Many small towns and rural areas blessed with clean, green and unblemished terrain, are growing. Oldtimers and residents welcome a slow influx of families, many with young children, some re-employment in cities barely within community range, buying building houses, beginning to plant roots in their new localities.

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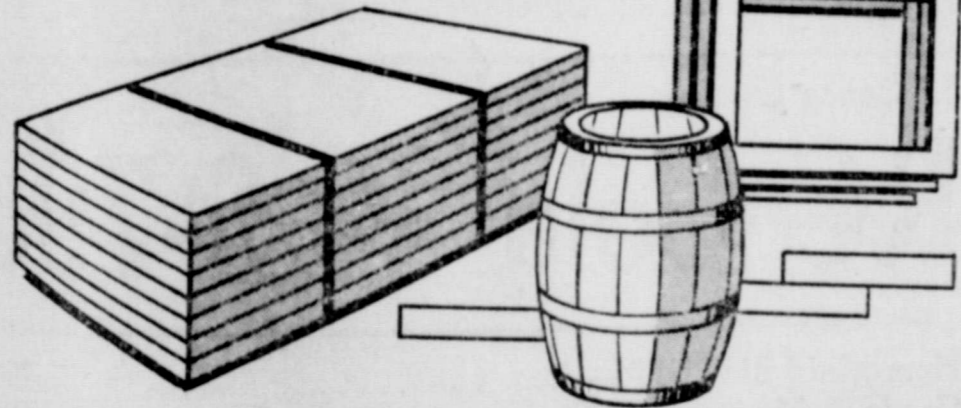

The Hico Garden Club met Friday, April 13 at 2 p.m. in the Community Center. Mrs. John Golightly presided, giving the welcome. Mrs. George Loden led the opening prayer. Each member answered roll call by giving the "Family Name of Favorite Wild Flowers."

Mrs. C. E. Barr gave an excellent report on the Spring Flower Show, listing winners in each division.

Mrs. Golightly and Mrs. W. E. Goyne reported on their trip to Temple where they attended the District 5 meeting. The Hico Club received several awards.

Mrs. Goyne presented the Project Program, "Beauty is—Wild Flowers of America." She had on display posters, books and pamphlets of wild flowers. Club members brought various wild flowers blooming now to add to her collection for discussion. Texas alone has more than 5,000 species that give unlimited viewing pleasure to Texans, visitors, as well as a great challenge to botanists who attempt to name and classify them. The late President Johnson and Mrs. Johnson started the movement to catalogue all the wild flowers in the United States. Texas had so many it took two huge volumes to complete the set. The Texas Almanac is a great source of information on wild flowers, giving the regions, variety of flowers, types of soil they are grown in, and the seasons they bloom. The best known of the Texas wild flower is the legally adopted State Flower (March 7, 1901), the Bluebonnet. This flower is blooming profusely along the highways now.

Mrs. Goyne very graciously answered many questions the members asked about the various flowers shown.

Mrs. Golightly reminded the members about the Flower Show in Clifton April 26, with a theme of "Flower Show Country Style," and the show in Comanche April 28.

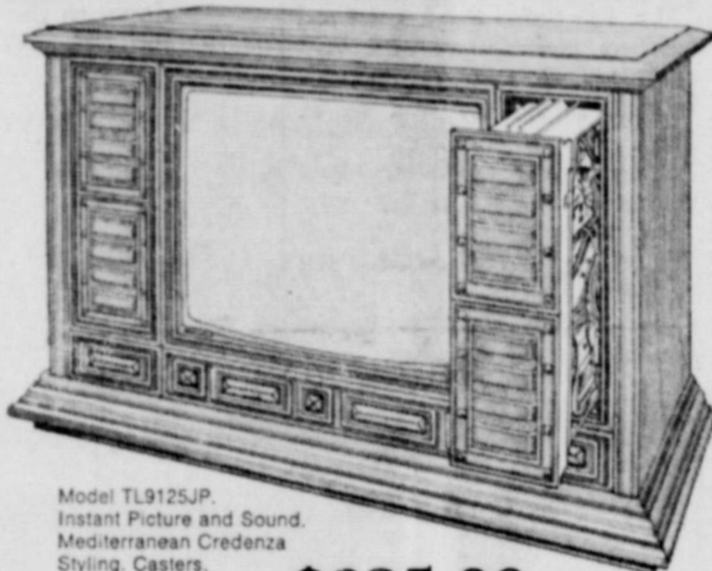

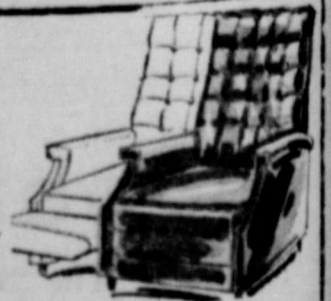

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Gardners can produce a better crop of tomatoes by using wire cages.

A five by five foot section of six-inch mesh concrete reinforcing wire makes an excellent cage about 19 inches in diameter when bent into a cylinder and the ends are bent together. By snipping off the bottom rung, the cage can be pushed into the ground about six inches deep.

Push the cage over each plant. No suckering, pruning or training is necessary. The plant grows up through the cage with some of the leaves and stems coming through the squares of wire mesh, support- ing the plant in an upright position.

Cages allow plants to develop nat- urally, providing adequate shade for ripening fruit. Sunscald and fruit cracking are minimal with caged plants when soil moisture is maintained at an adequate level and foliage diseases are controlled.

Plastic, paper, aluminum foil or heavy organic mulch on the soil in the cage will control weeds and reduce moisture loss. However, or- ganic mulch should be used only after the soil has become warm, as it can slow plant growth if used during cool spring weather.

Six caged plants of the large fruited tomato varieties should pro- vide plenty of tomatoes for a fam- ily of four or five during the normal harvest period. Some grow- ers have obtained over 50 pounds of fruit per plant in cages.

A good method of watering to- mato plants, either with or without cages is in gallon cans placed in the ground with only about one inch of the sides above ground. Cut off the top of each can and perforate the bottom before plac- ing it in the ground. Use two cans per plant or 12 cans for six plants.

With tomato plants set two feet apart, place two cans about 16 in. apart between plants, starting with two cans on either end of the row.

After plants start to fruit, place one to two level teaspoons of a complete fertilizer in each can once a week. Fill the cans with water two to three times a week or as needed.

This method can also be used for producing fall tomatoes when seeds are started in June. However, black plastic mulch should not be used for a fall crop.
