Hico's Tigers, with a new mentor at the helm, and playing in a higher classification this year for the first time since the early 1950's, will hit the field running Friday night when they encounter an opponent that finds itself in the same situation as the locals.

Grandview, the opening opponent, also has a new coach, and like Hico, is moving up to Class A competition after two years in the B ranks.

The two teams have met four times previously, with the Tigers claiming all four victories.

In 1968, Grandview came to Hico sporting a gaudy record and billed as the highest scoring Class A team in Central Texas, carrying a No. 9 ranking into the fracas. The Tigers failed to be awed by the Zebra's lofty rankings, and went out and administered a 22-6 shellacking to the visitors.

In 1969, Hico dominated the game in every respect, coming away with a 31-0 victory. In the 1970 game, Hico scored the most points ever against the Zebras, rolling to

a 47-6 win, and last year, Hico prevailed 33-12 in a loosely played game at Grandview.

Hico Coach Dwain Gray will field a veteran team against the Zebras, the starting lineup showing six seniors, four juniors and a lone sophomore.

All are letter winners except Jerry Lowry, a transfer who was ineligible last year.

The coach indicated that he would go with Tony Mayfield, 155-pound junior at tight end, and Buddy Mayfield, 165-pound sophomore at split end. At the tackle posts will be senior Bryan Jones, a 160-pounder, and junior Curtis Haley, heaviest lineman on the team at 180.

A senior and junior will also man the guard slots, with Lowry, 170, and Jim Turner, 155, filling the posts. Starting center will be converted running back Danny Kennedy, a senior who weighs 155.

Three of the four backs are seniors, with only tailback Danny Polk, 165, an underclassman. Benny Baley, 155, will man the quarterback post, Galen Lindsey, 195 will be at fullback, and Galen Christian, 145, at flanker.

Gray said Wednesday that the team was free of injuries with the exception of Buddy Mayfield, who received a neck injury in the Meridian scrimmage, but he is expected to play.

A large crowd is expected for the 8 p.m. opener.

### NO SEASON TICKETS FOR TIGER HOME GAMES

Season tickets to the Tiger home football games will not be sold this year, due to a ruling by the conference committee which permits the sale of reserved seat, but no season duets. Admission at the gate will be \$1.50 for adults and 50c for students.

## Lighting Fund is Still Shy of Mark

Back around the first of this year, a fund drive was started to completely replace existing lighting fixtures at Tiger Stadium.

During the summer months, the job was completed, giving Hico Schools one of the best athletic facilities in this section.

However, the project is not entirely completed.

Still lacking is a total of \$503.90, an indebtedness which needs to be paid.

Generous contributors during the past months accounted for around \$1,400 of the total cost, the school financed a large por-

tion, and Community Public Service Co. donated all labor required to finish the job. (An estimated \$3,000.00.)

## Social Security is Big Business Here

Social security benefits were being paid to 2,226 residents of Hamilton County at the rate of \$203,000 every month, or a total of \$2,436,000 a year, as of Jan. 1, 1972. This information was released this week by Jack Calvert, social security district manager in Temple.

When the recently passed 20-percent increase is added in October, the total will be \$243,600 a month, or a yearly total of \$2,923,200.

Of these beneficiaries living in Hamilton County, 1,242 are retired workers and 381 are dependents of retired workers. Another 164 are getting benefits as disabled workers and dependents of disabled workers. There are also 411 persons receiving monthly benefits as survivors of workers who have died.

Most social security beneficiaries are older people, but about one in every four is under the age of 60, Calvert points out. In Hamilton County, 292 people under age 60 collect benefits every month.

There are 129, social security beneficiaries in Hamilton County that are under age 18.

Total number of beneficiaries in Hamilton County represent 30.9 percent of the population.

Calvert reminds residents of this area that social security benefits are designed as a base floor of protection for workers and their families on which the individual can build additional protection that the workers want to have when they retire, if they were to become disabled, or for their families in the event of death.

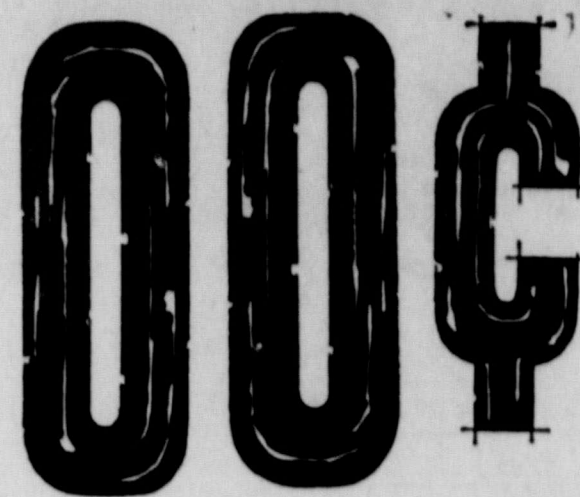
