## Beauty Pageant Highlights 4-Day Reunion Celebration

Another edition of the Hico Old Settlers Reunion—the 87th—was completed Saturday night with the largest crowd of the four-day event present. Joe Paul Nichols closed the celebration when he and his popular band played Saturday night for the pavilion dance.

The Reunion began with a street parade Wednesday afternoon when opening exercises honored Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Cook, who retired after 23 years as leaders in the local schools. The parade, one of the best and largest ever in Hico, was viewed by hundreds of people. Adding to the parade were entries from Stephenville, De Leon, Lampasas, Dallas, and the military band and armored units from Fort Hood.

Wednesday night activities at the park featured the Rhythm Masters,

local band, who had a guest vocalist and guitarist, Roy Smith of Bryson. Ralph Wagner Shows were on the park grounds.

Thursday night crowds were a little light due to threatening weather, but entertainment was good at the pavilion as Joe Paul Nichols and his band performed.

Highlight of the four nights of activities was Friday when the Miss Reunion Contest was staged.

### Afternoon Tea

A tea was held for contestants in the senior division of the beauty pageant at 6 p.m. in the Hico Community Center and each girl was interviewed privately by the judges who were Miss Cindy Vance of Grand Prairie, Mrs. Ronnie Nowlin of De Leon and Robert Witzsche of Hamilton. Miss Vance was Grand Prairie's representative in the recent Miss Texas contest.

A colorful arrangement of fresh fruit was used as a centerpiece for the tea table where refreshments of finger sandwiches, cake squares, nuts, chocolate fondue and punch were served.

### Beauty Pageant

The beauty pageant got underway at 8:30 p.m. at the pavilion in an atmosphere of "Sign of the Times," theme for the program. Black-light posters decorated the background of the stage and the local beauties walked on a silver foiled ramp when presenting themselves to the audience and judges.

Bryan Jones was emcee for the event and entertainment was provided by Edd Schneider, Jerry Casey, James Mayfield and Gary Wootton.

In the Little Miss division, Shaye Carpenter was crowned Little Miss of 1973, with Christi Black as first runnerup and Lisa Ferguson as second runnerup.

Thirty girls were in competition in the senior division and were presented in hot pants and evening dress attire. The group was narrowed down to ten finalists, including Freda Jaggars, Melanie Bonner, Wendy Walker, Tanja Scott, Judy Morrison, Kim Fillingim, Jennifer Blum, Donna Mayfield, Cindy Polk and Vickie Cornett.

From the ten finalists five girls

were chosen. Selected were Misses Bonner, Scott, Morrison, Blum and Mayfield. Each of the contestants were asked a question which they answered in their own special way.

After a few minutes of suspense the judges chose Miss Bonner to be Hico's Miss Reunion for 1973, with Miss Scott as first runnerup and Miss Mayfield as second runnerup.

Many people in the Reunion, Parade, and Pageant committees and their helpers gave much time and thought in planning this year's Old Settlers Reunion in making it the success that it was, and they should be commended for their efforts.

## Salmon-Ross Hit Hard By Yeggs, \$7,000 Loss Estimated

Hico business firm, Salmon-Ross Dept. Store, suffered huge loss last Thursday night when burglars broke into the store and took away clothing tentatively estimated at \$7,000.00 in value.

The owners, Conda Salmon and Ross, discovered the robbery early morning when they arrived at work, and notified law enforcement officials. Local Con-

stable Buck Shepherd and Texas Ranger James Wright of Waco investigated the break-in.

Entry to the store was gained by breaking the lock on the back door.

Taken in the robbery was mostly men's wear, with the yeggs losing only the most expensive items.

Missing were all the men's double-knit sport coats, the most expensive men's boots, a few pairs of dress shoes, denim and colored Levis, shirts, and double-knit trousers.

In the ladies' department, the burglars took all the women's pantsuits, everything on one rack of fall blouses, and some miscellaneous items.

Law officials said the robbery

followed the same pattern of those in Comanche, Stephenville, Granbury and Glen Rose during the past year.

Mr. Salmon said that the merchandise was not insured against theft.

Funeral services for Danny Lee Flanary, 20, of Odessa, who was killed Friday when the truck he was driving left the road and hit a concrete wall on Interstate 20 between Abilene and Merkel, were held at 2 p.m. Sunday in the Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel with Rev. Dale Yant officiating. Burial was in the New Iredell Cemetery. Flanary, a truck driver for Pipe and Supply Co. of Odessa, was killed immediately, a Texas Department of Public Safety patrolman said. The truck burst into flames and Flanary's body was pinned under the truck about five hours, he said.

Flanary, a former resident of Iredell, is survived by his wife, Jeanann, and a son, Marty Dan Flanary, both of Stephenville; his father, Marvin Flanary Sr. of Killean; his mother, Mrs. Vonnie Jean Howell of Comanche; a sister, Mrs. Linda Lou Olivera; and a brother, Marvin Flanary, Jr., both of Temple.

## Eligible Families Can Start Applying For Food Stamps

The statewide food stamp program, made possible when the 62nd Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for the program in 1973, will start stamp issuance operation in October.

In Senate Bill No. 1 of the Third Called Session of the 1972 Legislature the State Department of Public Welfare was named as the single state agency to administer the food stamp program.

The \$7.7 million appropriated by the legislature will be used solely for the administrative costs of the program. The United States Department of Agriculture has financial responsibility for the food stamps and bonus stamps.

Previous to the statewide program implementation, individual

Texas counties issuing food stamps were responsible for the administrative costs. These counties were certified to issue food stamps only when money for bonus stamps and matching Federal funds were available.

As a result, only 29 of the 254 counties had food stamps. The remainder, except for Hall County which had no food assistance program, had commodity foods.

When the program is fully implemented, all 254 Texas counties will be operating under the statewide food stamp program. After October, commodity foods will be limited to certain groups—public schools, institutions, day care centers, etc.

One of the main eligibility re-

quirements for food stamps is that all able-bodied members of a household between the ages of 18 and 65 must register to work. The only persons who are not required to register for work include those who are responsible for the care of dependent children under 18, or incapacitated adults; a student enrolled at least half time in any school or training program recognized by a federal, state or local government agency, or those who work at least 30 hours a week.

The amount of money a household pays for stamps is dependent upon its net income and the size of the household.

Persons interested in applying for food stamps should contact the local welfare office beginning August 1.

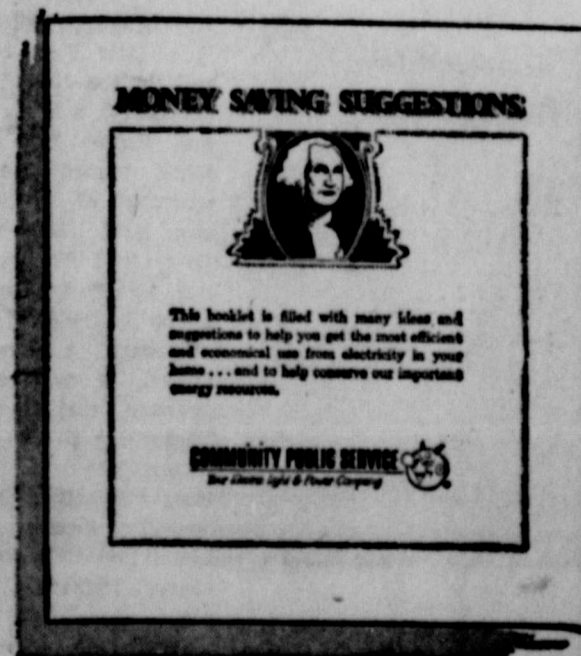

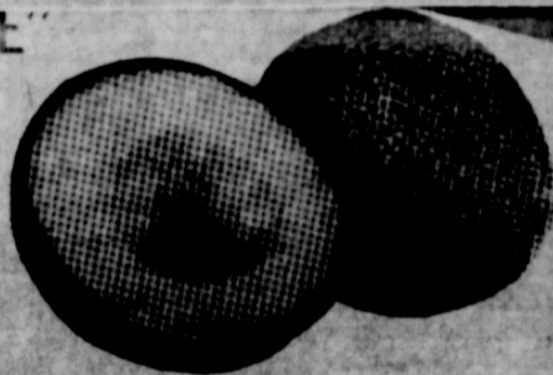

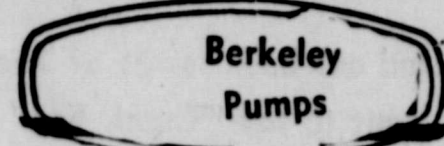
