was graduated from Baylor University last Tuesday with a Ph.D. in Physical Chemistry.

Knudson, a 1964 graduate of Hico High School, received a B.S. degree in Chemistry and Mathematics from Tarleton State College in 1968, and had studied at Baylor since that time.

His Doctoral Dissertation involved the study of surfaces of several altered clay materials. Graduate advisor was Dr. J. L. McAttee, Jr.

Following completion of his work at Baylor, Dr. Knudson accepted a position with the Baroid Division of NL Industries in Houston, and assumed that position Monday of this week. His work with the Houston firm will be an extension of his research at Baylor.

Dr. Knudson is married to the former Dorothy Gray, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie Gray.

Bob Cummings of Gatesville Seeking 52nd D.A.'s Position

Bob Cummings announced his candidacy for District Attorney of the 52nd Judicial District by filing with Mr. Leo Rendessy, County Chairman of the Democratic Party on Monday of last week.

Cummings is 35 years of age and a resident of Gatesville. He is married to the former Joy Denke of Marlin and they have three children. He is a member of the Church of Christ.

Mr. Cummings graduated from Gatesville High School in 1954 and went to Texas University, where he received a BBA degree in accounting. Mr. Cummings taught in the Gatesville Public Schools for half a term and then joined the Air Force Reserve. He attained the rank of staff sergeant and was honorably discharged in 1965. While a member of the reserve, he attended Baylor Law School and received his Juris Doctor degree in 1962. While attending Baylor Law School, he was a member of the Editorial Board of the Baylor Law Review. After graduation from Law School, he was employed as an assistant city attorney for the City of Waco. His primary duty there was to prosecute misdemeanor cases in the City Court and County Court. Mr. Cummings moved back to Gatesville in 1963, where he has been a sole-practitioner to this date. During his practice, he has had considerable experience as a criminal defense lawyer, and he is a member of the newly organized Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association. He is also a member of the Texas Trial Lawyers Association and the American Trial Lawyers Association.

Mr. Cummings is currently President of the Gatesville Lions Club and is past President of the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce. In 1965 he received the "Distinguished Service Award" from the Gatesville Jaycees and is still a member of the Gatesville Jaycees.

Trophies will be awarded the first and second place teams, and the consolation winners.

Admission for each of the three nights is 25c for students and 75c for adults.

\$25,000 Damage in Saturday Blaze

A 40x300-foot turkey house on the farm of J. B. Woodard, located five miles north of Hico in the Millerville community, was completely destroyed by fire last Saturday morning. The alarm was sounded at 11:20.

The turkey house was empty, with employees preparing the house to put down about 14,000 young turkeys the next day.

Tommie Pierce, spokesman for the Woodard firm, said that Mr. and Mrs. Bob Stanford, employees, were using a tractor to spread litter in the house when the tractor ignited. The gas tank exploded, and the house was destroyed before firemen could arrive.

The house was the same one that was nearly destroyed last Spring by a tornado which dipped down in the area.

Woodard said that loss caused by the fire, including the house, tractor and equipment, would run about \$25,000.

Firemen were called to the site again at 4:20 Saturday afternoon when it appeared that the smoldering ruins had ignited, endangering another turkey house nearby.

Both sessions will end at 3 p.m., and are sponsored by the Associated Milk Producers Inc. and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

School Trustee Candidate Filing Information Released

Annual School Trustee elections in all districts in Hamilton County will be held Saturday, April 1, according to information submitted by County Supt. Herman Walton.

Mr. Walton released the following information concerning the forthcoming election:

"In all elections for the office of

county school trustee or trustee of any school district, the application for candidate for a place on the ballot shall be filed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the day of the election. Applications for candidate for county school trustee or an independent school district having fewer than five hundred (500) scholars shall be filed with the County Judge. For these elections, five or more resident qualified voters may request that certain names be printed on the ballot."

"Application for candidates for trustee in a district with more than

500 scholars shall be filed with the Secretary of the board of trustees."

"Regardless of the method used in filing, each candidate is required to file a loyalty oath before his name can be printed on the ballot."

"Any of these forms may be secured in the office of the County Superintendent."

County Trustees to be elected are: Precinct 3, incumbent V. H. Jenkins; Precinct 4, incumbent B. A. Turner.

Hico Independent School District to elect two trustees: Dr. B. C. Dayton and Derel Pillingim, incumbents.

Hamilton Independent School District to choose three. Present incumbents are Melvin Henkes, Andy Campbell and Johnny Harris.

Pottsville Independent School District, choose two: Incumbents Clarence Goerdel and Curtis Wiesepape.

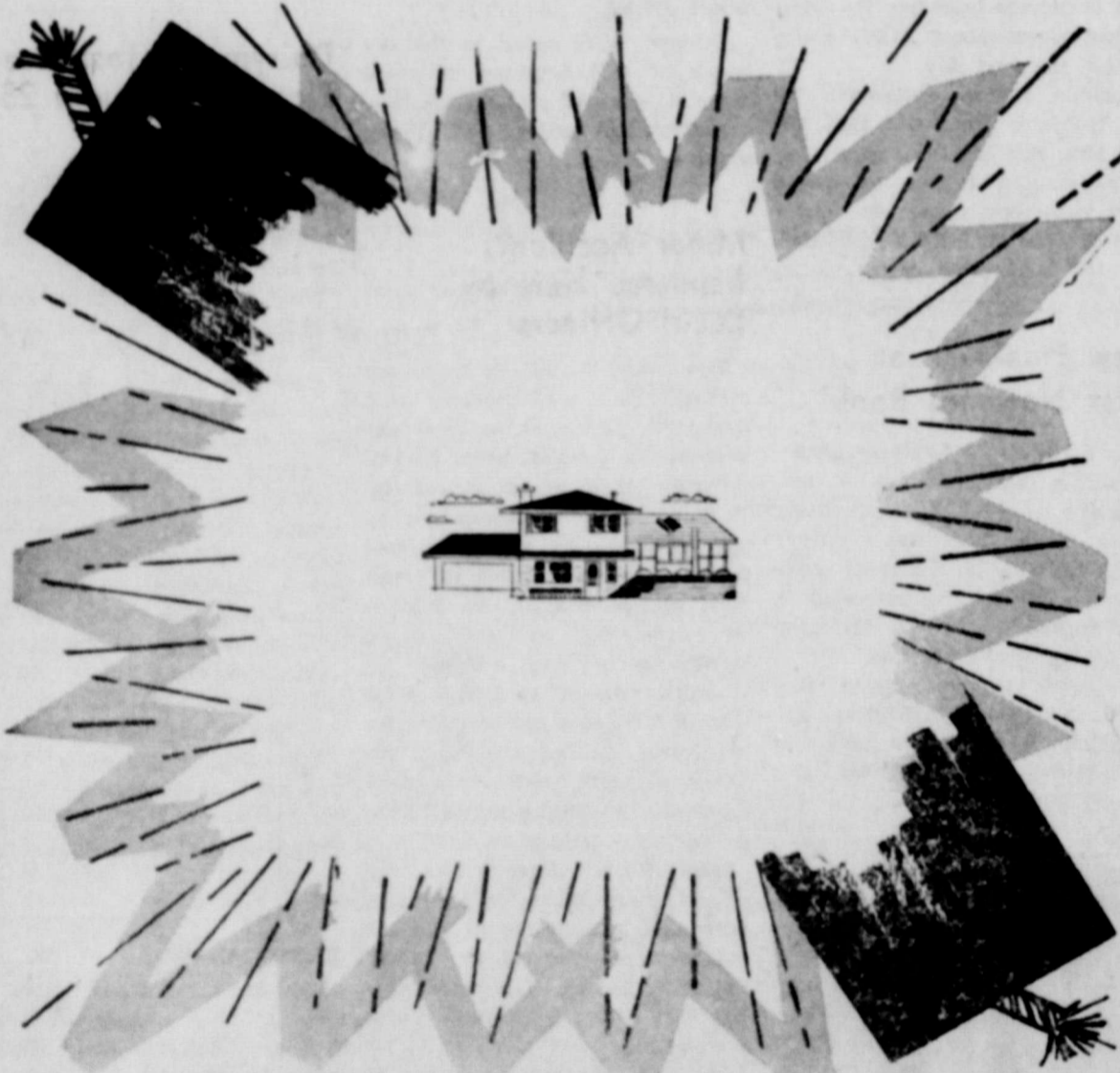

Beat eggs, add sugar, and margarine, beating to combine the three. Add pineapple, coconut and vanilla. Pour into unbaked 9-inch pie shell and bake 35 to 45 minutes at 350 degrees, or until golden brown.

For special pastry edge, trim pastry overhand so it is one-fourth inch from rim of pie pan. Cut edge with tip of inverted teaspoon. If desired mark with a fork.

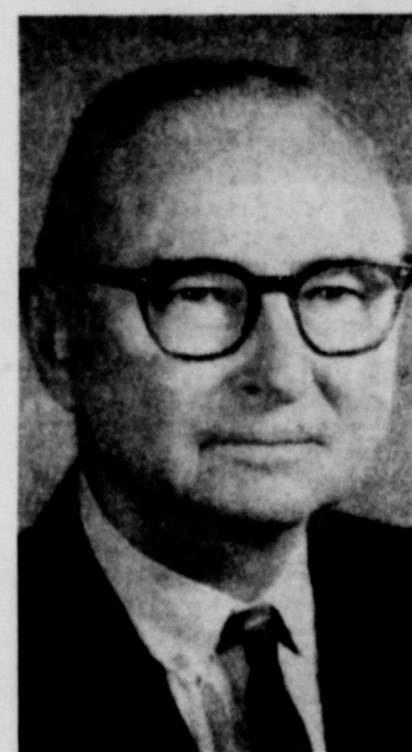

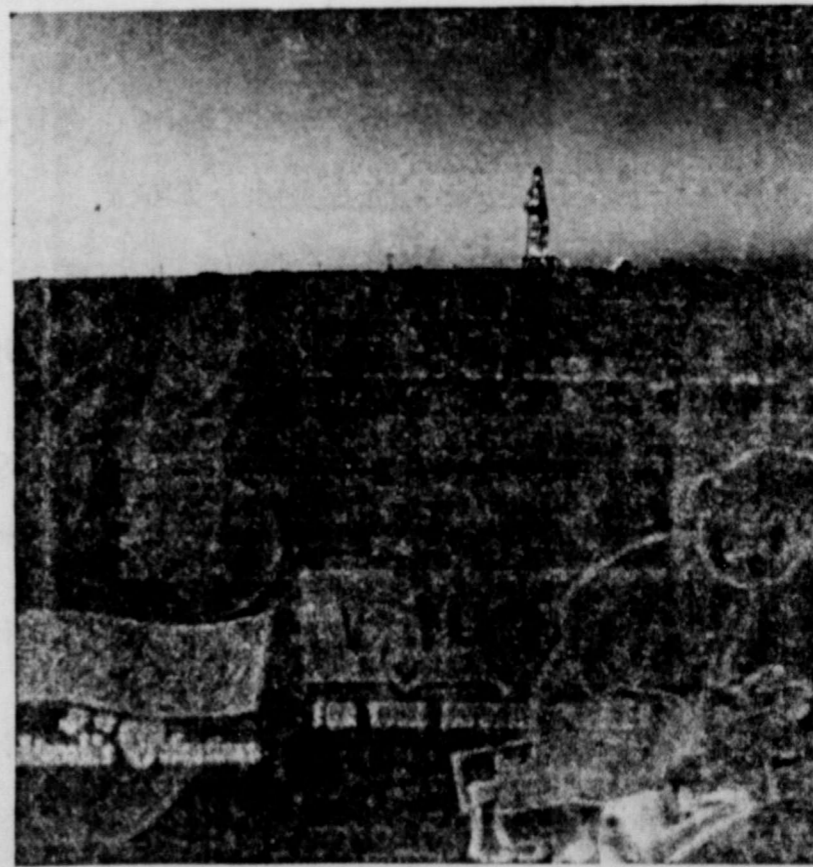

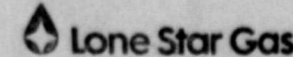
