## CITY & SCHOOL—

### Two Elections Set Saturday

Hico voters are not expected to flock to the polls Saturday, when two important elections will be held.

Neither of the two—City or School Trustee—are contested.

Both elections will be held at City Hall, with polls opening at 8 a.m.

In the city election, a mayor and three aldermen will be named, and only names on the ballot are those of the incumbents—O. L. Davis, mayor, and W. C. Howard, Ray Keller, and Roy Bates, aldermen.

In the school balloting, incumbents Derel Fillingim and Dr. B. C. Dayton are seeking re-election, with V. H. Jenkins asking for another term as County Trustee from Precinct 3, and Lagree West of Hamilton running for re-election to the At-Large post.

#### Iredell City Election.

At Iredell, a blank ballot will face voters, as no candidates filed for the mayor's post or the two aldermen seats to be filled. Residents are asked to write in their choices to fill the city government positions.

### Deadline Near For Voter Registration

Mrs. Pearl Williams, County tax assessor-collector, said last week that 3,864 residents of the county had registered to vote in 1972 elections. Of these, 188 fall in the 18-to-21 year-old category.

Not all of these voters registered in time to be eligible to vote in city and school elections, which will be held April 1, but most of

them did, according to Mrs. Williams.

Deadline for voting absentee in these elections was March 28.

Mrs. Williams pointed out that the deadline for registering to vote in the primary election May 6 is drawing near. Voters must register by April 6 or forfeit their right to vote in primaries. They may register later and be eligible to vote in the November election, provided they register at least 30 days prior to that election.

Another deadline also approaching is that for purchasing 1972 vehicle license plates. This deadline is Saturday midnight, April 1.

License plates may be obtained at the tax office in Hamilton, or from Hico Motor Company here.

The contest site was located on the Dr. W. F. Hafer ranch south of Hico.

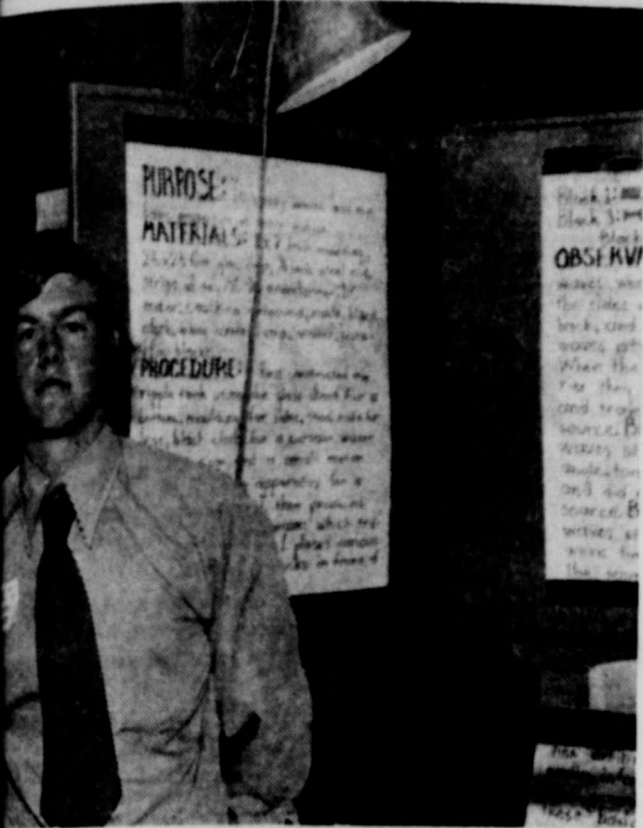
O. C. King, Chairman of the Hamilton-Coryell SCD, presented high point individuals in each contest with a pocket knife. Walter

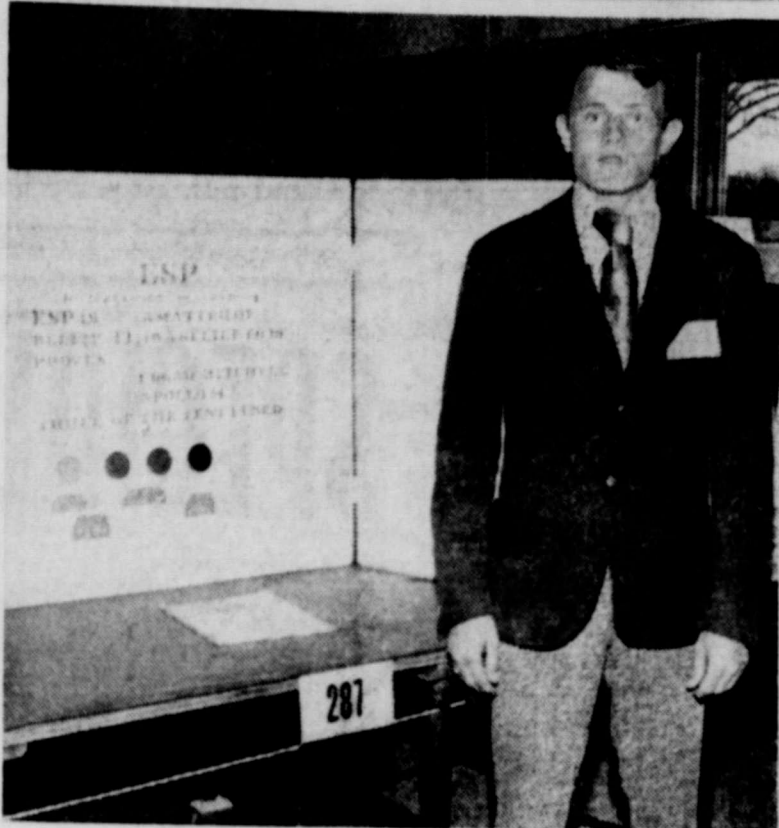


JUDGING CONTESTANTS—identifying grasses, determining range condition and treatment needs was a part of the land, pasture and range judging con-

### Census Shows 1179 Farms in County

Hamilton County showed a total of 1,179 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U. S. Dept. of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the Department's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 1,049.

Of the county's total farms in 1969, 683 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 538 in 1964.

The report also shows average size farm in the county was 430.5 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$37,287.

Other figures from the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969—\$9,798,422; in 1964, \$7,459,250.
2. Value of all crops sold in 1969—\$738,190; in 1964—\$1,357,598.
3. Value of all livestock, poultry and their products sold in 1969—\$9,060,112; in 1964—\$6,096,698.

Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500
