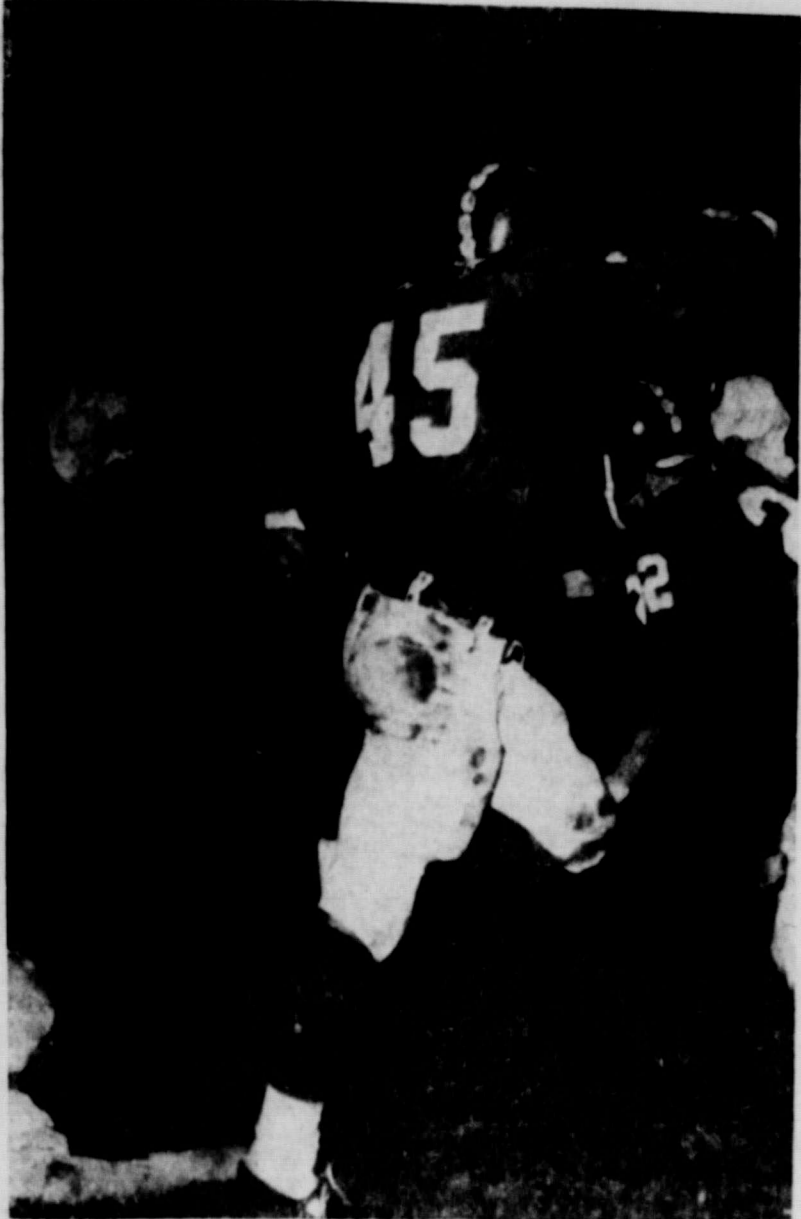

Deadlines Near for City, School Filing

Deadline for filing for a place on the ballot in both City and School Trustee elections is Wednesday, March 7.

Candidates have until 30 days prior to the elections to file for places on the ballot, which will be held Saturday, April 7.

In City balloting, terms of Aldermen Wayne Rutledge and Alvin Casey expire. Both are veteran

members of the Council. Neither have indicated whether or not they will seek re-election.

In the school race, terms of three members of the board expire. Lee Flowers, D. L. McCoy and Guy Bulman are currently serving out three-year terms.

Prospective candidates may file for a place on the ballot at City Hall in the municipal election, and in the school trustee election, names must be filed with the County Judge.

In the latter, a person may file his own name, or a petition bearing five or more names of qualified voters may ask for a candidate's name to be placed on the ballot.

A loyalty oath must also be signed by a school trustee candidate before his name can be placed on the ballot.

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


'WHAT'S NEW IN DENTISTRY' IS TOPIC OF PROGRAM FOR REVIEW CLUB MEETING

Dr. A. T. Blackstock, local dentist, was guest speaker. His subject was "What's New in Dentistry."

Dr. Blackstock prefaced his remarks by reminding members that we need to be proud of the country we live in, and we need to remember to voice that pride.

The Texas Dental Society is the oldest in the nation and Texas dentists are proud of the fact that Texas has no system of reciprocity with other states in the union. They feel that this protects the citizens from poorly trained practitioners. Under a new Federal plan being considered, officials would have the prerogative of sending dentists to areas without anyone in practice without regard to where they had received their training. The number of dentists being graduated is increasing steadily but the problem is that most of the graduates prefer to remain in the cities, and thus areas such as here are left under-served.

The government has a very efficient training program and no person who desires training in dentistry need go without. Students can receive scholarships or return training years "one for one" in branches of the service.

The first dental office in the U. S. was opened in New York City in the 1850's, and the first charter for a dental college was granted in New York in 1865.

Back in the '30's in Texas, dentists plied their trade with a folding dental chair and a foot-power driven drill. Dental students often earned a little to get by in the school by "bushwacking" or doing a little dentistry on the side. Dentists even made house calls at that time.

The foot-power drill has given way to the air-motor drill which turns at 300,000 Rpm.

The field of anesthetics and modernization of methods of administering them has taken much of the danger and the hurt out of dentistry. Dr. Blackstock emphasized the fact that he consults with a physician in the case of special health problems that limit the use of certain types of anesthetics.

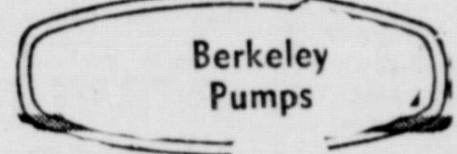

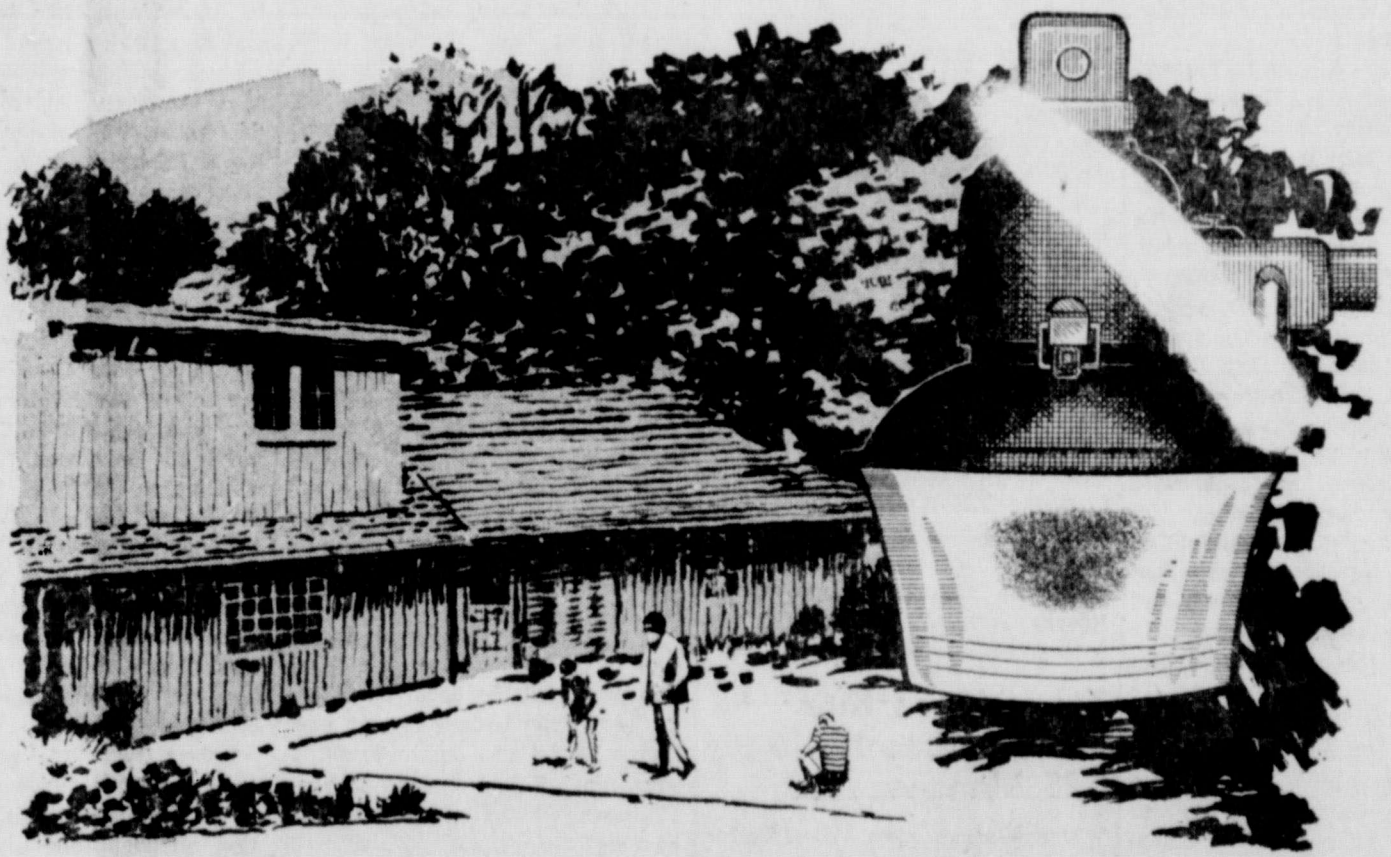

Tips Offered Kite Flyers by Local CPS Manager

Time was when considerable skill was required to build a good kite from scratch, get the halter tied on correctly, and then calculate accurately the exact amount of tail needed to keep the contraption in the air and out of a nose-dive. Nowadays, however, practically anyone can go to the store, buy a practically fool-proof ready-made kite, and have it "outa sight" in no time at all.

"All the more reason why kite fliers should know their safety rules and abide by them," said O. L. Davis, Hico manager for Community Public Service Co. "Kite pilots, of all ages, should make sure that there is no metal in the kite or string. You should avoid electric wires, TV antennas, and busy streets and highways; and, if your kites gets snagged on a power line, don't try to climb up to get it down. Call the electric company office for help," Davis said.

Kite-flying safety rules are being publicized in posters for school bulletin boards, and in newspaper ads, both sponsored by the power company.
