P&W Officials Will Explain Proposal, Listen to Objections

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has set hearings for July 21-22 in Hico so department officials can explain the provisions of a proposed hiking and horseback riding trail between Walnut Springs and Dublin.

Joseph C. Reichert of Pflugerville, a Hico property owner, spoke on behalf of 26 opponents of the trail who attended the meeting of the P&W Commission last Friday in Austin.

Reichert told the commission that the 42.5 mile proposed trail, to be built along the former MKT Railroad right-of-way, was opposed by 61 of 67 property owners along the former railroad.

Speaking in behalf of the proposed trail was Darrell Allison of the Dublin Chamber of Commerce, who said the trail would be important to the area economically by bringing in more tourists. Reichert said that farmers and ranchers feared that the trail would hurt their activities by plowing through some of the best farmland in Erath County.

Lester Billingsley of Dublin asked the commission if a decision had already been made to proceed with the project. Commissioner Max Thomas of Dallas said the commission had made no final decision, although it had already decided to purchase four miles of the railroad.

Reichert also blasted a feasibility study of the trail done by Texas Tech professor James Kittens. He said the study referred to the railroad right-of-way as abandoned, when in fact the right-of-way was not abandoned at the time of the study in 1968.

The commission directed Ron Jones, director of Parks Planning and, ironically, a former Dublin resident, to meet with the disgruntled citizens and explain the special provisions in the department's plans that would not disrupt the livelihoods of the area farmers and ranchers.

Kai Segrest of Hico attempted to address the commission after a time allotted for both sides had expired. Segrest identified himself as a former legislator from Dallas.

Twenty-six landowners attended the Austin meeting.

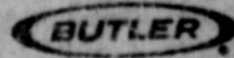

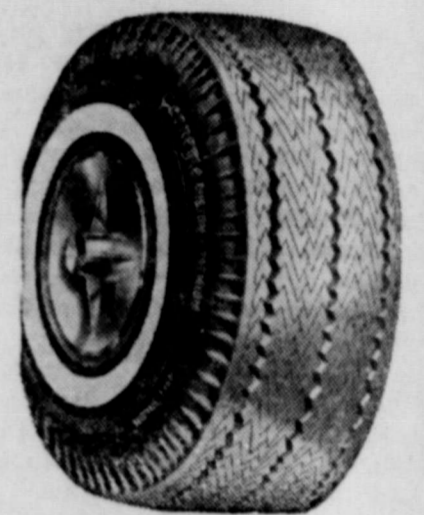

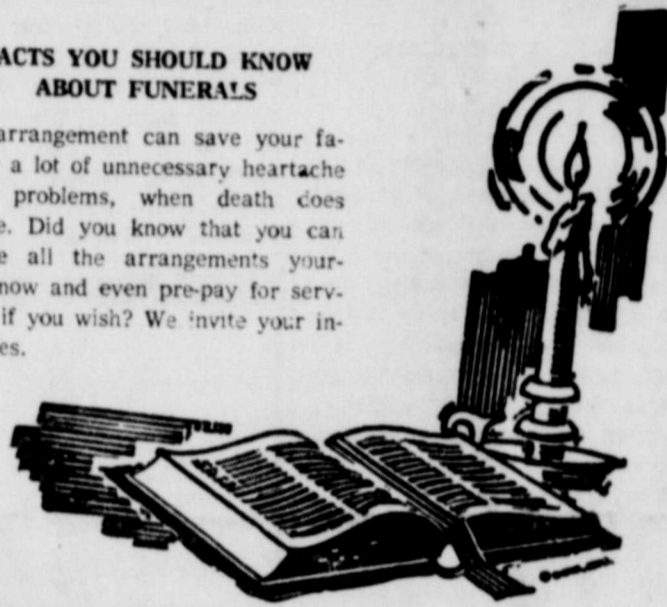

ORDINANCE
AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF IREDELL, BOSQUE COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IREDELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Iredeil by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$2.444 Gross; \$2.20 Net.
Next 3,000 cu. ft. at \$1.211 per Mcf Gross; \$1.09 per Mcf Net.
Next 6,000 cu. ft. at 1.089 per Mcf Gross; .98 per Mcf Net.
Next 15,000 cu. ft. at 1.000 per Mcf Gross; .90 per Mcf Net.
Next 75,000 cu. ft. at .944 per Mcf Gross; .85 per Mcf Net.
All over 100,000 cu. ft. at .911 per Mcf Gross; .82 per Mcf Net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1, 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or con-

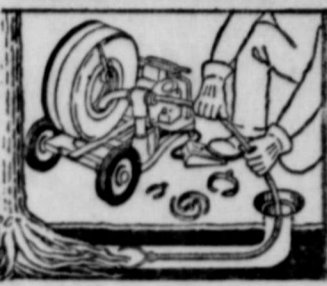
