Contest Rules.

Two divisions will be held, a Miss division for girls age 14-18 and the regular senior division for girls age 14-18.

Both divisions are open to any girl. Local area is considered Hico and trade territory, including Iredell, Fairly, Duffau, Olin, Carlton and Chalk.

Young division is open to age 3 through 6 who have not reached school. They will not be judged, but must be entered by parents and pay registration fee.

City Council Offers Gas Company 5% Rate Increase

Hico City Council, meeting in regular session Monday night of this week, spent more than one and a half hours discussing the requested 10 percent increase in rates by Lone Star Gas Co.

Curtis Jennings, local distribution manager, met with the Council as the gas company's representative.

In a nutshell, City Dads refused to grant the requested increase, but offered a five percent rate increase.

In the lengthy discussion before the offer, main objections to the rate increase was the 19.75 increase granted the company in February, 1970; another to the clause in the proposal that would allow the company to automatically pass on rate increases as the cost of gas rises; and charges being made for service calls came in for a share of the discussion.

Wayne Rutledge moved that the five percent increase be granted, Roy Bates seconded, and the body passed the proposal unanimously.

Dr. Johanson is New Director at First National Bank

Dr. Lamar Johanson, Professor of Biological Sciences at Tarleton State College, and resident of Hico, was named a director in First National Bank last week. He fills a vacancy created recently by re-organization of the board.

Dr. Johanson joins Floyd Clifton, W. C. Howard, Ellis Randals, J. B. Woodard and E. D. Brownlee on the board.

Jennings said that he would pass the information on to his company.

Andy McMullen, young Hamilton attorney, met with the Council in regard to the office building which has been under construction for some time. McMullen will open an office here when facilities are completed.

Following considerable discussion on the matter, the Council agreed to make every effort to have the building ready by Aug. 1.

Garbage Truck Discussed.

At a previous meeting, City Supt. W. R. Hampton was instructed to get prices and specifications on a garbage truck. Hampton reported that a completely new and equipped truck would cost the city \$8,233.00.

No action was taken on the purchase, with Mayor O. L. Davis commenting that further study would be made during the month, and a report given at the next meeting.

One other item of business was transacted, that of accepting the recommendations of the equalization board on tax matters.

Record Screwworm Infestation Noted

Mission—Last week was the worst in the history in the 10-year-old Screwworm Program, Mission Lab officials gloomily said.

Texas was hit with a soaring 3,879 cases, nearly 900 more than the previous record of 3,023 established the first week of July, 1962.

The surging caseload bore out the predictions of an unjuviant Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows, program director, who warned two weeks ago that an unexpected drop in the count—first after 11 successive weeks of increases—was probably only temporary.

"Weather conditions hadn't changed that much so I felt sure it was strictly a fluke," he commented, "but I didn't think it would climb so high so fast."

The biggest day was Monday with 1,019 cases, the smallest was Wednesday with 416.

Texas' 1972 total is now 16,196, second only to the 49,484 cases in 1962.

The voracious fly struck in seven new counties to raise that count to 162. The newcomers were Childress, Crane, McLennan, Oldham, Palo Pinto, Swisher and Wichita.

Arizona's worsening situation continued to become just that as 50 more cases there raised the 1972 figure to 166. New Mexico had six more outbreaks and now has 24 cases for the year.

Two more cases from Oklahoma were the first there since May 10 when the first case in nine years was confirmed.

California's modest outbreak remained at two cases where it has stood for several weeks.

Mission Laboratory personnel urged all farmers and ranchers to closely watch their livestock for worm cases, and report any such cases to them.

Area Landowners to Attend Friday Hike Trail Hearing

Two letters received recently by area landowners, from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission, bear contradicting statements concerning a hearing on the proposed hiking trail between Dublin and Walnut Springs.

The hearing, according to one of the letters, will be held Friday, July 7, after the Commission's regular session July 6, and comes under the agenda of "other business."

That letter, from Executive Director James U. Cross, was not dated, and was mailed to Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Gray of Route 6, Box 107, Dublin.

The second letter, to Mr. Jerry L. Magee, 417 Northwest Lorna, Burleson, carried a June 26 date, and was also from Mr. Cross.

Text of the letter received by the Grays was:

"Dear Mr. and Mrs. Gray: As a standard procedure our Commission solicits the views of interested citizens in regard to items which they may be deliberating. Accordingly at the end of each public session interested citizens may be heard under the agenda item 'other

business.' "Our next Commission meeting is scheduled for July 6 and 7, and I am sure our Commission will be glad to hear your views regarding the Dublin to Walnut Springs Trail on July 7. Sincerely, James U. Cross, Executive Director."

The letter to Mr. Magee, which follows, was somewhat contradictory:

"Dear Mr. Magee: The next Parks and Wildlife Commission meeting is scheduled for July 6 and 7, 1972. However, the subject of the hiking and biking trail to which you referred in your April 29, 1972 letter, is still under consideration by the Commission. At this point, the

Commission is still gathering and studying data; thus, no useful purpose could be served by your coming before them at this time.

"You may be assured, however, when the Departmental staff has assembled all the data, you will be invited to attend and testify if you wish. Sincerely, James U. Cross, Executive Director."

Delegation to Attend.
Joe Reichert of Austin, who owns land just west of Hico, said Tuesday morning that a delegation was planning to go to Austin Friday and sit in on the hearing. Mr. Reichert is president of a group of landowners in opposition to the proposed trail.

Mike Kilgo Injured In Motorcycle Accident Sunday

A motorcycle accident near the City Park Sunday night resulted in serious injuries to Mike Kilgo, who was a passenger, riding with Raymond Gerald Lambrecht.

Lambrecht apparently lost control of the motorcycle causing the accident.

Kilgo was hospitalized in City Hospital, but was transferred to St. Joseph Hospital in Fort Worth Monday where he remained in intensive care until late Tuesday.

He received a concussion at the base of his skull.

Lambrecht was not injured.

Rain, Rain Makes For Wet Fourth

A wet, wet Fourth produced the most needed rain of the year Tuesday, with reports coming in of as much as four inches falling in spots.

Most of the area received at least two inches of moisture, with the heaviest in the immediate Hico area.

The rain began falling around 7 a.m., and continued throughout the day until about 5 p.m.

Landowners north of town reported around three inches, those to the east and south measured about two inches, and to the west, three to four inches fell.

Pasturelands and crops in this immediate area were burning fast, and will benefit an untold amount from the moisture. Rainfall prior to the Tuesday deluge had been very spotty.

Hamilton County livestock and pet owners should be on the lookout for possible screwworm cases. Hamilton County has recorded its first case for 1972.

More than 2,300 cases have been confirmed in Texas this spring, the earliest and heaviest outbreak in the history of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

We often hear about people in big towns talking about the high cost of groceries. In visiting with Mr. Ellis Lee recently, the price of beef was brought up. I know that beef is a good buy and so does he, but I didn't know it was so cheap. Cigarettes are only about \$9.90 a pound. And that's buying them by the carton with the wrappers thrown in.
