While at Baylor Donaldson has compiled an outstanding academic record and has written for the Baylor Law Review. He has served on the Student Bar Association Ethics Committee and is Chairman of the Curriculum Committee.

Donaldson stated that the new district is composed of counties with common interests and his lifetime residence in the area will make him responsive to its needs.

## City Pays \$13,590 In Paving Program

City of Hico spent a total of \$13,590.34 during the annual paving program just completed, according to Street Supt. W. R. Hampton.

The figures were revealed at the regular monthly meeting of City Council Monday night.

The program included 13,000 square yards of seal-coating, and 9,000 square yards of new paving, according to Hampton. The paving was carried out in keeping with a city policy of upgrading streets

each year.

Also at the Monday meeting, the group heard a proposal from Central Freight Lines to remove their old warehouse and replace with a metal structure providing a suitable lease arrangement could be worked out with the City. Mayor O. L. Davis said that he would negotiate with the freight company.

In other discussions, Councilman Roy Bates posed the question on usage of the new the Community Center by various organizations, asking about rental fees, etc. No action was taken on the matter.

Mayor Davis proposed an anti-room be built next to the City Hall to be used as headquarters for the nightwatchman. After considerable discussion, the Council agreed to further planning on the project.

Other discussions centered around drainage horns in front of the Little League Park; center street parking on Main; and parking on Railroad Street in front of the new housing units.

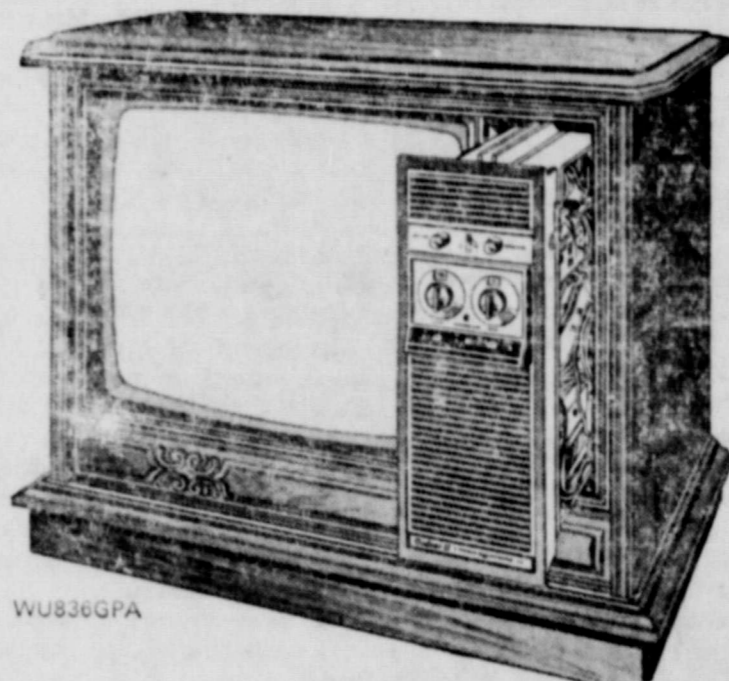

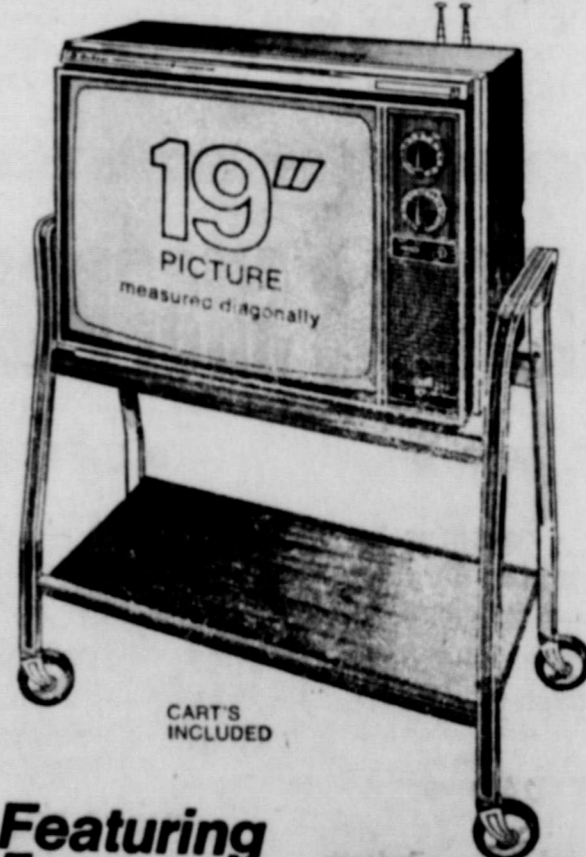


