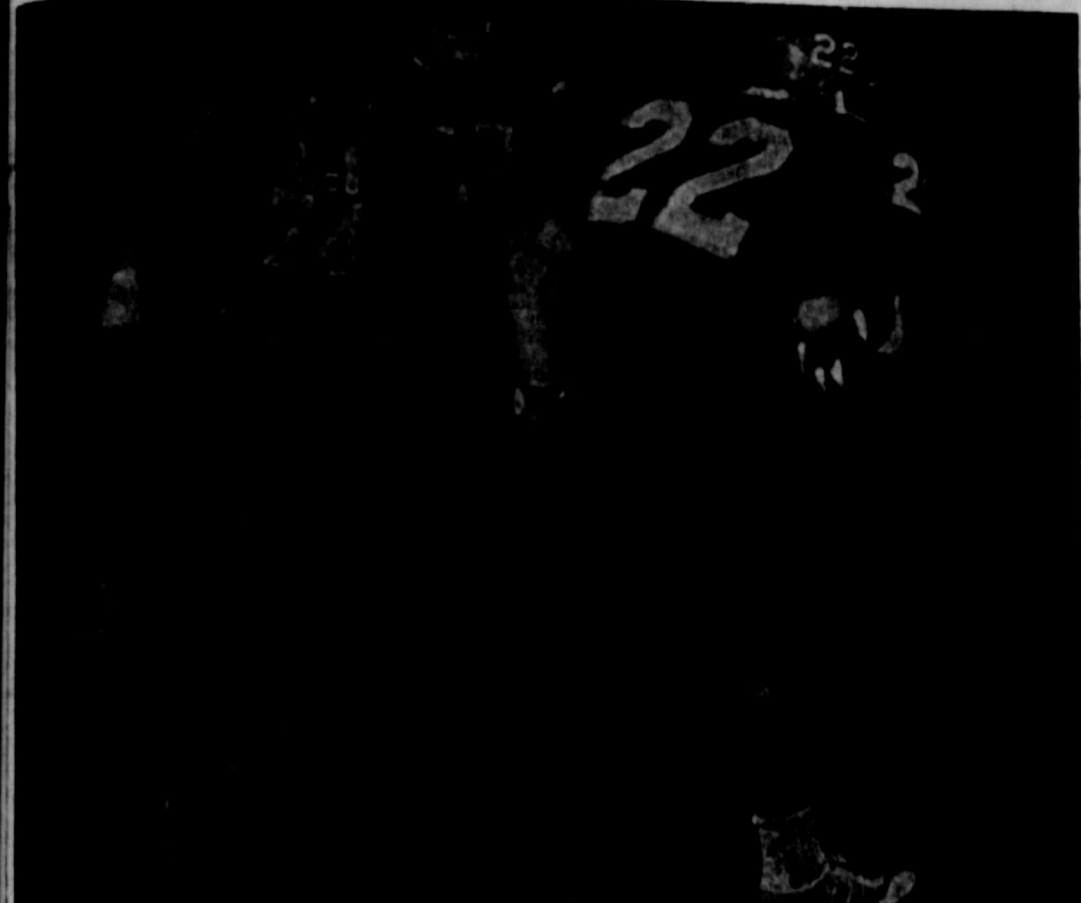

Vandals Hit Carlton Schools

Three Dublin men, ages 24, 22, and 21 were caught in the act of destroying property at the Carlton School about noon Monday.

A Carlton resident observed the vandalism and called Constable Buck Shepherd, who took the three men into custody.

Shepherd turned the men over to Sheriff Boots Young who carried them to Hamilton.

They were released from custody after making bond and agreeing to repair damage at the school.

Hico School Supt. Harold Walker said that damage amounted to several hundred dollars.

Only one other threat occurred by either team until the final two minutes of the contest, and that was killed when the Tigers' Roberson intercepted a Bulldog pass in the end zone.

After a fourth down gamble by the Tigers late in the game, the visitors gained possession at the Tiger 25. With 2:55 showing on the clock, the Bulldogs used one minute to score, with Eddleman scampering eight yards for the marker. The kick was good, upping the score to 20-7. On the final play of the game, Jimmy Elrod took a 21-yard scoring pass, the referees allowed the kick, making the count 27-7.

The re-vamped Tiger lineup showed Buddy Mayfield moving to quarterback, Edd LeFevre to flanker, and Loyd Roberson going to tailback slot.

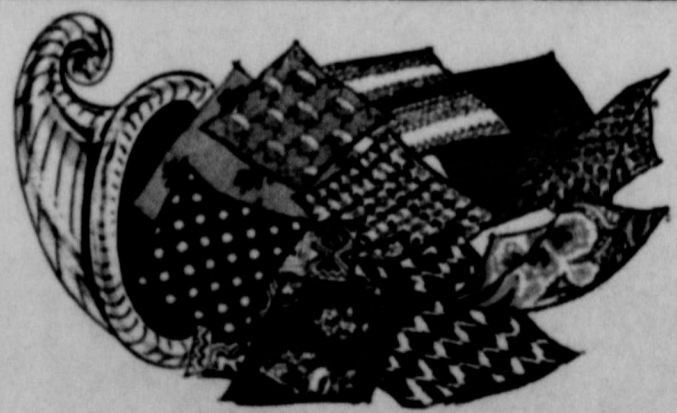

'SPANNING OUR EDUCATIONAL HERITAGE' IS DISCUSSED BY REVIEW CLUB PANEL

Members of the Hico Review Club gathered in the home of Mrs. H. W. Sherrard Thursday, Oct. 4 for their regular meeting.

President Mrs. Bryan Angell called the meeting to order.

Program for the afternoon featured a panel composed of Mesdames Paul Verdusco, J. C. Braune and Harlan Koonsman, who spoke on the subject of "Spanning Our Educational Heritage."

In telling of the past Mrs. Verdusco began with colonial days in America, telling how education was based on religious motives. The Horn Board was a teaching device used in Massachusetts as early as 1642. Legislation made it a requirement for towns of 50 households to provide for the teaching of reading and writing and for towns of 100 households to have a grammar school by 1647.

Schools first existed on a grammar school level but the extension was made to high school as early as 1874. By 1870 80,000 students were in U.S. schools and by 1950 there were 30 million students.

The early schoolmaster on the frontier had to be a rugged person who handled all grades together in one large room. The chief subjects were the 3R's. Leaders in American Education who were responsible for changes in philosophy and innovations in the system were John Locke, Froebel and Herbart.

Mrs. Verdusco concluded her remarks by reading some requirements for teachers in 1872 and by telling about early days in the Hico School and by displaying the graduation picture of her mother, the late Mrs. Lusk Randalls.

Mrs. Braune illustrated her remarks about the present educational system with copies of current textbooks and other teaching aids in use today in the local schools. She stated that today is an exciting time to teach, that children are caught up in a fast-moving society, and that persons who live in these times must be thinkers. She referred to the new math, the linguistic idea in teaching language, sex education, drug education, career education, and vocational training as examples of changes that have taken place in teaching curriculum in recent years.

Mrs. Braune contrasted the philosophies of education of the past and present, and pointed out that the role of the teachers has changed from that of a "feeder" and a facilitator. Students are now allowed to take part in planning their own curriculum.

Mrs. Koonsman, who was a guest of the club and is currently a student at Tarleton State, spoke on the predictions for education for the future. She stated that she feels that the non-graded school is a phenomenon that is not too far distant in time. In this type of school progress is to be continuous and the child goes at his own rate. Concepts are given to the child on an individual basis and each child must master that concept before he progresses to another level. The child will use the discovery approach, and will experiment with tactile and concrete objects. Interest centers are used in the kindergarten level at this time and this method of teaching will soon be used in more classes. Mrs. Koons-
