# Bank Assets Are Record

## Nearly 5 Million Reported in September Comptroller Call

Assets at Hico First National Bank approached the five million dollar mark as reflected this week with the Comptroller's call dated Sept. 30, and the latest figures are an all-time record high for the 80-year-old institution.

Assets at the time of the latest call were \$4,708,990.07.

Previous record high with a comptroller's call was \$4,495,905.00 on June 30. The latest figures compares with \$3,882,189.21 with the corresponding call in 1970.

Loans at the local institution also showed an increase over the last quarterly call, with \$1,702,821.64 as compared with \$1,683,413.15 with the June 30 report.

### Bank Improvements Planned.

At the same time that the latest call figures were revealed, President Floyd Clifton also announced that the bank plans an extensive remodeling pro-

gram, to start shortly which will up-date facilities and add greatly to the overall general appearance.

A complete change in outside appearance is planned, along with major changes in the interior. Two new private offices will be included in the overhaul, and a partition will be built to isolate teller's windows from the bookkeeping department.

Complete details of the renovation program will be revealed at a later date, according to Clifton.

## IN 7-6 GAME—

# Tigers Ease by Rising Star

As the old saying goes, "an inch is as good as a mile," certainly applies to Hico's latest grid victory, a 7-6 verdict over a Rising Star team that shouldn't be allowed to stay on the field with a team of the Tiger class. But they did, and scared the pants off both the team members and fans as they continually thwarted every Tiger effort to get into the end zone.

Six times—that's right, 6—the Tigers worked into scoring position, and like the Dallas Cowboys, couldn't do anything about it. But finally, on their last effort, Hico moved in to knot the count, and then Galen Lindsey came off the bench to kick a perfect extra point to preserve the Tiger's unblemished record.

Lindsey, injured in the Grandview game, was in action for a total of only three plays during the evening, and Lee Ramage, one of the most able football players in this section of the state, saw limited duty until it was absolutely necessary to play him. Both were recovering from leg injuries.

A freshman, Buddy Mayfield, ignited the spark that was needed for the Tigers to win the game. Trailing 6-0, Mayfield made a circus catch of a Benny Baley pass for 22 yards in the fourth quarter to set the motion for the winning TD. The play carried from the 38 to the Wildcat 40, and Baley came right back with another key pass for 15 yards to Galen Christian to the 25. An incomplete pass and a roughing the passer penalty moved the ball to the 13. After still another incomplete pass, Baley kept for eight yards to the five, Danny Polk was bottled up on the next attempt, and Baley called his own number for four yards and a first down at the one. On the next play, Baley kept again for the TD. Lindsey kicked true and Hico owned the game 7-6.

After the kickoff, with still plenty of time left in the game, the freshman Mayfield made another key play, this time intercepting a Wildcat pass at the 49. The Tigers used a time-consuming game to eat up the clock, and punted to Rising Star with only 38 seconds left.

Prior to the scoring jaunt by the Tigers, they had moved to the Rising Star 12 on their first possession of the game, to the four later in the first quarter where a motion penalty nullified a TD by Baley, to the seven and again to the two in the second quarter when time ran out in the half before the Tigers could get in. The Tigers never threatened in the third quarter, while allowing the 'Cats their TD, but came back in the final stanza with two threats, one ending in the winning counter.




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

After a shot and medication for some five or six hours, we got easy enough to go to sleep. We had been sawing some large sprouts from a walnut tree at the old Wilson house when Mrs. W. E. Goyne, Mrs. Edward Guinn and myself were doing a clean up job on the front yard. We had been stung once before by an insect on our persimmon tree. This time it stung twice. The pain starts a few seconds after the bite. We are told this is the way with the green asplike insects that are eating the tree leaves. But seven or eight times can really be painful. We have learned since that vinegar is a good remedy for any kind of sting. If on a finger lay the finger in a saucer of vinegar. But you better be on the lookout for those green asp, which are wooly, and the tree leaf type which are not wooly but very similar to the asp otherwise.

## On the Home Range

Barbecue, a magic word that suggests good eating outdoors with family and friends, is an age-old Indian practice. Barbecue developed from an ancient practice of the Tupinamba Indians of Eastern Brazil. They slept on a wooden frame covered with palm. The frame was placed on long poles to keep it above the ground and was called barbracat.

The Tupinambas also used a similar frame over an open fire to smoke and dry meat. About 1555 Hans Staden, a shipwrecked German, lived with these Indians and first reported the practice of barbecuing.

Washington Irving was the first American to use the word barbecue to describe a social event in 1809.

Today barbecue means a simple meal with meat cooked over an open fire. The meat may be poultry, beef, pork, wild game or even fish. A lettuce or cabbage salad, pickles, beans, potatoes, and dessert are usually served with barbecue.

Barbecue can be a big social event or simply backyard fun for the whole family.

We are becoming a "throw-away" society. That is, we use a product once, then discard it. The magic of disposables has also filtered into fabrics.

You see disposable non-woven fabrics everywhere. Disposable sheets and pillow cases are found on beds in nursing homes and hospitals; non-woven cleaning dusting cloths as well as table covers, nap-

kins, draperies and curtains are found in homes and hotels. And disposable non-women fabrics used to make dresses, smocks, aprons and caps and gowns for graduation exercises are becoming increasingly popular.

The non-woven disposable fabrics are produced by bonding together layers of man-made fibers. Two major types are reinforced paper fabrics and spun bonded fabrics.

To prevent environmental problems that evolve from additional wastes from disposable fabrics, research is working to reclaim and re-cycle the fabrics back into use.

Incineration and development of a rayon paper that disintegrates in water are other elimination methods.

Question: I receive 25 percent disability from the VA. I am a silent partner in a farm operation. My doctor has advised me to apply

for social security disability. Am I eligible?

Answer: The decision on your disability can only be made after you apply and the medical evidence of your condition is reviewed by the state agency that makes disability determinations for us. The requirement for disability is that you be unable to do any substantial work for a period of at least 12 months or have a condition which is expected to result in death.
