H.D. Walker is New Superintendent

Harold D. Walker, who for the past 22 years has been head of the Hico School District, was named Superintendent last Thursday night by the local board of trustees. He will assume his duties July 1.

The promotion comes as a result of the announced retirement of O. C. Cook, who has served as superintendent the past 22 years.

Mr. Walker, a native of Stephenville, is a graduate of Stephenville High School, and holds both B.S. and M.S. degrees from Texas A&M University. He received a B.S. in 1951 and his M.S. in 1954.

Mr. Walker also received his Administrator's Certificate from A&M. All of his previous teaching experience has been at Hico with the exception of a short stint as instructor in Erath and Parker Counties' Vocational Schools. He accepted the agriculture post at Hico in 1951.

A Navy veteran, Mr. Walker served aboard an aircraft carrier during the Pacific Theatre during World War II, and attended Tarleton State College before transferring to Texas A&M.

Mr. Walker has long been known as one of the finest vocational educators in the state, and has served as President of Area Vocational Teachers Association and is currently a member of the State Board, Voc-Ag Teachers Association. He has also served as president of the Hamilton County Teacher's Association.

The new superintendent's judging teams have been highly successful in past years, with the Range & Pasture teams winning the State Championship three years in succession. His teams have also qualified for the National Judging Contests in Oklahoma City four times.

During his tenure in Hico, Walker has guided the annual livestock show into major prominence, being one of the favorite shows in the state, and consistently drawing entries from major producers.

Mr. Walker and his wife, Bettye, have four children, Johnette and Stephanie, both students at Tarleton State College, and twin sons, Dean and Dale, who will be freshman students at Hico High School next year. The family attends the Church of Christ.
