After 40 years as a first grade teacher, the last 33 at Hico, Mrs. R. B. Jackson will retire at the end of the current year. May 23 will be her last day and will also be the 48th wedding anniversary of her and her husband.

On May 23, 1926, Miss Berniece Risinger was married to Robert B. Jackson. She had only a half year of college work but her ambition was to become a first grade school teacher. From that time until 1953, Mrs. Jackson continued her education and she and her husband attended college part of every summer until she received a masters degree in Elementary Education.

Mrs. Jackson taught her first year at Rock Hill in Shackelford County and three years each at Shive and Springdale in Hamilton County, before coming to Hico as a teacher.

Her husband, a former teacher, retired two years ago as Hico postmaster after serving 28 years.

What are the Jacksons' plans now that both are retired? They are going to do some traveling, and will visit more often with their grandchildren in Florida.

Hudson said the change was necessary due to cuts in the clerk hours allotted the office. These and other cuts are going into effect all over the United States in an attempt to cut the postal deficit without another raise in postal rates.

A raise in postage rates for the first of the year had been considered, but rather than increase postage, Postmaster General Klassen has ordered a cut-back on the operating costs of all offices without an impairment in service.

Tornado Rips Area Thursday Night

A tornado which ripped through the Eastern part of Hamilton County last Thursday night did considerable damage to several buildings.

The excessive winds were accompanied by heavy rain and hail in some portions of the tornado path.

Apparently touching down first at the Derel Fillingim place, the funnel ripped through one chicken house and damaged another.

The narrow path continued on across the Bosque River to the M. I. Knudson and Frank Griffiths places. At the Knudson farm, the tornado barely missed a house and demolished a garage. Force of the wind tore a light meter from the house. Trees and an out-building were blown down at the Griffiths place.

The tornado continued on a North-Easterly path, touching down at the Roy Ackison farm where a hay shed and small out-building were blown down. Adkison also reported hail as large as hen eggs fell during the storm.

The tornado dipped to the ground again at the E. R. Vosburg farm, destroying a 120x200-foot shed, and broke telephone and power lines.

There was probably other damage not reported to the News Review.

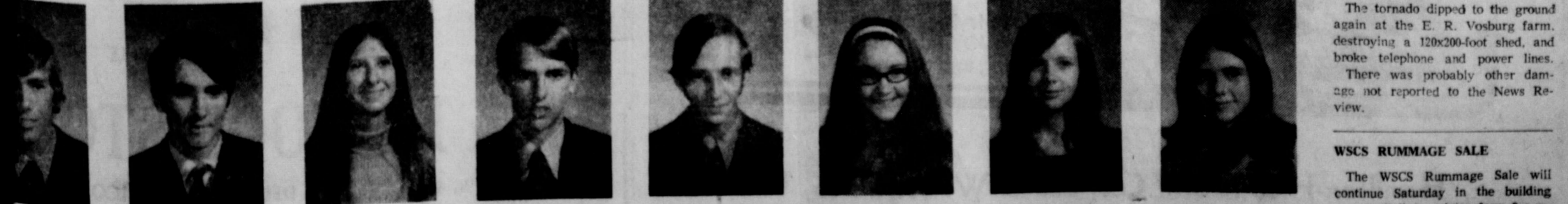
Elementary Graduation

up and we decided we better get home. While at the Johnsville Cemetery a young couple came to put out some flowers at her parents grave.
