Sheila Polk, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Durwood Polk, was the first entry received. Her sponsor is Jackson's Superette.

Mrs. Clifton will be assisted in staging the contest by Mrs. Linda Koonsman, Mrs. Devonna Ellenburg, Mrs. Vickie Casey, Mrs. Mary Scott, Mrs. Jean Jackson and Mrs. Dianne Stone.

In announcing rules for the contest, Mrs. Clifton said: "It's time to start making plans to enter the Miss Reunion Contest. The pageant will be held Friday, July 28. Any young lady interested in entering should contact me. Entry blanks will be at local businesses for each contestant. The entry blank and \$3.00 entry fee is to be given to Mrs. Delbert Jackson."

Mrs. Clifton said that there would also be a Little Miss Contest, and those wishing to enter should contact Mrs. Jerry Casey.

She underwent surgery Tuesday night at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene. She had sustained multiple injuries, including both legs broken.

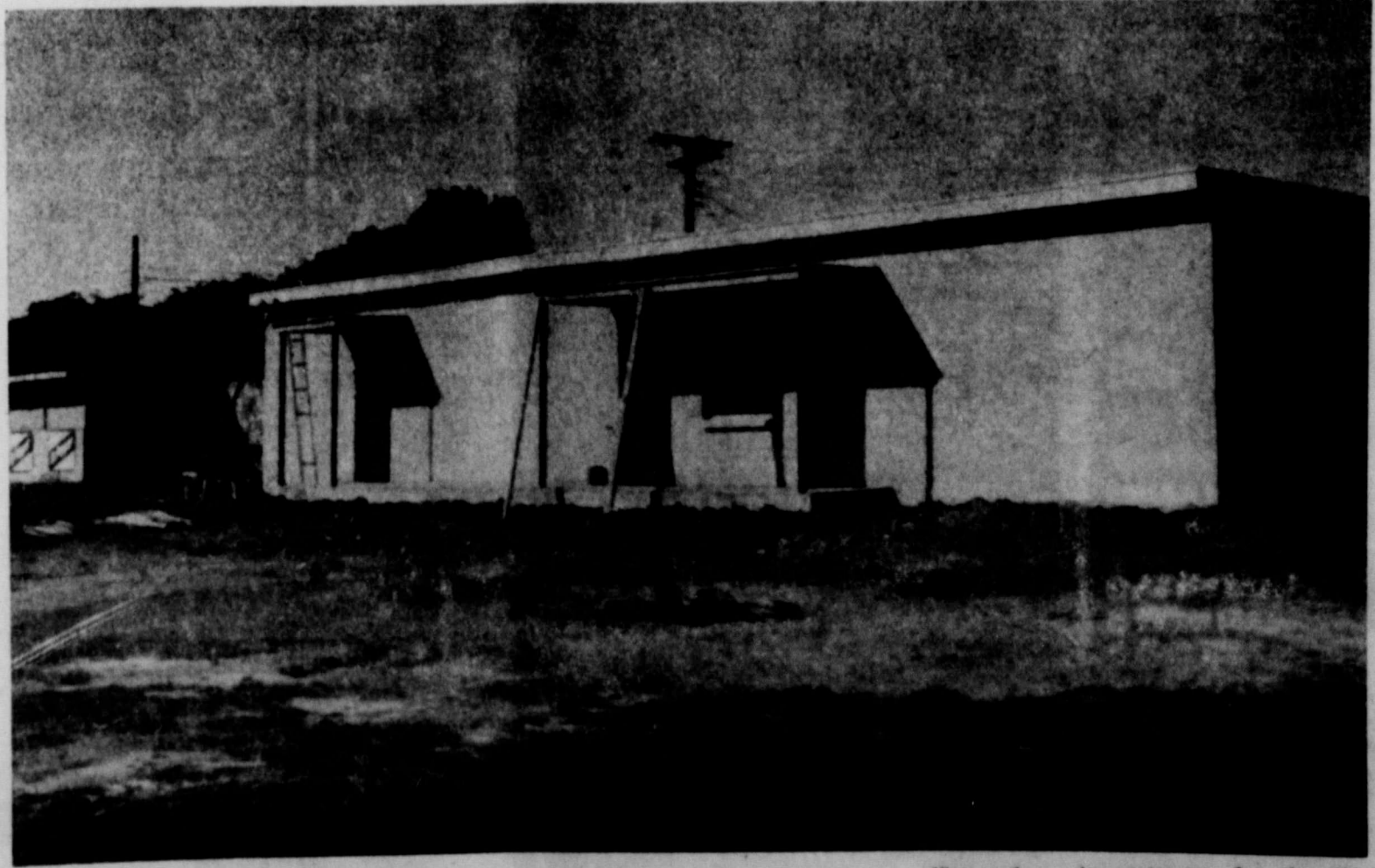

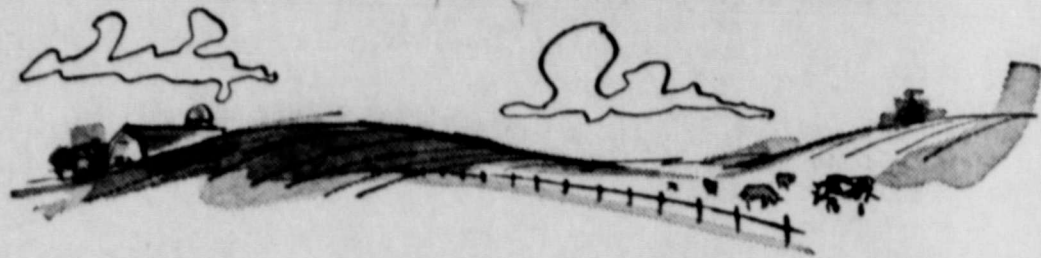

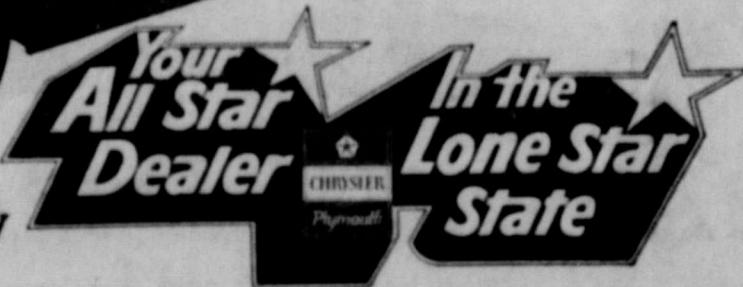

Newman, dug the first deep well about 1905-06. Later Millree Parks, Sid Jenkins and Ed Allison drilled a partnership well and furnished the town water. This was after the death of my father. Well, there's just a lot of history connected to our little town, and glad Mr. Goyne was thoughtful enough to write it down while he was younger, for we surely can forget things as we grow older. However we are very thankful for what we can remember of the past 75 years.
