SubRates To Go Up Sept. 15

For the first time in five years and only the second time in more than 18 years, the subscription price of the News Review will be increased, effective Sept. 15, 1973. New rates will be:

Hamilton, Bosque and Erath Counties	\$4.00
Elsewhere in Texas	\$5.00
Outside of Texas	\$7.00

The publisher regrets the price advance, but several increases in postage rates, a sharp rise in the cost of newsprint, and increases in general miscellaneous expenses forces the increase.

The increase is based on the yearly rate, and subscribers may still receive their paper for less than ten cents per week.

In view of a severe shortage of newsprint, only one-year renewals will be accepted at the current price. Remember the price increase date, Sept. 15. Thanks in advance for your understanding of this necessary rise.

Hico Volunteer Firemen have been kept busy during the past week due to several grass fires in the vicinity.

Thursday afternoon of last week a call was answered to the Don Rainwater farm when burning brush got out of control and caught pasture grass, both for Rainwater and on the Hobart Proffitt farm.

Firemen were called to the Frank Bonner ranch Saturday afternoon, along with the Fairy and Hamilton fire departments when approximately 100 acres of pasture land burned extending to the Ernest McCoy and J. C. Braune farms.

George Holladay had an irrigation well pump to overheat and catch fire Sunday afternoon, igniting a fertilized field of Coastal grass.

Bill McElhany discovered the pump blaze, firemen were called, and their quick response eliminated what could have been a serious fire due to filled hay barns nearby.

Again firemen caution everyone about burning any kind of vegetation during this extreme dry weather.

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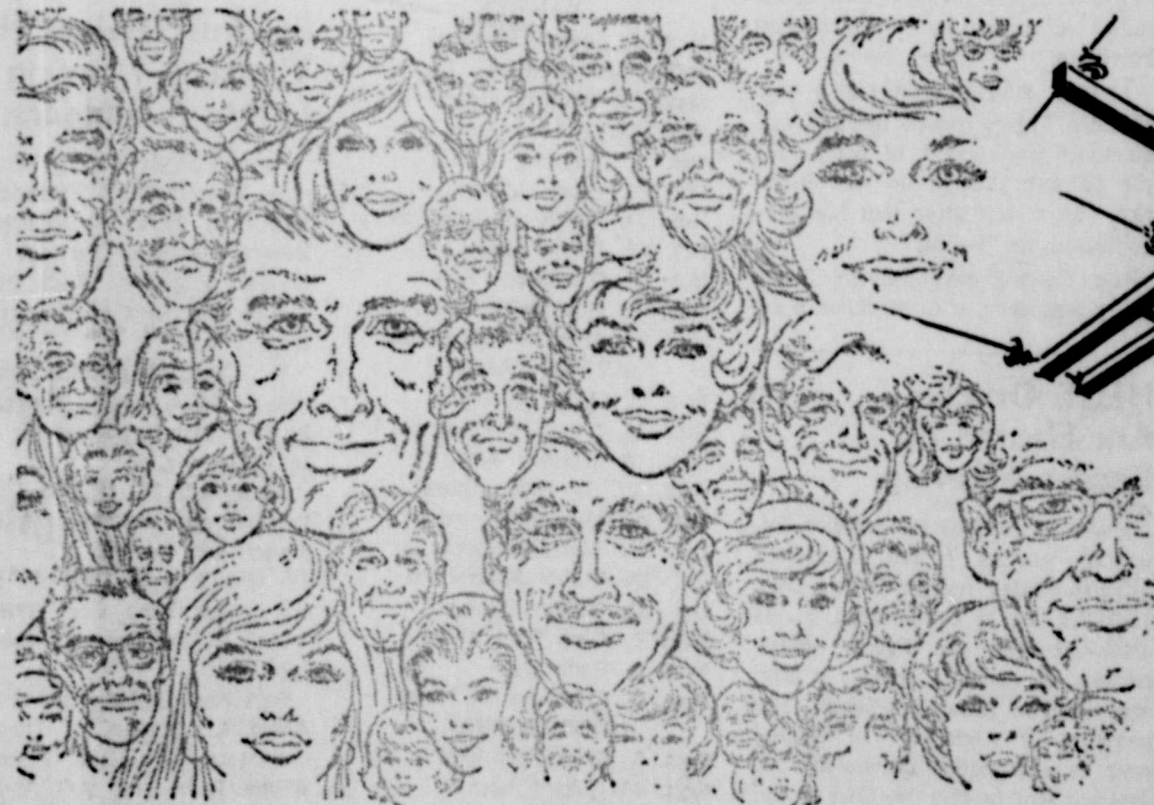

Have you ever struggled to learn pronunciation, vocabulary, and the meaning of a foreign language? You memorized irregular words in Latin, pondered the difference between "star" and "ser" in Spanish, or wondered why in Italian a hat is masculine but a flower is neuter?

Have you ever stopped to think about the much more difficult English words you commonly taught in our schools and colleges? Consider the pronunciation of English. Rough, cough, bough, dough—words look as if they should be spelled the same, but they don't.

Remember the teacher who emphasized the rule of using a preposition to end a sentence with something up which I will not put?

Do you appreciate those boys and girls who go to interscholastic spelling competitions when they remember just how difficult it is to spell in English. One classic is the man who spelled GHOST—GH as in enough, O as in women, and T as in notion. Usually, he was right.

Then there's vocabulary. The dictionary lists at least twenty

meanings for a simple word like stock. It can mean cattle or a flower, a merchant's store of goods or the wooden part of a gun.

There are words that sound alike but are very different in meaning. Our North Carolina city cousin once phoned to say he was in the "chorale." Can you imagine what the Texas country cousins thought he was in! (A corral?)

This week Mrs. Betty Patterson's Seventh Grade learned some powerful lessons about vocabulary after taking a test which revealed a little confusion about word meanings.

Some definitions of "syntax" were "a tax if you sin," "all the money collected at church for sin," "when you do something wrong, you pay for it."

Many of our Hico High School graduates study Animal Husbandry in college, but some of the seventh graders weren't quite clear about what Animal Husbandry means: "where animals get married," "having more than one husband," "two animals, then one dies and leaves the other lonesome."

A little seasonal variation often adds spice to life. One seventh grader listed the Four Seasons as "salt, pepper, mustard, and vinegar."

And, by one student's definition, "a spinal column is a long bunch of bones. The head sits on the top

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Although small grain planting time is just around the corner, there's still time to get a soil test on the land to be seeded.

Small grains cannot be expected to perform well when grown with inadequate amounts of plant nutrients.

Many producers apply nitrogen in the fall or as a top dressing in the spring but do not consider other nutrients that small grain crops may need.

Small grains are very responsive to phosphorus and only a soil test can determine the amount to apply. Phosphorus stimulates rapid, early growth which is especially important if the crops are to be grazed. Phosphorus should be drilled at planting time or broadcast and worked into the soil prior to seeding.

Some fields may also need potash which improves the standing ability of plants. However, this plant nutrient is generally not needed as often as nitrogen and phosphorus.

A soil test is the best guide to a fertilization program for small grains. Soil samples may be submitted to testing laboratories run by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, Lubbock and Seymour.

Information sheets and instructions for collecting and mailing soil samples are available at the County Extension office.

Hot, dry summer weather can be a big pain in the eye for cattle. The reason is pinkeye.

Pinkeye is an infectious eye disease of cattle of all ages and breeds. However, younger animals under two years of age appear to be more susceptible than older ones.

The eye inflammation occurs most often in summer and fall and is generally more prevalent in white-faced animals. Dry, dusty conditions, bright sunlight, feeding in tall grass and the presence of flies all tend to aggravate the condition.

The disease is caused primarily by a bacteria. The eyelids swell and watery discharge increases and thickens. The white of the eye becomes inflamed and a white, gray spot appears near the center

allows the eye to recover without complications. Eye patches also help shorten recovery time. Although no specific drug is available to treat pinkeye, injections of Vitamin A and a cortisone product have helped in some cases.

Cattlemen should isolate for at least 60 days all new animals brought into the herd. Cattle that have recovered from pinkeye may still be capable of spreading it for some months.
