Stock Show Features Quality And Quantity for 25th Edition

An unusually strong beef division pushed entries in the 25th Annual Hico Livestock Show past the 300 mark last Friday, as exhibitors and spectators basked in 80-plus degree weather to witness one of the finest quality shows ever staged here.

Eighty-four beef animals paraded before Judge Bill Scott of Abilene, and the official had nothing but praise for all classes. The division was exceptionally strong. Scott said at conclusion that the show was perhaps the finest he had viewed all year, and the event was "big" in every respect.

An equally strong sheep division which numbered 84 indicated that phase of the livestock industry was coming back after several lean years, and 61 entries in the dairy show revealed the worth of that industry to the area. The number of goat entries also told the story of mohair prices, as only seven were in the field. Dog entries were also up in that popular division,

numbering 26.

In the beef division, Herefords from Hillsboro copped the big honors, as Allen & Finch showed the grand champion bull, and Mike Allen pulled down the same honors in the female category. A Decatur lass, Debra Reeves, showed a prime cross-bred steer to the heavy-weight steer championship, and Susan Lewallen of Glen Rose exhibited the lightweight steer champion.

In the dairy division, Hico's own Debbie Bell exhibited the Brown Swiss grand champion, and Cynthia Traweck of Stephenville had the top Holstein. A. D. Wheat of Cleburne was judge for this portion of the show.

Swine division grand champions were exhibited by Joe Riley of Dublin, champion boar, and Valiene Churney, also of Stephenville with the champion female.

There was no contest in the goat division, as Faron Kincheole of Evant had six of the seven entries,

and copped both grand championships. Other entry was a week-old youngster that was shown by Pattie Griffin.

Ronald Shadden of Hico showed the grand champion Rambouillet ewe, while older brother Randy showed the reserve champion. Ram in that division was shown by Danny Whisenhunt of Mullin.

Rickey Wiedenbush of Pottsville showed the Delaine champions. In the big Suffolk division, James Akard of Olin had the champion ewe, and Danny Whisenhunt of Mullin had the champion ram. Whisenhunt also showed the champion ram and ewe in the Other Breeds division.

Competition was stiff in the dog show, with Jackie Putty the only Hico winner. Her dog was shown by Melanie Turner, and won the Toy class. Bobby Pettijohn, address unknown, won the Sporting division, and an entry by Danny Prater won the Work category.

- Boiled Cake
1/2-cup sweet milk
4 tablespoons butter
Let milk and butter come to a boil and pour over a mixture of:
2 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
Fourth teaspoon salt
Mix well (batter will be thin), and bake in an 8" by 8" square glass or metal pan for 25 minutes at 350 degrees.

- Frosting
1 cup brown sugar
3 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons cream
1 cup coconut
Mix the first three ingredients together, and let come to a boil, add coconut, and pour over the cake while it is still in the cake pan. Place under the broiler until golden brown.





Social Security Questions & Answers.

Question: I am age 56 and totally disabled. My husband is not in good health either. I have never worked. If my husband was to die, would I be eligible for any social security?

Answer: If a widow has no children in her care under age 18 and is age 50 or over, then she may qualify for benefits as a disabled widow. This would be decided by medical records showing the severity of the person's condition.

Question: I will retire in a few months and start collecting social security retirement benefits. Will I have to pay Federal income tax on these monthly benefits?

Answer: No. You do not have to pay Federal income tax on social security benefits.

Deadline Near for Medicare Sign-Up

March 31 is a very important date for many individuals in Central Texas, Jack Calvert, district manager of the Temple social security office said. Those persons that are over age 65 and who are not enrolled in the supplementary medical doctor bill insurance part of Medicare may lose their last chance to get this insurance if they do not enroll by that date.

A person who reached age 65 in September 1968 or earlier and has never signed up for this medical insurance coverage is no longer eligible. Anyone who reached age 65 in October 1968 through September 1969 and has never signed up for this insurance must enroll

before March 31, or they will never be able to get the insurance later, Calvert cautioned.

Individuals who had the supplementary medical doctor bill insurance part of Medicare terminated may be eligible to sign up one more time. This depends on when they were terminated, and their present age, Calvert added.
