## Two From Hico Return From Wisconsin Religious Campaign

Two Hicoans were among the 76 campaigners in La Crosse, Wisconsin July 24 through Aug. 14.

The Campaign for Christ, directed by Mr. Ivan Stewart of Arlington, was the 12th for Mrs. Eileen Woodward and the first for Austin Emery. Participants in this evangelistic effort represented 20 states and Kingston, Jamaica.

The city of La Crosse has a population of over 50,000 and with the immediate area numbering close to 70,000. Bro. Emery stated that, on this campaign, every door was knocked by at least one campaigner, and every telephone called once. The effort was designed to assist persons by conducting individualized Bible study in the home. Public services were held each Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings, with the speaker being Mr. Bill Minick of Arlington. An open "rap session" followed each evening service, and proved to be very interesting.

Campaigns for Christ are conducted three times each year in the United States and abroad. The program is overseen by the elders of the Randol Mill Road Church of Christ in Arlington.

The Hicoans also enjoyed a cruise on the Mississippi River, and reported seeing some of the most scenic mountain country ever encountered. One section of highway in the area is considered the second most scenic in the continental United States.

The Hico Church of Christ is a participating congregation in the campaigns, which means they support efforts financially as well as sending at least one worker on each of the campaigns conducted.

# Hico Schools Bulge With 389 Pupils

A full house was in evidence Monday when Hico Schools began the 1973-74 term.

A record number 389 students, largest enrollment in modern history, greeted teachers at the opening exercises. The count was up 36 students over the opening from last year, and part of the increase was attributed to the new Kindergarten program where 25 five-year-olds were registered.

To take care of all the pupils, much shuffling had to be done. For instance, the sixth grade is being taught in the High School typing room, and the Kindergarten occupies the former second grade classroom. All other classes were moved up one room with the exception of the first grade, which remained in the same location.

After a nose count Tuesday, the fifth grade was the largest class, totaling 43 students. Next was the sixth grade with 39. Largest decrease of any class from last year

was the first grade where only 17 students were registered as compared with 27 on opening day last year. The new Kindergarten had 25 enrolled Tuesday.

# Hico Scouts Return From Jamboree

Ten spirited Boy Scouts, a Scoutmaster and another adult left Hico Thursday, July 26 in an olive-drab bus headed for Farragut State Park in Idaho for the National Scout Jamboree, West. On Wednesday, August 15, that same group arrived back in Hico tired and weary after traveling 4,500 miles, sleeping out at night and eating over 60 meals prepared over an open fire.

Scouts making the trip were Lloyd Huggins, Marty and Jimmy Bell, Danny and Eric Parks, Randall and Marvin Walters, Brit Robertson and Corky Glidewell, from Hico, and Garland Colson, a senior patrol leader of Troop 298, Hamilton. Also Scoutmaster Lou Carrington and Marvin Walters Sr.

Enroute to the Jamboree the group spent the first night in Palo Duro Canyon. The second night the group nearly froze while camping out at an altitude of 9,950 feet in a state park near Trinidad, Colo.

The boys enjoyed fishing in Yellowstone River and taking hikes where they camped near Yellowstone National Park in the Grand Tetons National Forest at Lake Jackson. Here they saw only one bear and a large buffalo, but saw large herds of antelope in other parts of Wyoming.

Another night enroute was spent at a KOA Campground after going through a heavy sleet storm in Cheyenne, Wyoming.

The group arrived at Farragut State Park on July 31 where they

stayed for a week participating in the Jamboree where 20,000 Scouts had set up camp.

Entertainment was good at the Park when Bob Hope emceed an arena show the first night. Eugene Cirman, a moon walker, and Admiral Zumwalt, Chief of Staff of the U.S. Navy also spoke to the group. A formation of U.S. Thunderjets and an Army Parachute team put on exhibitions on two different days. Also there was a Midway of exhibit booths and a Skill-o-Rama.

Receiving promotions during the camp were Marvin Walters Jr., Eric Parks and Marty Bell, who received their First Aid Merit Badges; First Aid Skill Awards were presented to Danny Parks and Randall Walters; Camping Skill Awards went to Jimmy Bell, Danny Parks and Randall Walters; receiving Cooking Skill Awards were Brit Robertson, Jimmy Bell and Danny Parks; Second Class Award went to Corky Glidewell; and several boys received patches for their ability in BB shooting. On the return trip home the group traveled through Boise, Idaho, Salt Lake City, where the boys swam in the Salt Lake and spent a night in Bryce Canyon. They viewed the Grand Canyon in Arizona and also the Petrified Forest and went through Carlsbad Caverns in New Mexico.

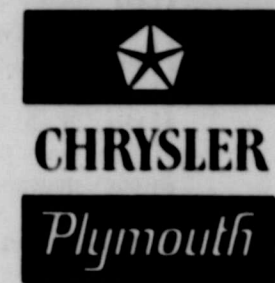

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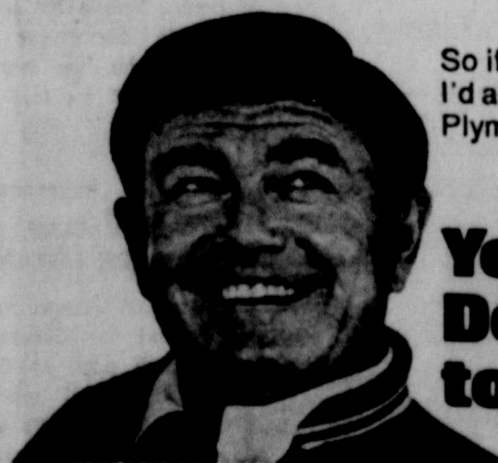

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## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By **JOE ALLEN**

Hamilton County homeowners and forage producers should be on the lookout for the second generation of army worms in lawns and pastures. It is estimated that second generation worms should occur somewhere between Aug. 22-25. So it is important that producers check closely for these pests.

Usually these pests are most active in late summer and fall, but favorable temperatures and moisture conditions have brought on their early arrival.

Army worms attack many plants and can do serious damage to

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lawns, pastures and early planted small grains.

Although normally night feeders, they also are active on cloudy days. Since usually unseen during the day, frequent and careful inspection should be made in shaded areas to detect the worms before extensive damage occurs.

When hatched, the worms are less than one-half inch long and are white with black heads. At maturity army worms are about one and one-half inches in length and may range from pale green to almost black in color with several light stripes along the body. One identifying marking is an inverted "Y"

on front of the head. Unless controlled, army worms are capable of destroying entire lawns, fields of forage or other crops. Therefore, early detection and action are crucial for successful control.

Hamilton Pecan tree owners should also be on the lookout for Walnut Caterpillars. Walnut Caterpillars have been doing extensive damage in Central Texas. Outbreaks should be controlled since the extensive foliage loss caused by the pests results in reduced pecan production not only this year but the following 2 to 4 years.
