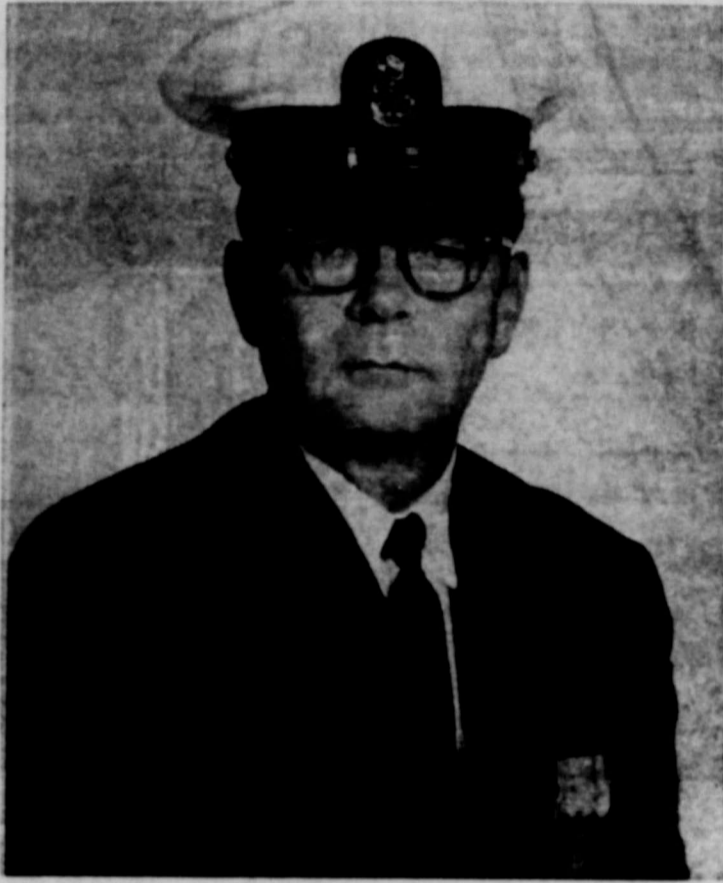

Tax Rates Telephone January 1st

Military Rites for Chief Marshall Set At Corpus Christi

Funeral services for Maynard M. Marshall, 46, will be conducted at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, Nov. 10, in the Chapel of the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, with full Military Rites scheduled. Burial will be in a Corpus Christi cemetery.

Mr. Marshall passed away Friday, November 3, in an Air Force hospital in Germany, where he had been flown following a motorcycle accident on October 23 near Morocco, where he was stationed with the U. S. Navy.

A veteran of almost 25 years' active duty, Marshall entered the Navy January 1, 1944, and completed recruit training at the Naval Training Center, San Diego. Following recruit training and a period of school, Marshall served aboard aircraft carriers in the Pacific Theatre until after the end of World War II. He participated in the battle of Okinawa.

In May of 1946, he was discharged from the Navy and returned to Hico. After completing one semester at Tarleton State College, Marshall transferred to North Texas State University, Denton, where he completed another semester before taking employment with Western Electric.

During these years, he was a member of an active Naval Reserve Unit at Corpus Christi, and in February of 1952, during the Korean conflict, he volunteered for active duty. After accruing enough time to be returned to the inactive list, Marshall chose to remain on active duty as a career Navy man. He was a Radarman at that time.

In 1955, he attended Electronics School at Treasure Island, Calif., and his rating was changed to Electronics Technician. At the time of death he held the highest enlisted rating in Naval service, Electronics Technician Chief (Master).

During his career with the Navy, Marshall had served on several ships, including the USS Santee, USS Thetis Bay, USS Albany, and a guided missile destroyer. He also served at duty stations in Norfolk, Virginia, Jacksonville and Key West, Florida, San Francisco, and Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, his last shore base before receiving the assignment in Morocco last November.

Maynard was born January 2, 1926 in Runge, and moved with his parents to Hico in 1930. He attended Hico Schools, and graduated here with the class of 1943.

During his young manhood, he was an industrious person, being agent for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram for many years, and holding employment in other positions until entering the Navy. In the summer of 1942 he was employed with Post Exchange service at Fort Hood.

In high school, Maynard was an excellent student, and a member of the 1942 football team that defeated Hamilton for the first time in ten years.

On July 5, 1948, he was married to Miss Bernice Mrzak of Robstown, and they were parents of four children.

Surviving other than his wife are two sons, Marvin, with the Navy stationed in Australia, and Jimmy of Corpus Christi; two daughters, Katherine and Judie of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Marshall of Hico; a brother, Glenn Marshall of Cibola, Arizona; a granddaughter, Krisna Marie Marshall of Corpus Christi; and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. D. Y. Willbern of Runge.

Tigers Downed By Glen Rose, 13-0

Several hundred Hico fans saw it, but they couldn't believe it. The "it" was the shut-out of the Hico Tigers by the Glen Rose Tigers last Friday night that sent the favored locals into a tie for second place in the district standings with Valley Mills.

Not since Oct. 30, 1970, had the Tigers been shut out, a 20-0 defeat at the hands of Meridian. That game was also the last time the Tigers had lost in regular season play, a 21-game span.

The win left Glen Rose on top in the hoop chase, and odds-on-end favorite to down Valley Mills and Dublin in undisputed claim of the district title.

The game Friday night featured rock 'em, sock 'em defense by both teams. However, Hico could never get its offense untracked, moving for only 60 yards rushing the entire night. The Tigers did put up 144 yards passing, but 58 of those yards came in the waning seconds of the game.

Fumbles took their toll early, with Hico playing most of the first quarter deep in their own end of the field. A Glen Rose punt on

Hico Voters Like Dolph, Dick and John in Election

Split Ticket Very Evident

Hico voters followed the trend nation-wide in giving overwhelming support to the Republican nominees for President, Richard Nixon and Spiro Agnew in Tuesday's general election.

Local voters favored the Republican ticket 289 to 120 over the Democrats, with the Socialist Party candidate receiving one vote.

Likewise, local pollsters favored Republican John Tower over Democrat Barefoot Sanders in the U.S. Senate race, but the margin was much closer than in the presidential race. Tower polled 235 votes to Sanders' 167, with Raza Unida Party candidate Flores Amaya receiving one vote.

Indicative of the ticket-splitting that went on here was the Governor's race, where Democrat Dolph Briscoe out-pollied Republican Henry Grover by a 228-170 count.

Democrat Jesse James gained a 239-140 margin over Republican Maurice Angly in their contest for State Treasurer, and Democrat Byron Tunnell won out over Republican Jim Segrest 250-107 in the Railroad Commissioner race.

Only other contested race on the ballot was that for State Board of Education, where Glen Smith received 253 votes to his Republican opponent's 97.

The write-in campaign for County Sheriff wasn't a factor in the local box, with Boots Young polling 302 votes to Wiley Mahan's 32.

- No. 6: Homestead tax exemptions, 216 for, 103 against.
- No. 7: Equality of law, 259 for,

66 against.

No. 8: Four year terms of office, 169 for, 158 against.

No. 9: Qualification of directors of SCS districts to hold more than one office, 148 for, 158 against.

No. 10: Provision revision on time and method of proposing amendments, 136 for, 137 against.

No. 11: Salary increase for Lt. Gov. and House Speaker, 103 for, 226 against.

No. 12: Permitting state employees to serve on school boards, etc., 164 for, 144 against.

No. 13: Annual interest rate, 156 for, 131 against.

No. 14: Allowing a county to reduce permanent school fund, 157 for, 155 against.

A total of 414 persons cast ballots in the Tuesday election, and 14 voted absentee. V. H. Jenkins was presiding judge.

Hico Seeks Return to Win Column at Goldthwaite

Hico's Tigers, still smarting from their upset defeat at the hands of Glen Rose last week, hit the road again, going to Goldthwaite Friday night to take on the up and down Eagles in a "must-win" contest.

Goldthwaite, who was the pre-season favorite to cop the district crown, stumbled along the way, and won their second game of the year last week, a 34-12 victory over family member China Spring.

The Eagles' record is deceptive in the fact that they started the

year playing nothing but 2A teams. They hold a 14-0 win over Hamilton.

The Eagles have eight seniors in the starting lineup, are long on experience, and one opposing coach said that they had the best four defensive linemen that his team had faced.

They gained a certain degree of momentum with the win last week, and could salvage an otherwise dismal season with victories in their last two outings, against Hico and Valley Mills.

On the other hand, Hico's ailing

team members are expected to be in much better shape for the game than they were last week, when two members, Danny Polk and Jim Turner were playing at less than half speed. Otherwise, the Tigers are healthy.

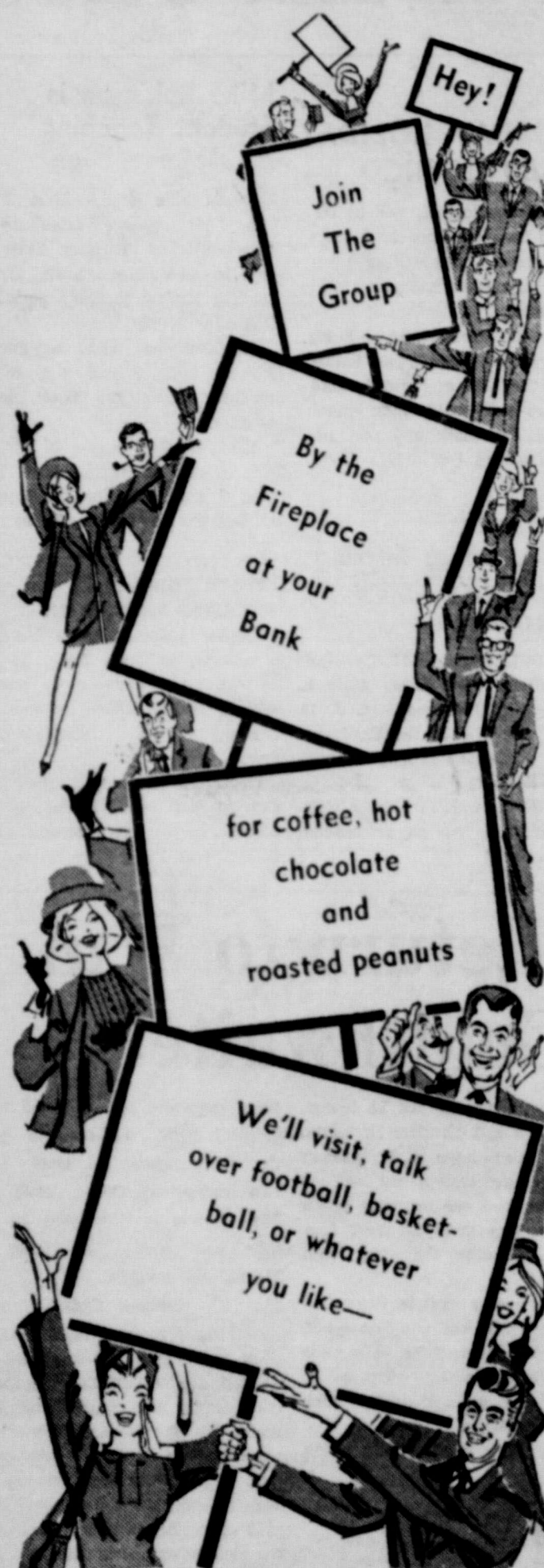

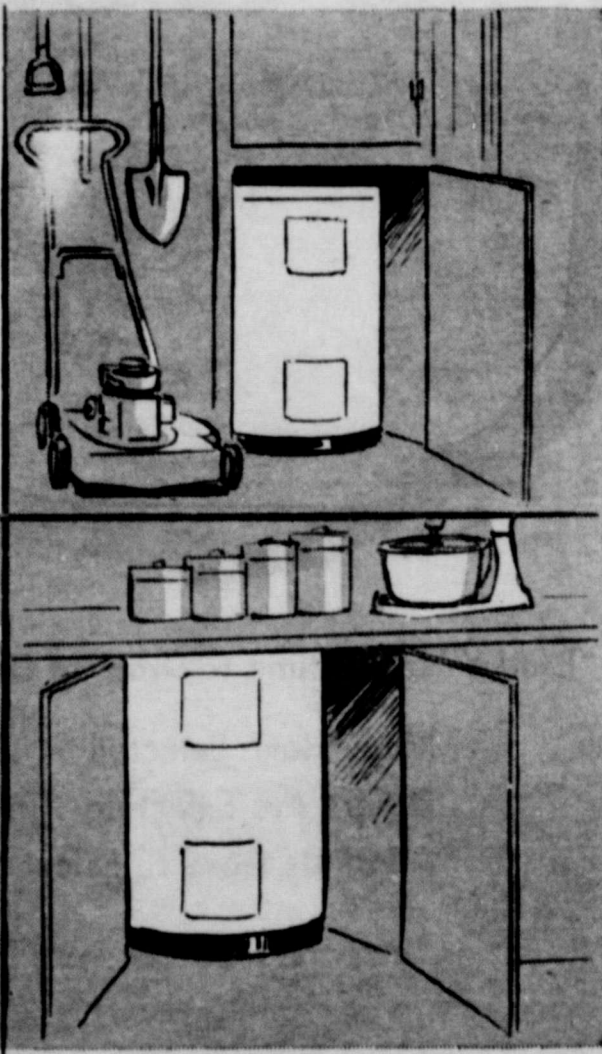

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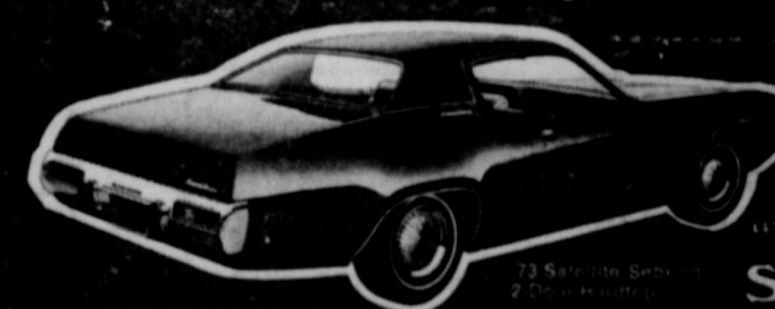
