With the start of the new year and income tax time around the corner, the farmers and ranchers who kept a good set of records last year are reaping the benefits. It is so much easier to maintain records on a week to week basis than a year to year basis. For those of you that don't have good, accurate records, start digging for all those old receipts, but just think how much easier it would be if they

were already in order. If you hire someone to figure your tax return, they can only work with the information you furnish them. For them to do a good job, it is essential for you to do a good job of record keeping. Remember, Jan. 1, was the be-

ginning of a new year and a new set of records.

With the 1973 crop season just around the corner it is an ideal time to pick up the shovel and head to the field and take a soil sample. However, the information received is no better than the sample sent in. Samples should be a random selection over the entire field (staying in the same soil type). Information sheets and mailing cartons are available in the Extension office. "Don't Guess . . Soi! Test."




