Cancer Crusade Fund Drive Slated Here Tuesday Night

"If someone invented a drug that would cure half the present cases of cancer, the excitement would be beyond belief. We have such a drug. It is communication!" stated A. V. Abernethy, County Cancer Crusade Chairman.

Hamilton County will launch the 1972 Residential Crusade Tuesday evening, April 18. The drive at Hico will get underway at 6 o'clock and will be announced by the sounding of the fire alarm. Business and rural drives are already underway in the area.

Local ladies will knock on the doors of their neighbors and friends. Volunteers will distribute information concerning the fight against cancer and collect funds to support the American Cancer Society's programs of research, education, and service to cancer patients.

Mrs. Lamar Johanson is business

chairman for Hico. Residential chairman is Miss Louise Blair. Miss Blair will be at the City Hall Tuesday evening to collect donations from volunteer workers, including Mrs. N. N. Akin, Mrs. D. E. Included in the hand-out materials is a list of cancer's warning signals with a reminder that discovery of cancer during these early stages is the most curable period. A warning signal indicates that cancer may be present (it more frequently indicates a condition far less serious). But it should always mean a visit to the doctor. Only

he can determine if it is cancer. The warning signals are:

1. Change in bowel or bladder habits.
2. A sore that does not heal.
3. Unusual bleeding or discharge.
4. Thickening or lump in breast or elsewhere.
5. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
6. Obvious change in wart or mole.
7. Naggling cough or hoarseness.

First letters of these signals spell "Caution."

There for the 1972 Crusade Against Cancer is "We Want to Wipe Out Cancer in Your Lifetime."

"With adequate donations to the American Cancer Society, Hamilton County may be on the way to seeing the theme become a reality," Mr. Abernethy stated.

Bulloch Named Precinct Chairman

D. E. Bulloch has been appointed chairman of Precinct 7 voting box in Hico for the Democratic Primary election, following the resignation of Louise Blair recently.

The appointment was made by Leo F. Rendessy, Hamilton County Democratic Chairman and is effective immediately.

Rendessy has also outlined some instructions that should help voters in the party primaries May 6. His instructions, intended to help voters in the primary who do not know laws in regard to voting, follows:

"First of all those having Voter Registration Certificates must sign their signatures as called for on the bottom line. If you will do this it will help the clerks on election day.

"There shall be kept at each polling place a signature roster of persons offering to vote at the election. Each person offering to vote shall sign the roster if he is able to do so, otherwise the clerk will help those that cannot write. If the voter has presented his registration certificate, the election officer shall compare the signature on the roster with the signature

on the certificate to see that it is the same. Then you will be given a ballot to vote.

"In previous elections, many votes were not counted for several reasons. One was that the voter failed to mark the ballot correctly. When voting for the candidate of your choice on the ballot, be sure to mark an 'X' in the small box in front of the candidate's name, or your vote will not be counted.

"When there is only one candidate in the race for an office that box in front of the name must be marked with an 'X,'" Mr. Rendessy concluded.

Roy Crist, brother of Ed Crist of Hico, and a former Hico resident, was buried Monday morning after funeral services held in Denison.

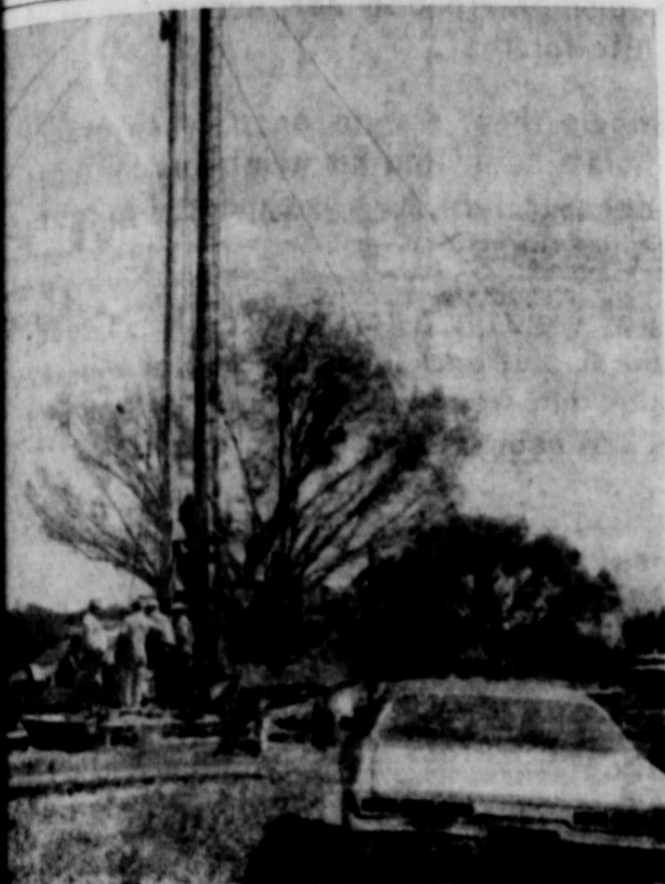
Mr. Crist was a retired Katy Railroad employee.

As a reminder—only two more days until Income Tax Dead- line. If you are a little irritated about paying so much in taxes, you may enjoy reading these little excerpts:

For all golfers, pool players, TV watchers—in fact anybody who has any time to spare, the following might be worth mulling over:

Whatever you spend, you must earn.

Whatever your children spend, you must earn.

Whatever local, state and federal governments spend, you must

be sure you keep earning. Lots of people, both related and not to you, depend on your earning ability."

There was the fellow who wrote his Congressman about high taxes. He wrote:

"I was born in a public housing unit. He went to public schools and participated in the free lunch program. He served in the Army and upon his discharge, retained his National Life Insurance. He enrolled in the State University, working part-time in the Capitol to supplement his GI education check. Upon graduation, he obtained a Public Health nurse and bought a home with a loan, then obtained a Small Business Loan to go into business. His baby was born in the City Hospital. He bought a small ranch and was aided by the Veteran's Land Program and obtained emergency money from the government. Later he put part of his land in the Soil Conservation Service and payments soon paid off his ranch. His father and mother were very comfortable on their Social Security checks.

He wrote his Congressman:

"I wish to protest these excessive governmental expenditures and the resultant high taxes. I believe in rugged individualism. I think I should stand on their own feet without expecting a handout. I am opposed to all Socialistic trends and I demand a return to the Constitution of the United States of America."

Here is a different version of the children's classic, "The Little Red Hen":

"Upon a time, there was a little red hen who scratched about and covered some grains of wheat. She called her barnyard neighbors and said, 'If we work together and plant this wheat, we will have some fine bread to eat. Who will help me plant this wheat?'"

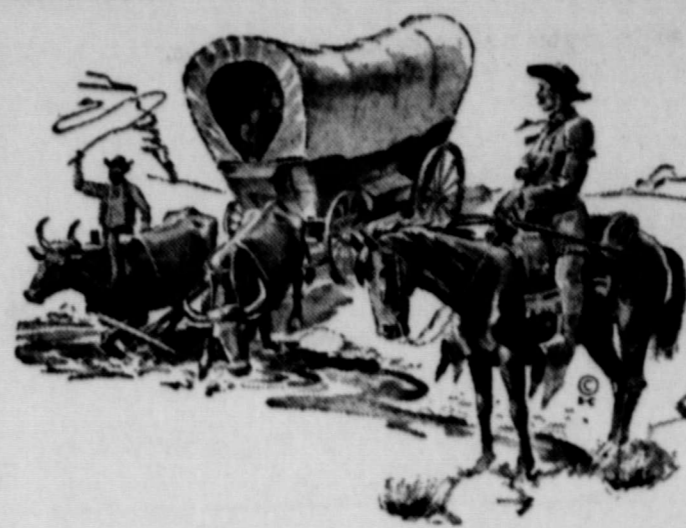

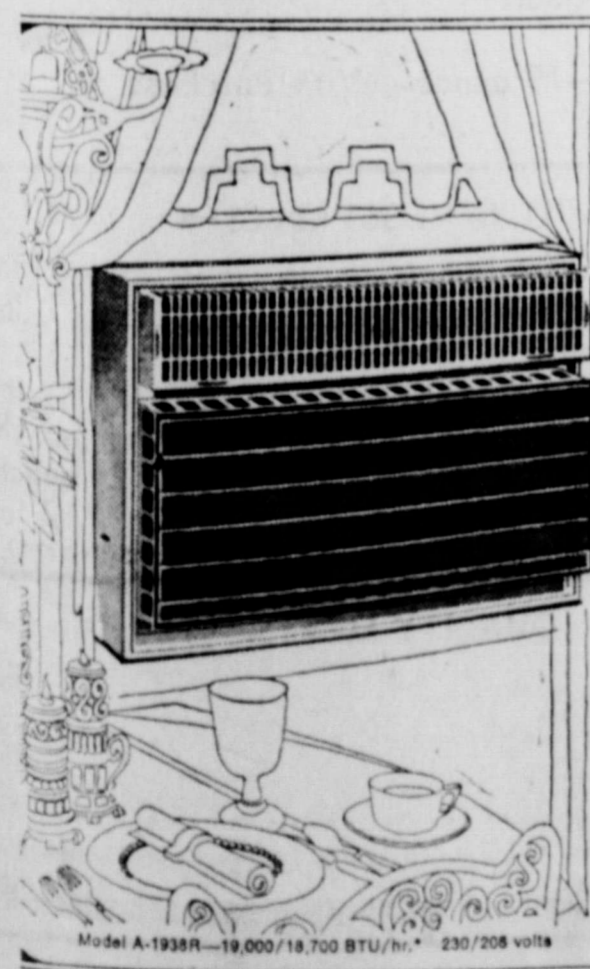

"Economy and honesty in government starts with the man elected," said Grant Jones, pointing out that his spending of expense money, automatically available to each legislator, was the lowest of any member of the House of Representatives at the last audit. His spending of our money for expenses has consistently been with the lowest.

Grant Jones said he thinks "each spending or taxing proposal must be examined as carefully as possible to determine the impact on the taxpayer."

1. An example of his "economy thinking" is the work he did on a bill so that deserving students can receive state tuition money to attend private colleges. Jones said this saves taxpayers money over expanding and building fully tax-supported schools.

2. Jones said he believes Texas must build and strengthen vocational Texas State Technical Institute because Texas has a critical need for technical skills.

"Because I am sensitive to our economy," said Jones, "I do not favor a state income tax—corporate or personal. Forty of 44 states that have adopted corporate income taxes have found it necessary to broaden the income tax to a corporate and personal tax within a very short time. Twenty-seven within the same year."

Jones said another reason he is against a state income tax is because it would slow down the growth of business and industry in Texas and the creation of good jobs would be slowed down.

"Of course I am for good job opportunities," Jones said, "and recognize the right of employees to form or to join a union; however, I strongly support the Texas right to work law because I feel that no employer should have the right to enter into contract that requires workers to pay dues to a union in order to retain or obtain a job."

"I am sure that workers and employers alike, as well as other citizens, are most concerned about the rising cost of insurance," Jones said. "I pledge to you that I will continue to work to improve our insurance laws to provide the needed and necessary coverage at the lowest possible cost."

Grant Jones promised to continue to work for Constitutional reforms and Legislative procedural reforms to improve state government.

Jones said he recognizes the use of alcohol is a fact of life today. "However, I believe Texas must keep drunk drivers off the road, even though I also recognize that drunk drivers and problem drinkers may be sick and need help." During his entire legislative career, Grant Jones has been a supporter of laws to reduce abuse of alcohol.

Grant Jones was elected to the 59th Legislature and has been re-elected to four terms since then. He has served on State Affairs Committee, Constitutional Amendments Committee, Banks and Banking, Higher Education, Privileges, Suffrages and Elections and as Chairman of the Claims and Accounts Committee and the Urban Affairs Committee. He also served two terms on the Legislative Council.

As a matter of background, Jones comes from a family that produced Texas pioneer leaders. He is a native of Abilene and educated in the Abilene schools. His studies at SMU were interrupted by World War II and he flew as a pilot in the European and South American Theaters.

After World War II he returned to SMU and received his BBA degree. He earned his masters of business administration degree from the graduate division of the University of Pennsylvania.

Presently a partner in Abtex Insurance, an independent agency, Jones has served as president of

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Lawn management chores such as fertilization, mowing and watering are again beginning to occupy considerable spare time of homeowners.

With temperatures beginning to climb and a shortage of soil moisture in many areas, maintenance of the lawn can be a perplexing job.

However, by following certain basic maintenance practices, an attractive lawn can be maintained with a minimum of problems.

First, adequate amounts of plant food are important to keep a lawn green and to maintain growth and health of the grass. Start by applying a complete fertilizer in the spring as the grass begins to grow.

During the summer, an application of nitrogen every 30 to 40 days will keep the lawn green and growing.

Another application of a complete fertilizer in the fall about one month before the first frost will put the lawn in good shape for winter.

Well-fertilized grass is able to withstand dry weather considerably better than grass that is hungry.

Nitrogen is a key fertilizer element in turf production, says the agent. If deficient, plant growth will become stunted and a condition called "firing" will develop.

Lack of phosphorous will retard growth, and shortage of potassium will likewise inhibit plant growth and vigor. There must be a balance of these nutrients.

As rainfall becomes inadequate, waterings must be increased to supply needed moisture. Do not water the grass until it begins to show a need. Then soak the soil to depth of eight or more inches to maintain a good turf root system.

Frequent shallow waterings should be avoided.

In regard to mowing, be careful against scalping the lawn if it is not mowed often. Removing a lot of growth at one time is detrimental to the grass.

Close mowing will cause the grass to produce a lot of leaves very low to the ground. This produces an attractive and dense sod.

Since most homeowners do not mow more often than once every week or ten days, they should mow at some greater height to avoid scalping the grass too severely.

Livestock owners should be on the lookout for any possible cases of screwworms. Hamilton County has recorded its first case for 1972.

For those of you who like hot breads, and who doesn't. Mrs. Early Shepherd has submitted her very good recipe for Ice Box Rolls.

Mrs. Shepherd said this has been her favorite roll recipe for years. She passed it along to her daughter, Mrs. J. W. Greene of Big Spring, who is known as such a good cook she was interviewed for a feature story in the Big Spring Herald. The story included Mrs. Greene's picture and some of her favorite recipes, including the hot rolls. Hope you enjoy it.

Ice Box Rolls
1 pkg. of dry yeast or 1 yeast cake
One-half cup sugar
2 cups lukewarm water
3 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons shortening (melted)
Put dry yeast or yeast cake in bowl. Add sugar, salt, and water to dissolve. Sift flour once before measuring. Add half of the flour and beat well. Add melted shortening, then remainder of flour. Let rise to double its bulk. Form into rolls and bake at 400 degrees.

For refrigerator rolls, when dough is double its bulk, place in refrigerator overnight. Three hours before serving take dough out and form in rolls and let rise.

Warm weather brings thoughts of cool, crisp, nutritious salads. A salad can introduce a meal, complement a meal, end a meal or even be the complete meal in itself.

Of all greens used for salad making, lettuce is by far the most popular. It has become an important item in today's meal patterns.

Weather can really play havoc with the best of manmade plans for producing lettuce for a pre-selected harvest date. Unusually high or low temperatures or amounts of moisture can easily result in the bunching or maturing of different production areas, and thus overload the market.

Iceberg lettuce commercially is the most important of salad greens. It keeps exceptionally well. Iceberg lettuce has a springy-firm head, is ideal to shred, slice or tear into bite-size pieces and its outer leaves remove for sandwich use or as a background for other salad ingredients.

If head lettuce becomes wilted or dries out, it can be re-freshened by placing the head (after it has

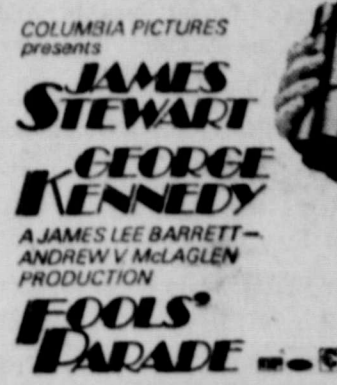
been cored) in cold water with some ice cubes for several minutes. Separate the leaves, drain, wrap and store in a film bag in the hydrator of your refrigerator.

Lettuce is a true friend of weight-watchers. A one-pound of iceberg lettuce supplies 47 calories. Two large small leaves provide seven calories.

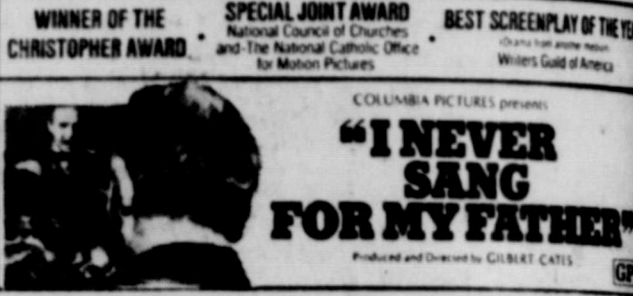
