Full House at Booster Club Meet

Near-capacity crowd was present at the Tuesday night Booster meeting, held in the School Gymnasium.

President Ralph Turner presided and called on secretary Bruce Bales for a financial report. Bales noted that the Boosters had two new members since last year, Loraine Segrest and Dr. A. Blackstock. Total membership stands at 91.

Coach Dwain Gray commented on the Tigers' game with Early, and showed films of the contest. He commented on an incident that occurred at the game when officials threatened to penalize the fans for being too near the sidelines. The penalty never was assessed, but the coaching staff did not expect future cooperation of fans at the games. The Early game could handle only about 100 Hico fans, thus the side-walking.

Gray also gave a scouting report on Whitney, Friday night foe of the Tigers. He said that Whitney was big and strong, and would "run right at you." Gray said the team members were preparing for a real hard game from the Wildcats.

Final order of business was presenting awards to team members, dedication of the Friday game. Jerry Lowry, starting guard, received the Best Lick Award. Lowry was a repeater from last week. He was presented the Big Play Defense award. Big Play Offense went to Benny Baley, Big Play Defense to Galen Lindsey, and Sociality Team Award to Galen Lindsey.

Ray Jones, team spokesman, dedicated Friday night's game to Benny Baley, one of the Tigers' avid fans. Jones cited Mr. Bales for his attendance at all practice sessions, and his successful efforts back in the booster to purchase parkas for the team.

One last item of business, Coach Gray encouraged fans to attend at the Friday game.

Stephenville C of C Backs Up on 'Trail'

The Stephenville Chamber of Commerce changed its stand on the proposed nature trail between Dublin and Walnut Springs. The Stephenville organization made the move after hearing E. G. Ammons during the Chamber's monthly directors meeting.

Ammons, representing property owners on the proposed hike trail, said "There are 64 landowners who have signed their names against the proposed trail. Six hundred names of area neighbors in Bosque, Hamilton and Erath counties are on record against the proposal."

At this time, dairying, farming and other agricultural involvement on the former railroad right-of-way would be injured by the proposal, Ammons said. He and the committee thought the real estate in the area would go down in value if the trail becomes a reality.

Ammons said he was asking the Chamber to withdraw its earlier approval of the proposition, and that the Chamber remain neutral and leave the situation to the landowners and the Parks & Wildlife Commission.

After Ammons left the meeting, the Chamber voted to recall its earlier approval of the plan, and stated the Chamber would remain neutral in future developments of the trail.

Hico and Whitney Hook Up Attorney Friday in Tiger Stadium Opens Law Office Here

"They'll run right at you," was the comment by the Hico coaching staff when reviewing the football game against the Whitney Wildcats this Friday night. Scouting reports show Whitney to be big and strong, and primarily a running team.

The two teams will hook up in Tiger Stadium Friday night at 8 o'clock in the third game of the year for both.

While the Tigers have been victorious in both previous games, Whitney hasn't fared so well, dropping a 48-8 contest to exceptionally strong Hubbard, and losing last week to China Springs 25-14. Hico's two outings show a 52-7 win over weak Grandview, and a 43-0 shel-lacking of Early High.

Hico and Whitney have met five times previously, with the series being even at two wins each and one tie.

In the first game—1948—Hico scored a 27-6 win over the Wildcats, and came back in 1949 with a 20-7 win.

In 1950 the teams battled to a

13-13 tie, and Whitney copped the last two games, 19-6 in 1951, and 39-6 in 1952, last year for the two teams to play.

Whitney always fields a strong team, and this year's edition is expected to be just as tough as in previous years.

Tigers Dominate Early for 43-0 Win

In a game marred by fumbles and penalties, Hico used brute strength and power to overcome a supposedly good Early High Longhorn team, and the Tigers chalked up their second win of the young season by a 43-0 count.

Hico used a powerful running game and an equally powerful defense to blank the Longhorns, a touted passing team which the Tigers limited to nine completions in 35 attempts for an even 100 yards.

The Tigers rolled to 18 first downs and a fantastic 382 net yards rushing, and added 36 more on three passes out of seven attempts. On the other side of the ledger, Hico's defense limited the Longhorns to a minus six yards rushing, and nine first downs, three of which came on penalties.

Mistakes were costly to both teams, as Hico lost four fumbles,

and Whitney copped the last two games, 19-6 in 1951, and 39-6 in 1952, last year for the two teams to play.

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Vote Registration Deadline Oct. 7th

Hamilton County residents who wish to participate in the November general election have only two weeks left to register, according to Tax Assessor-Collector Mrs. Pearl Williams.

To be eligible to vote on Nov. 7, residents must register by October 7, she said.

To date, 4,232 voters have registered in the county, Mrs. Williams reported. She called this a moder-

ately heavy registration total.

In the 1968 presidential election over 4,400 voters were registered. Of this number, 65 percent or 2,873 actually voted.

The 1964 presidential election drew 3,196 votes in the county.

County residents who wish to register should ask for a registration application at the tax office in Hamilton, or at the News Review in Hico.

Lindsey slashed his way for 23 yards to the three, Polk picked up another two to the one, and Baley sneaked in for the third TD of the night. Lindsey converted the two points on a run, making the count 21-0 at halftime.

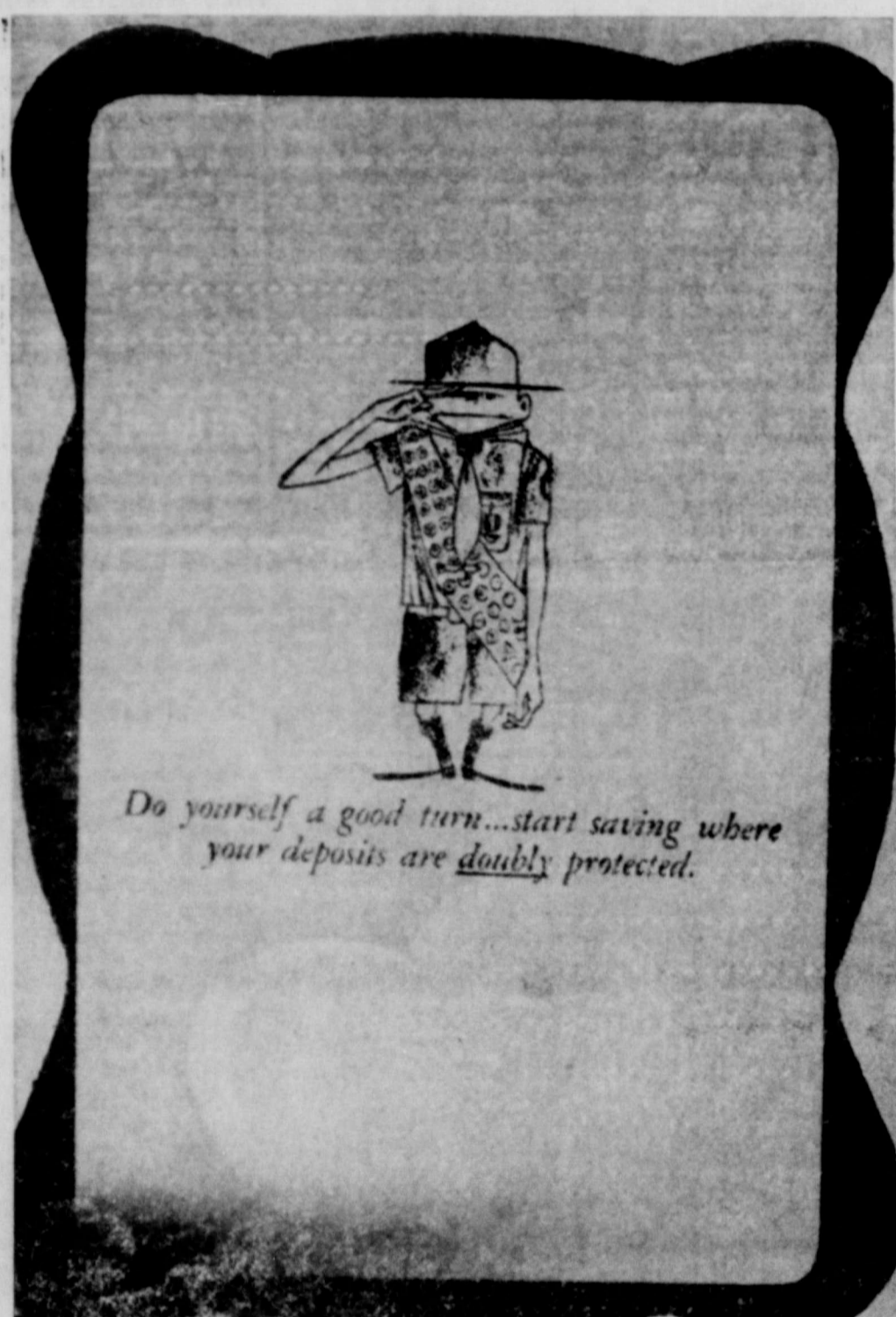

Campaign For Christ

A vitamin C pill will begin the

day for 55 "campaigners for Christ"
in the city most of this month.

"The door-to-door canvassing is
strenuous and we need the extra
energy," explains John Whitley,
guest speaker for the campaign
from Abilene and also one of the
campaigners.

This campaign, which began Au-
gust 2nd, involves workers from
all walks of life from 14 states and
two provinces who have volunteer-
ed their vacation time trying to in-
terest Edmontonians in home Bible
studies.

Sponsored by the local Church of
Christ, it is headed by Ivan Ste-
wart, an evangelist from Texas.
Each year Mr. Stewart conducts
three campaigns, one in Canada,
Europe and the United States.

A school teacher, nurse, house-
wife, student, rancher and several
ministers are just some of the peo-
ple working up to 12 hours a day
campaigning from door-to-door,
conducting Bible studies and pre-
paring for the campaign.

Mrs. Eileen Woodward from Hico
is one of the oldest campaigners at
68. She finds the walking tiring
but "I train to keep in shape."

11th Campaign.

This is Mrs. Woodward's 11th
campaign. Since 1967 she has travel-
led for the Lord to South Africa,
Australia three times, Canada, Ber-
muda and many of the states.

"I lost my husband a while back
so I wanted to get involved in
something that would be construc-
tive for the Lord," she said. "I

find the campaigns very rewarding
and satisfying."

It was a rainy day I chose to
accompany Mr. Whitley and Bill
Hearn, a team leader, on a door-
to-door effort to organize Bible stu-
dies. Mr. Stewart spoke a few
words of encouragement to the
group before they departed to their
designated areas in the morning.

"We won't let the rain dampen
our spirits," he said. "If it's raining
too hard we don't expect you to go
out but if you think you can endure
it . . . I've found it is sometimes
better when it's raining. People
who come to the door are sympa-
thetic and let you in. They realize
you mean business."

On that note the campaigners
divided into their teams and head-
ed into the field. Mr. Whitley was
scheduled to speak on a radio talk-
back program in the morning where
he encountered an overly-persistent
disc jockey pre-occupied with his
theory that all evangelists are mon-
ey-hungry fame-seeking hypocrites.

Circle Block.

Mr. Whitley responded with "May-
be you and I could get together
sometime and sit down and study
the Bible."

With the talk ended, it was time
to knock on doors. The campaign-
ers are told to circle the block and
not walk up one side and cross the
street down the next.

"If we do this the people could
watch us from across the street
and they inevitably build up a re-
sentment," Mr. Whitley said. "Some
will think we're door-to-door sales-
men and won't come to the door."

The first two doors we knocked
on there was no answer. The next
two cut us short by saying "I'm
not interested" and "we have our
own religion."

A girl about 14 years old answer-
ed the next door. Mr. Hearn began
to explain who he was but was in-
terrupted by the girl who said she
was sorry but her family was Mus-
lim and didn't believe in Christ.

Mr. Hearn thanked her for her
time and left. He later remarked:
"Doesn't that tear your heart out
to hear someone say that?"

The doorbell got the lady at the
next house out of bed. She appear-
ed in no mood to listen to some-
one trying to convince her of Bible
study. But surprisingly, she agreed
in the end to allow a couple to
come into her home and conduct
a study.

A Challenge.

An elderly lady, convinced she
was too old to change her ways and
accept Christ as her Saviour, chal-
lenged Mr. Whitley at the next
door.

"I used to believe in those fairy
stories when I was a little girl but
I've grown up now," she said. "I'm
too involved with my backache
and my problems to think about
that (religion)."

But the lady admitted she did be-
lieve in a "superior being" and
maybe someday "if something hap-
pens to me I'll believe in every-
thing the Bible says."

The campaign generally is going
very well, Mr. Stewart said—as
well as in other cities.

"There's the same number of
people responding in the same way
since sin is sin, soul is soul, and
Christ is Christ all over the World."

To Cost \$625.

Mr. Stewart's campaigns, the
first of which was held in Edmon-
ton in 1964, last two weeks in the
U.S., three weeks in Canada, and
a month when overseas.

For this Edmonton campaign it
is costing each campaigner an av-
erage of \$625 for the three-week
stay. Each campaigner is respon-
sible for raising his own money.

"Some of the workers pay their
own way although we frown on
this," Mr. Stewart said. "We pre-
fer them raising the money from
other Christians."

The reason for this, explained
Mr. Stewart, is two-fold.

"The worker cheats someone out
of a blessing if they pay their own
way because the Lord said He will
bless all those who do His work.
This way there can be a double
blessing. Also, if the worker knows
someone has invested in him it
gives him a motivation nothing
else can give."

The Tigers' next marker was set up on an Early fourth down gamble. When it appeared that the Early runner might have the first down, here came Lindsey on a brutal tackle that doused the threat. From the 47, Polk got three, Baley picked up another 6 to the 38, Lindsey got 12 to the 26, Polk picked up another six, and Baley city-slickered the 'Horns on the next play, romping the final 20 to the end zone. Lindsey's kick was good and Hico had a 36-0 lead with about half of the final quarter left.

After a pair of exchanges, Lindsey scooted under an errant 'Horn pass, and rambled 40 yards for the clincher. He followed with the conversion, bringing the final score to 43-0.

Overall, the game was really a harder test than the score indicates. Even the Hico coaching staff admits that Early played better than the fan would suspect, citing the fact that dropped passes, had they been completed, could have turned the contest much closer. More than 80 percent of the 'Horns' passes were dropped.

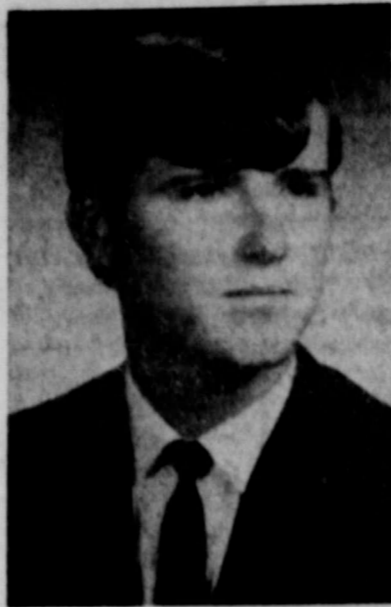

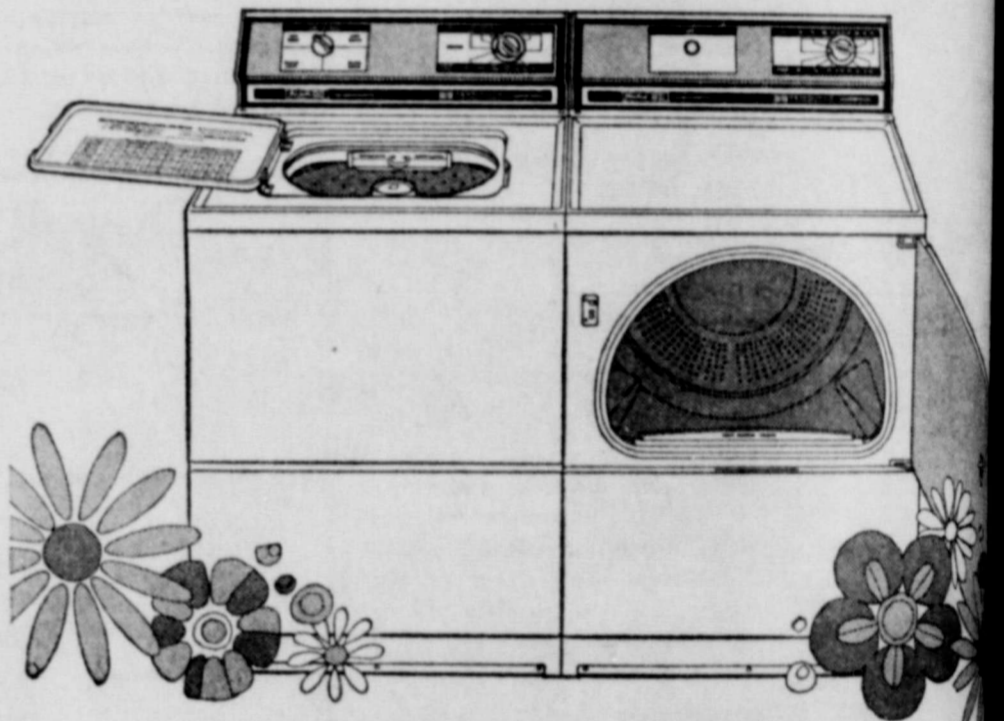
