## Political Picture Brightens With First Candidate

The first official announcement in the News Review columns, a political pot began to boil this week indicating that voters in Hico County will have much to choose from in the first primary election.

The announced candidate is Aubrey Moore of Hillsboro, who is running for re-election to the new District House of Representatives.

Mr. Moore is a native of Hubbard, and received Bachelor of Science and Honorary L.L.D. Degrees from Texas A&M University. He is a veteran of World War II, serving with the Air Force, is active in American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars posts, is a member of Texas Association of Realtors and National Board of Realtors.

During his three terms in the Legislature, Mr. Moore served as Vice-Chairman of Highways and Roads Committee, member of Agriculture, Livestock, Common Carriers, Military Affairs, and Governmental Affairs and Efficiency committees.

He helped secure enactment of many pieces of legislation, and actively opposed a sales tax on food and medicine, mandatory consolidation of small schools, consolidation and re-assignment of District Courts, sales tax on agricultural equipment and supplies, and state income tax.

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## Santa Anna is Bi-District Foe---

# Tigers Clinch Play-Off Berth With 40-14 Win Over Gorman

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## Hico-Santa Anna Game at Comanche

Hico's Tigers and the Santa Anna Mountaineers will clash Friday night, November 26 at Indian Stadium in Comanche in a bi-district football game matching the champions from Districts 17 and 18-B. Game time will be 7:30.

Officials from the two schools met in Comanche Tuesday night and decided on the place and time.

Two other towns made bids to host the game—Brownwood and Stephenville—but officials selected Comanche. A flip of the coin designated Hico as the home team for the game, and coaches from both schools agreed on using two officials

from the Brownwood Association and two from the Meridian Association.

The game will be sponsored by the Comanche Jaycoos, who will furnish programs, tickets, etc., while retaining concession rights. Admission set for the game is \$1.75 for adults and 75c for students.

Both Hico and Santa Anna have one game remaining on the regular schedule, with the Mountaineers playing Blauvelt this Friday and Hico going to Evant. Both are hoped to win the final game. Santa Anna has a 7-2 record for the year, while Hico stands at 9-0.

## Play at Evant Friday in Last Regular Season Game

For the first time in the last 42 years, Hico clinched a place in the bi-district grid contest by walloping the Gorman Panthers 40-14 last Friday night.

News Review records only go back to 1929, so an accurate number of years couldn't be determined on when, if ever, a Hico football team had advanced to the play-offs or won a district championship.

In defeating the Panthers, Hico also clinched a tie for the district crown, and only have to down Evant in the season finale to take the clear-cut title. As the race now stands, Hico is alone atop the standings with a perfect 3-0 record, while Meridian and Gorman are 2-1. The two teams play at Gorman Friday night for a title tie or for second and third place in the standings.

A win for Hico over Evant would also give the Tigers the first perfect season, possibly in history, and move the Red and White into the bi-district game against the Santa Anna Mountaineers.

Santa Anna won the district 18-B title last week by downing Richland Springs 30-12, and will be a formidable foe for the Tigers.

Hico gained the play-offs by virtue of downing both Meridian and Gorman, and the worst of the locals could end up is by tying one of the teams for the title. A Meridian or Gorman win, and a Hico loss, which isn't likely, would throw the race into a two-way tie, with Hico getting the play-off bid.

The Tigers, in rolling to a 9-0 record so far this year, have convinced many of their followers that they really are a good team, despite accusations that they have played only well enough to win. Well enough to win is the name of the game, and Hico, although not too impressive in some contests, is the only team in this immediate area that can boast a perfect slate.

The Tigers, playing like wild men, literally "whupped" the Panthers in last week's game. Scoring first in the initial quarter, Hico saw a 6-0 lead go by the wayside with the visitors taking an 8-6 halftime margin.

But playing like crazy in the third period, the Tigers romped for three TD's to take a commanding 28-8 lead at the end of the quarter, then tacked on two more tallies in the fourth quarter to win the game 40-14.

Galen Lindsey, playing his best game of the year, ripped the Panthers for four touchdowns, added two extra points by the kicking route, and passed to Benny Baley for another brace of point-getters.

The Tigers took the opening kickoff and marched 83 yards in 12 plays for the go-ahead points. Quarterback Baley fooled everyone, including the fans, in faking beautifully to Lindsey and keeping for 11 yards and the initial TD. The kick was no good and Hico owned a short-lived 6-0 lead. Gorman stormed back after the

kickoff and pranced 49 yards in nine plays to go ahead in the contest. Steve Patterson, 160-pound fullback, scored from the three, and Billy Self added the 2-point conversion to take the lead 8-6.

The remainder of the first quarter, and also the second period went scoreless, and the board read 8-6 Gorman at intermission.

One of the key series of plays came after the second half kickoff, when the Tigers allowed Gorman to reach their 22 before a strong defense turned the ball over at this point. From the 22, Lindsey picked up 6 yards to the 28, Danny Polk got another 2 to the 30, but then the roof fell in and the Tigers were penalized back to the 15 for holding.

On the next play, Baley retreated almost into the end zone, and then threw complete to Lindsey at the 15, and it was katty-bar-the-door the rest of the way. Lindsey took off like a wild man and there was no stopping him as he ran around and over people for 85 yards to send the Tigers out front 12-8. The conversion attempt was when Lindsey turned passer and hit Baley for the two points, upping the count to 14-8.

After allowing Gorman to run three plays, the Tigers took the punt at their own 49, and used but three plays to score. Galen Christian picked up five to the Gorman 46, the home team was penalized back to their own 49, Lindsey made the five back to the 46, and then lightning struck. Christian, coming around on one of his favorite plays, the reverse, scooted 46 yards for the touchdown that added icing to the cake. Lindsey's kick was good and the Tigers owned a 21-8 lead.

And the locals were still not through, as on the first play after the kickoff, Lindsey ran under a Panther aerial and roamed 40 yards to the end, then kicked the extra point to up the count to 28-8.

The Panthers put together a 93-yard march to score their final TD, going the distance in 10 plays. Mark Arnold took a 29-yard scoring pass for the TD, making the score 28-14 early in the fourth quarter.

After one possession by both teams, Hico squashed any doubt that they might lose the game. Gaining possession at the Panther 41, the Tigers used six plays to cover the distance with Lindsey rambling the last 23 steps for the score, making the count 34-14.

And to add a little spice, Baley threw on the last play of the game, hitting Lindsey around the 40, and the junior fullback wasn't to be denied as he rambled the remaining distance to the end zone for the TD. The final play covered 80 yards, and gave Hico the 40-14 win.

## FROM THE DESK OF YOUR J.P.

By PAUL VERDUZCO

Justice of the Peace, Precinct 3

I have just returned from Arlington where on the 3, 4 and 5 I attended a school for Justices of the Peace in the Central Texas area. This school was promoted by the Justices of the Peace & Constable Association of Texas (of which I am a member), and paid for by the State of Texas (tax-payers of which you are a member). We were in attendance from 8 a.m. until noon, then from 1 to 5 p.m. The work was well planned and the instructors well qualified and very capable. There were 72 J.P.'s in attendance, all interested in improving themselves that they might better serve their constituents.

You might be interested to know that there is a movement to do away with Justice of the Peace Courts and Constables throughout the State. And just a step further to do away with County Government.

House Bill No. 168 (effective 8-30-71), Article 5972, "incompetency." Removal of Justices of the Peace: Quote:

(a) By "incompetency" as used herein is meant gross ignorance of official duties, or gross carelessness in the discharge of them; or an officer may be found to be incompetent when, by reason of some serious physical or mental defect, not existing at the time of his election, he has become unfit or unable to discharge promptly and properly the duties of his office.

(b) In the case of a justice of the peace who is not a licensed attorney, incompetency also includes the failure to successfully complete within one year from the date he is first elected, or if he is in office on the effective date of this Act, one year from the effective date of this Act, a forty-hour course in the performance of his duties; said course to be completed in any accredited state-supported school of higher education.

Section 2. Persons having served two terms or more as duly elected justice of the peace are exempted from provisions of subsection (b) of this act. End of quote.

During our question and answer discussion portions of the school, we shared our experiences, problems, trials, etc. We learned a lot from these sessions, particularly from the Metropolitan areas. One thing I already suspected before I went to this school, but had confirmed—we have the friendliest, finest, cleanest most law-abiding folks in the world.

I want you to know that it is my purpose as your J.P. to qualify by further study to better discharge my official duties, but above all, to create peace and harmony in this community that I now serve and love.



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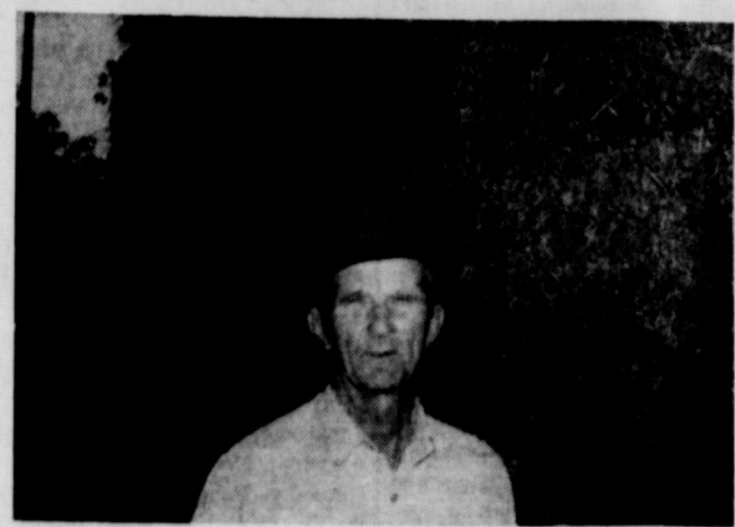
