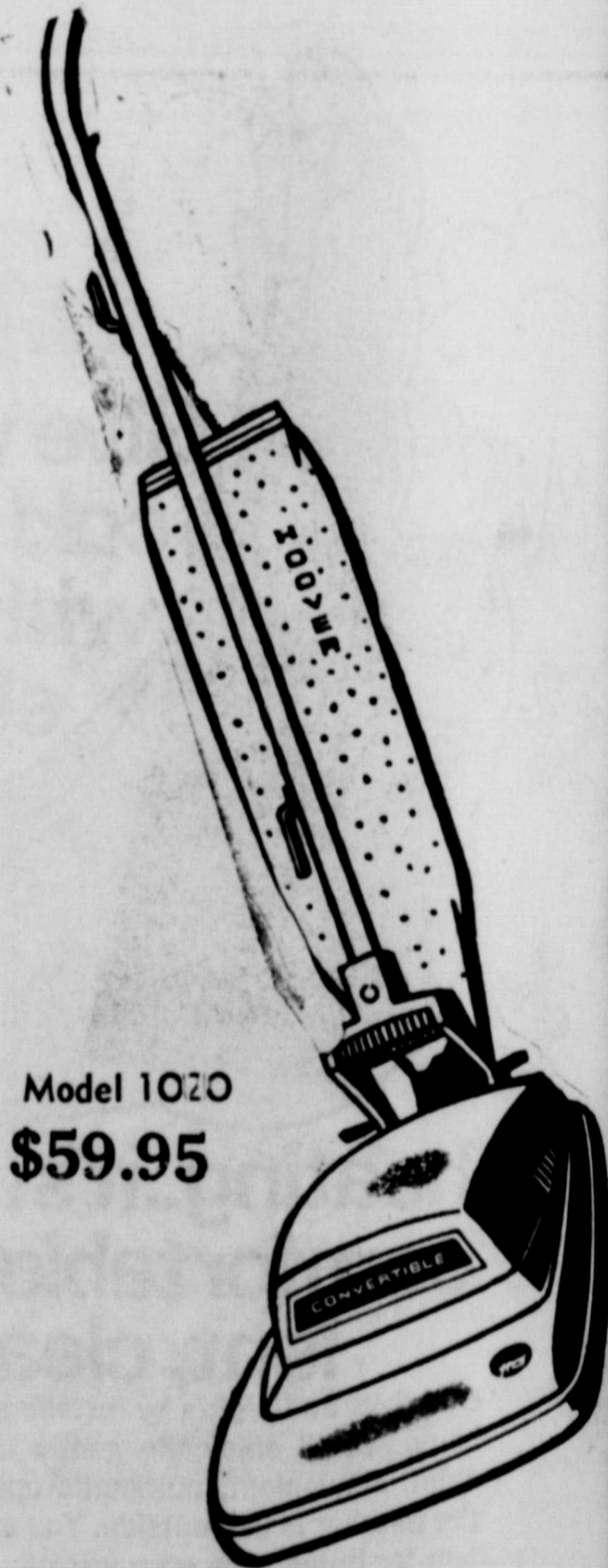

Mrs. Jake McClammy Presents Program For Review Club Meeting

"Depression glass," Mrs. McClammy explained, "is the cheapest form of glass which was manufactured during the Great Depression." Much of it was given away with purchases; whole sets could be bought in dime stores. Some was manufactured in the late 20's and in the 40's, but most of it was made in the 30's. There are 97 known patterns.

The colors found in these patterns are green, pink, yellow, amber and clear. Occasionally cobalt blue is found. Mrs. McClammy has a lovely cobalt blue pitcher with a clear handle, a combination now difficult to find. Also candle holders are very rare as not many were made. Carnival glass is a special type of depression glass. The exhibitor owns a complete set in yellow of the first depression glass made. This pattern, "The Hanging Basket," made by Indiana Glass Co. in 1928, is rare. Mrs. McClammy has been offered \$300 for her set.

The last pattern made is the Heritage pattern (1940) of Federal Glass Co. It is found only in clear glass. Mrs. Stout, in the state of Washington, has established the first depression glass museum. Best source of information on depression glass is Mrs. Weatherman's "Era of Depression."

The experience of a collector are varied. On one occasion Mrs. McClammy made a trip from Lamasas to Corpus Christi to purchase a certain particular piece. Upon arrival she discovered it was gone, but her trip was not a failure, for she was able to buy another piece she wanted. This piece, she claims, cost \$1,000.00, as on her return a car accident occurred which skyrocketed the cost of the trip.

On behalf of the club, Mrs. Dayton presented the guest speaker with a Shirley Temple depression glass pitcher. The next meeting will be in the home of Mrs. J. E. Lincoln on October 8. Reporter.

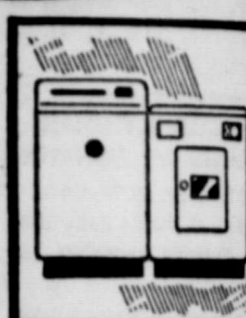
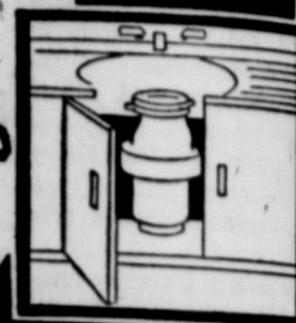

The test is recommended for those students who plan to continue their education after high school and for those who are seeking recognition and financial assistance through scholarship programs. It is used to indicate success for college programs.

The test requires two hours, and an additional 30 minutes for instructions and other administrative details.

Social Security

Questions & Answers

Question: I understand that social security cannot be paid for the first six months of a worker's disability. Why is that?

Answer: Disability benefits are payable only when a worker's inability to work will be of long continued duration. Disability benefits are not paid for a temporary or partial disability. The six month waiting period allows for an evaluation of the worker's condition in order to determine the extent of his impairment and whether his disability can be expected to last not less than 12 months as provided by law.

Question: Can I get both benefits on my own work and on my husband's record as a widow?

Answer: You cannot get both benefits in full, but you are assured of the highest amount. For example, if you apply on your own, you will receive the amount you are entitled to on your own. In addition, if your widow's benefits are higher, you can receive your own plus the difference between that amount and the amount you are entitled to as a widow.
