Dairy organizations have fed at least \$11,500 to the "D. C. Friends of Bob Poage," a fund for the House Agriculture Committee's chairman, Rep. W. R. Poage, D-Texas. His former law office is running it from a downtown law suite.

Poage, who got his \$11,500 in just three days from three dairy funds known as TAPE, SPACE and ADEPT. (The same groups came under fire last year for rich donations to hidden committees for President Nixon, made after the government eased milk price supports.) Poage's former top aide, Robert O'Neal, said he solicited the dairy money for the D. C. fund set up in his law office. He wouldn't give any total for all contributions. Poage, 72, faces his first serious election threat in 1974.

In Israel the importance of getting more water was a question of survival. The amount of rain varies and no total amount is great. Originally the nation imported food but now it produces most of its food, using new techniques and reclaiming land. Now much of the land produces from three to four crops annually. Poultry and vegetables are exported. Hundreds of water projects, small and large, are undertaken.

Pumps are built underground to Lake Kinneret (O. T. Sea of Galilee) to protect that water supply from air raids. Desalination plants have been built. For fresh water Israel needs to go south.

The securing of more water in Israel has brought about what is called the Green Revolution. This caused miracles in the fields. Unfortunately the large land owners keep the peasants in line with whips. Share croppers also suffer. In working for somebody else, they receive some help, but it is not equalized among them.

In Egypt, the Nile River has always been the main source of water supply. It has been called the life blood of Egypt. In times of flooding the farmers had only one crop a year.

The Aswan Dam was opened officially last January, and now with flood control, three or four annual crops are possible.

Lake Nasser, created by water behind the dam, is a great fishing area. Also electricity is generated by water power, making it possible for children to study at night by a dependable light.

The Aswan Dam is 2 miles long, one mile thick, and over 600 feet high. Possibly its construction has opened up Pandora's box. The town of Aswan has changed completely. There is no silt now with which to build new homes. Fish are no longer available for food. Malarial mosquitoes are also present. Snails that harbor disease-bearing parasites are numerous. Some persons were made homeless because of the dam. The 35,000 workers who came to work on the dam were reluctant to return home after the completion of construction, leaving their families behind. We are eager for their husband's permanent return tried to hold them child-bearing. This birth rate will wipe out much of the benefits the dam.

The dam was built with \$180 million loaned by Russia and technical assistance from both Russia and the United States.

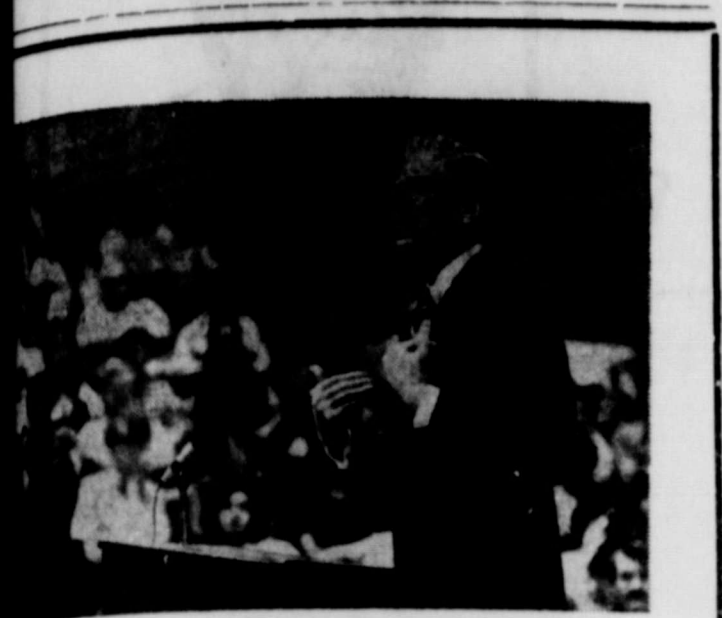

tion in good eating. The bright red juicy and tasty berries catch your eye in the field, the market or the moment they're brought into the home.

Their appeal grows as the berries are transformed into attractive, simply prepared dishes of strawberries and cream, shortcakes, cereal toppings, pies, sauces and cakes. In earlier years the strawberry season lasted only a short time. Homemakers had to work hard and fast to preserve the berries for winter use.

Things have changed a bit. We now have fresh berries available, to more extent, the year round. Still the excitement over the first berries—lusciously ripe from vines in nearby gardens—can't be excelled.

A hidden bonus in strawberry eating lies in their nutritive value. Fresh or frozen, they rate high in vitamin C. A half-cup of strawberries—a dish of strawberries and cream or a large piece of strawberry pie—provides the minimum daily dietary needs of this important vitamin. And strawberries that ripen on the plant contain more vitamin C than those picked half-ripe and held until fully ripe.

When buying strawberries, look for berries with full red color and a bright luster. The flesh should be firm and the cap stem still attached. The berries should be dry and clean. Usually medium to small sizes have better eating quality than the large ones.

It's wise to avoid buying berries with large uncolored or "seedy" areas. These are signs of poor flavor and texture. A dull, shrunken appearance or softness are signs of over-ripeness or decay. Also, watch for berries with mold which can spread rapidly from one berry to another.

Because fresh strawberries are so delicate, handle them carefully to avoid bruising. Empty the berries into a shallow tray, and sort out the damaged or decayed ones. Cover loosely with wax paper and store in the refrigerator.

Just before serving, wash the berries in cold water and drain dry. Remove caps after the berries are clean and dry. Serve them as soon after purchase as possible—within one or two days.

Prentice Sikes Rites Held in Levelland

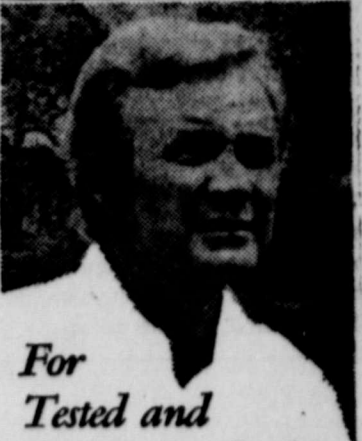

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Last week we had a lot of thunder and lightning in our area. Sometimes we forget how dangerous it can be. Lightning can be a killer on and off the farm.

It can strike the metal roof of a barn and kill someone on the inside. It can travel as far as two miles along an ungrounded fence, electrocuting livestock touching it or just standing close. It can burn your house and outbuildings to the ground and bring death to a man on his tractor.

Lightning causes more than 80 percent of all livestock losses due to accidents and is a major cause of farm fires. It is responsible for millions of dollars worth of damage and destruction every year.

Lightning is a gigantic, uncontrolled, split-second surge of electric current. It's 10 million to 100 million volts is so great that a bolt may leap a mile or more through the air. But with knowledge, technical know-how and plain common sense, people can dramatically lower lightning's grim toll.

First of all, everybody, especially the farmer, should have a basic understanding of just what lightning is and the havoc it can create. Then he needs the help of an expert in planning and installing a lightning protection system for his buildings, fences and chosen trees. An old protection system may fail to do its job if it hasn't been inspected and repaired recently.

Lone trees and farm buildings are prime lightning targets. They provide the only "ladder" in the area for the positive ground charges to climb nearer the negative cloud charges. Lightning strikes trees, buildings or other objects because the materials in them are better electrical conductors (easier paths to the ground) than air. In a grove of trees or a cluster of buildings, lightning is most likely to strike the object that is either the best conductor, nearest the approaching cloud, or the tallest one in the group. A farmer plowing his field is vulnerable because the metallic plow in the ground and the tractor form an excellent lightning conductor.

To ground wire fences set galvanized steel posts into the ground at 150 foot intervals or drive a half inch steel rod or pipe into the ground every 150 feet alongside the wooden posts. Leave a few inches of the rod or pipe above the post and make sure all the fence wires touch the ground rod or pipe.

Lightning can enter a building in four ways: a direct stroke, striking a metal object extending out from the building, hitting a nearby tree and leaping over to the building to find a better path to the ground, and striking and following a power line or an ungrounded wire fence attached to the building.

Four out of every five human deaths or injuries from lightning happen in rural areas. And more people are killed or hurt in unprotected homes than in any other location. However, stay inside the house during an electrical storm, even if you do not have a lightning protection system. Keep away from metal objects such as water faucets, appliances, the telephone, prefabricated fire places, stove and metal window frames.

If caught outdoors during an electrical storm, just about the worst places to be are on horseback, in an open vehicle or on a tractor, especially if attached equipment is in the ground. Stay in a closed truck or automobile if possible. If you can't do this, lie down in a low spot or under a rock ledge. Stay away from lone trees, hilltops, wire fences, poles and small unprotected buildings.
