City, School Elections 'Ho-Hum'

With no opposition in either the city or school trustee elections held last Saturday, people took a "ho-hum" attitude and turned out in pitifully small numbers.

Only 44 votes were cast in the school balloting, with incumbents Derel Fillingim and Dr. B. C. Dayton receiving all 44. The same applied to V. H. Jenkins for county trustee, Precinct 3, and Lagree West for the at-large post.

An even lesser number turned out for the City election, with 36 people casting ballots.

Mayor O. L. Davis and Aldermen W. C. Howard, Ray Keller and Roy Bates all received 36 votes in returning to office.

Former Carlton Man, Dock Sharp, Promoted at Andrews

Z. L. (Dock) Sharp, formerly of Carlton, has recently been promoted to Senior Field Representative, Lands and Oils division of the University of Texas System.

Mr. Sharp's new duties will consist of overseeing of surface leasing, oil field supervision, geophysical exploration, damages to the surface, right of way easements and material sources.

The University of Texas lands consist of 2,209,000 acres in West Texas. Of this there are 136 ranches. Surface is leased to them by UT. Included in the holdings are 5,630 oil wells and 153 gas wells, which are leased by oil operators that pay royalty to the University.

Sharp, who has worked for UT the past 17 years in Andrews, has many relatives in this area, and is married to the former Ramona Ellenburg of Lamkin. They have a 12-year-old daughter, Nancy Jane.

The Sharps will continue to reside in Andrews where Mrs. Sharp is employed by the school system.

Football 'Great', Bill Glass, Will Be Evangelist

A giant religious movement, tabbed "The Greater Hamilton County Crusade for Christ," begins Wednesday, April 12 at Hamilton's Kookan Field, with services nightly at 7:30 through Sunday, April 16.

Dynamic Bill Glass, former All-American football player at Baylor University, and later an All-Pro selection with the Cleveland Browns, is evangelist for the Crusade.

Other celebrities who will appear during the 5-night Crusade are Everett S. "Bunny" Martin, Dallas Cowboy Coach Tom Landry, and Jim Ray Smith, another All-American gridder at Baylor and professional football star.

Martin, world champion with the yo-yo, will appear Wednesday night. He is a Christian educator, master magician, and outstanding musical entertainer.

Landry, who guided the Dallas Cowboys to a world championship, is a former football great at University of Texas and the New York Giants. He is a leader in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Smith, Baylor All-American, later starred with the Cleveland Browns and Dallas Cowboys, and has five All-Star Pro Bowl games to his credit. He is a past president of Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Glass is now a fulltime layman in Crusade Evangelism. John Underwood, Sports Illustrated writer, said of Glass: "Bill Glass has been known to raise knots on half-backs on Sunday afternoon and goose pimples on his congregation on Sunday night."

Billy Graham says: "Bill Glass speaks frankly and pulls no punches—he knows young people."

A native of Texarkana, graduated from Baylor University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He pursued a professional football career until his retirement in 1969. He is married to the former Mavis Knapp, and they have three children.

Majority of Landowners Are Opposing Hiking Trail

Ronnie Jones of Austin represented the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission at a meeting held recently in Claiborne Community Center.

Purpose of the meeting was to review a proposed project to develop a hiking and horseback riding trail from Dublin to Walnut Springs, the proposed trail following what Jones called, the abandoned Texas Central Railroad right of way. Majority of that right of way has been purchased by adjoining landowners since the abandonment a few years ago.

Mr. Jones stated that there were 67 landowners between Dublin and Walnut Springs.

"After listening to the explanation by Mr. Jones, and to answers given questions asked by landowners attending the meeting, it seemed evident that there was much

opposition to the trail," according to Mrs. John Golightly, one of the landowners present.

Mrs. Golightly continued, "A majority of the persons who own the property (formerly owned by the Railroad Company) have petitioned members of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission to consider the proposed trail from the landowners position. The tremendous inconvenience in operations of farms and ranches with the trail in the center of the property, or even to one side of the property, is a major factor. The decreased value of the property with such a trail on it must be given high consideration."

"One landowner suggested that it seemed more feasible to buy 6,000 acres and develop trails, build camping facilities, etc., than to develop 42 miles 100 feet wide through the middle of the best farm land in Erath, Hamilton and Bosque counties," Mrs. Golightly commented.

Routine Council Meeting Monday

Hico City Council met Monday night, with routine business main order of the session.

Bills were read and approved, and Mrs. Bess Lackey, secretary, noted that expenses for the month of March amounted to \$6,102.42. Mrs. Lackey also told councilmen that sales tax receipts for the fourth quarter amounted to \$3,517.09 and fines paid were \$273.95.

Mrs. Lackey gave a composite report of finances and expenditures for the fiscal year ending March 31, and comparative figures to the previous year.

A request from Cypress Cable

TV (formerly Telcoa) to re-assign its franchise in Hico to Cypress TV, Incorporated was approved after motion by Roy Bates and second by W. C. Howard.

Mayor Davis gave a lengthy report on cost of operating present city lighting facilities, and compared these costs with new rates which would be effective when present incandescent fixtures were changed to the modern vapor lights. The new rates will be considerably less. The center-street lighting standards were also discussed, and the mayor noted that seven new standards would be erected the length of Main Street.

City Superintendent W. R. Hampton said that the new water well being drilled in the eastern section of town was progressing, with the well down to 118 feet through Monday.

Other discussions centered around the new office building, a city-owned lot fronting Highway 281, and the 25c assessment being charged on water bills to amortize indebtedness on the Bosque River bridge.

Councilmen also certified election returns, and officials were administered the oath of office by the Secretary before adjournment.
