April 30th Deadline For Applying For Tax Exemptions

April 30th is the last day taxpayers may apply for the different tax reliefs that available and to render their property. These measures do not go into effect immediately, and property owners must make application to their new appraisal district office.

There are additional exemptions for persons over 65 or disabled as well as homestead exemptions to all homeowners being offered by the school districts.

Ranchers and farmers who qualify have Agriculture valuation available in

all jurisdictions. Disables Veterans may claim an optional exemption on one designated piece of property.

Cities may offer optional exemptions for the disabled and elderly, with the counties offering homestead exemptions on farm to market road tax, and also additional exemptions to persons 65 years of age.

Contact your local appraisal district office for more information and avoid any inconvenience as well as protecting your rights as a taxpayer.

Local police said they received several calls in relation to the outage, but no reports of problems.

Don Settle, WTU's local manager there said the cause of the blowout hasn't been determined.

DPS Reports Traffic Fatalities In County

Traffic deaths in Texas have increased for the last two years, and there is no sign the trend is changing in 1982.

According to preliminary figures from the Texas Department of Public Safety, at least 4,691 people died on Texas roads in 1982, an increase of 267 traffic deaths as compared to 1980. Final figures for 1981 will be available after May 1, 1982.

In Callahan County, there were 254 accidents, in which 6 people were killed and 112 people were injured. According to DPS statistics, 31 of these injuries were incapacitating.

"An incapacitating injury is when an individual is not able to walk or drive," said Charles Kruse, supervisor of data analysis for the Department of Public Safety. The remaining number of injuries are classified as non-incapacitating, such as bumps or bruises, and possible injuries such as back pains or whiplash. "Possible injuries are where a trooper sees no visible signs of injury,"

said Kruse.

"The two leading violations that contribute to traffic deaths are speeding and DWI", said David Wells, a spokesman for the DPS. However, Wells added most drivers obey the 55 mph speed limit. "Compliance with 55 has been pretty good," said Wells.

Another factor in the rise in fatalities is an increase in driving by Texas drivers. "We're driving more vehicle miles each year", said Wells. Also, with the increase in Texas population, there are more people using Texas roads every day," said Wells.

Still another factor in the increase in Texas traffic deaths-- and a factor in traffic deaths nationwide--is the increasing popularity of small cars. People driving small cars that are involved in accidents are eight times more likely to die than someone driving a full-sized car, according to statistics compiled by the National Safety Council.

overdue books will return them and thus avoid a penalty.

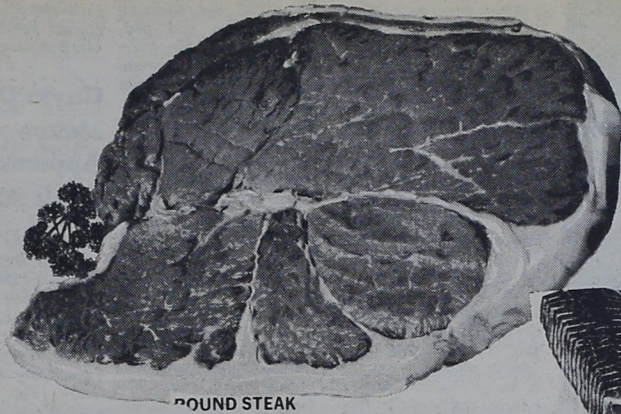

Farmers Advised To Watch Stored Grain

"Farm stored grain, whether to be under loan or to be in reserve, should be watched closely and checked carefully for insects, particularly during the oncoming months when rapid weather changes could take place", Oran Bains, Chairperson on the Callahan County ASC Committee said. During warm weather, grain temperatures are just right for rapid insect development.

The probability of grain becoming insect infested or spoiled because of moisture damage and mold growth increases when it is stored and left undisturbed in the same location for several months. Stored grain contains moisture that may shift from one location to another primarily because of temperature differences that deve-

lop within the structure when surface and perimeter areas of the grain cool. Moisture from warm grain moves to cooler parts of the structure, resulting in damp areas within the grain that favor insect activity and mold development. These in turn cause rapid deterioration and heating of the grain.

"When determining a farmer's eligibility for the grain reserve program or commodity loans, we consider the condition of the storage structure and the commodity stored within the structure", Bains said. Farmers are responsible for any loss in quality or quantity caused by insect infestation or rodent damage.

Farmers who are in doubt as to the quality of

their stored grain should contact the county ASCS office as soon as possible.

a distribution line crew at Stamford in 1959.

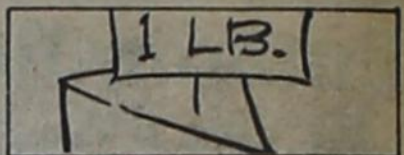

APPLY FOR TAX EXEMPTIONS.

If you pay property tax in the State of Texas, there is one important date to remember. April 30 is the last day to file applications for exemptions and to render your property. Several types of tax relief measures are available to Texas taxpayers, but they do not go into effect automatically. applications must be made to your new appraisal district office.

School districts offer a residence homestead exemption to all homeowners and additional exemptions to persons who are 65 or over or disabled.

Counties offer homestead exemptions on their farm-to-market road tax, & also additional exemption to persons 65 years of age.

Cities and other jurisdictions may offer optional exemptions for the disabled and elderly.

All jurisdictions offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property. Agricultural valuation is available in all jurisdiction to qualified farmers and

ranchers.


Remember, exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically. Applications must be filed this year by April 30.

You can avoid any inconvenience and fully protect your rights as a taxpayer by rendering your property and applying by the April 30 deadline.

Contact your appraisal district office for more information on available exemptions. Further details about the property tax system in Texas and how it works for you are contained in a pamphlet by the State Property Tax Board called Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities! 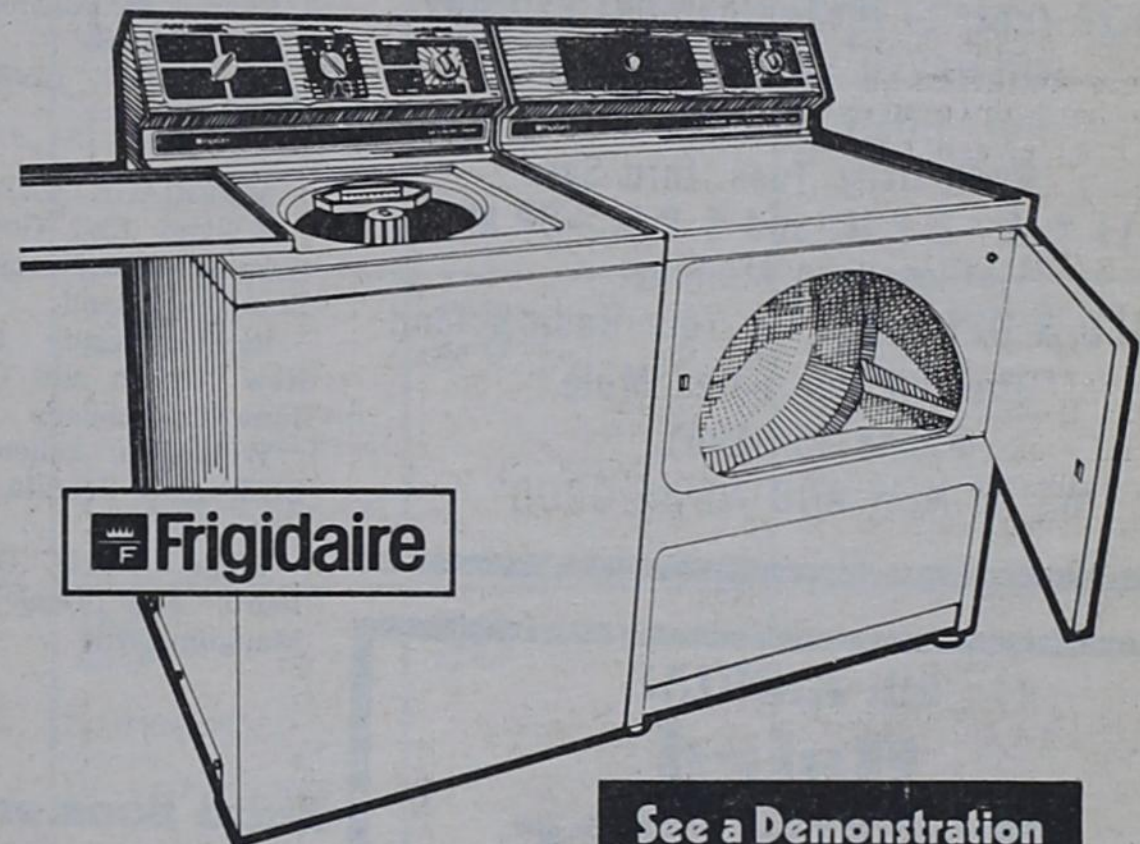

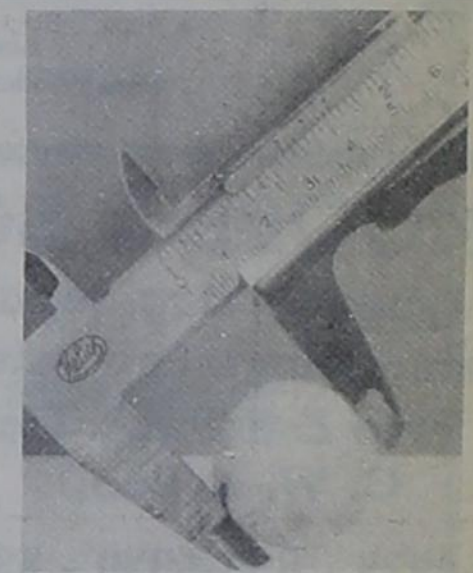

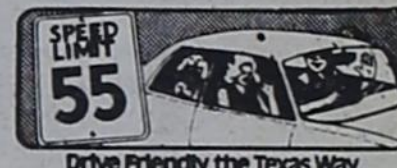
