## MRS. GOLIGHTLY PRESENTS GARDEN CLUB PROGRAM ON 'ROSE CULTURE'

The Hico Garden Club met Friday, Nov. 9 at 2 p.m. in the Community Center, with Mrs. John Golightly presiding.

Mrs. W. F. O'Reilly led the club prayer, "The Earth is the Lord's" written by Valois Byrd. Roll call was answered by each member naming her favorite rose.

Mrs. W. E. Goynes reminded everyone of the club's Fall Bazaar, to be held Saturday, Nov. 17 in the Community Public Service Building from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. She urged the members to have pies, cakes, cookies, plants, books, artifacts, etc. there early on display for the public to buy.

Mrs. Goynes and Mrs. J. W. Trantham, delegates, reported a pleasant trip to Brownwood Nov. 8 where they attended District 5, Zone 1 fall meeting. Mrs. Goynes won a door prize. Mrs. Savell Sharp, a Hico Club member, was elected a member of the District nominating committee. The Hico Club is fortunate to have Mrs. Trantham as a member. She is a flower show judge, now listed in District 5, as well as in the state.

Mrs. Golightly led the program on "Rose Culture," having each member tell something of importance about roses.

Roses, like other plants, if grown well and kept healthy, will flourish. Growing well means watering enough at the right time, and fertilizing at regular intervals. All garden centers have standard rose foods with instructions for use on the package.

To plant roses it is important to select a place where there is sun at least half of the day. Time for planting is in the fall in this part of the country. However plant container-grown bushes can be planted any time of the year. Roses should not be planted too close together. They should be two or three feet apart to allow adequate air circulation, space for walkways, for easier pruning and spraying. This cuts down the chances of diseases also.

Rose beds should be 12 to 15 inches deep and about 3 feet wide for each row mixing 3 to 5 inches of ground pine bark, peat moss and compost into the soil. To set the bushes out, trim the roots to about 12 inches long, trim the tops to about 8 inches from the base. Place

a mound of soil under the base of each bush so the roots slant downward into the trench. Cover the roots with a good top soil and pack slightly by tamping and watering.

Roses have problems, especially on new growth, such as aphids, thrips in buds, mildew, and black spots on leaves. Insecticides or fungicides should be used in moderation for these. Reading and following instructions and precautions on the label is important. Spraying improves the blooms, also increases winter hardiness.

There are all kinds of roses to choose from. Those for fragrance, borders, climbers, easy growing, lasting cut flowers and show blooms. To have beautiful roses it takes a lot of care and time.

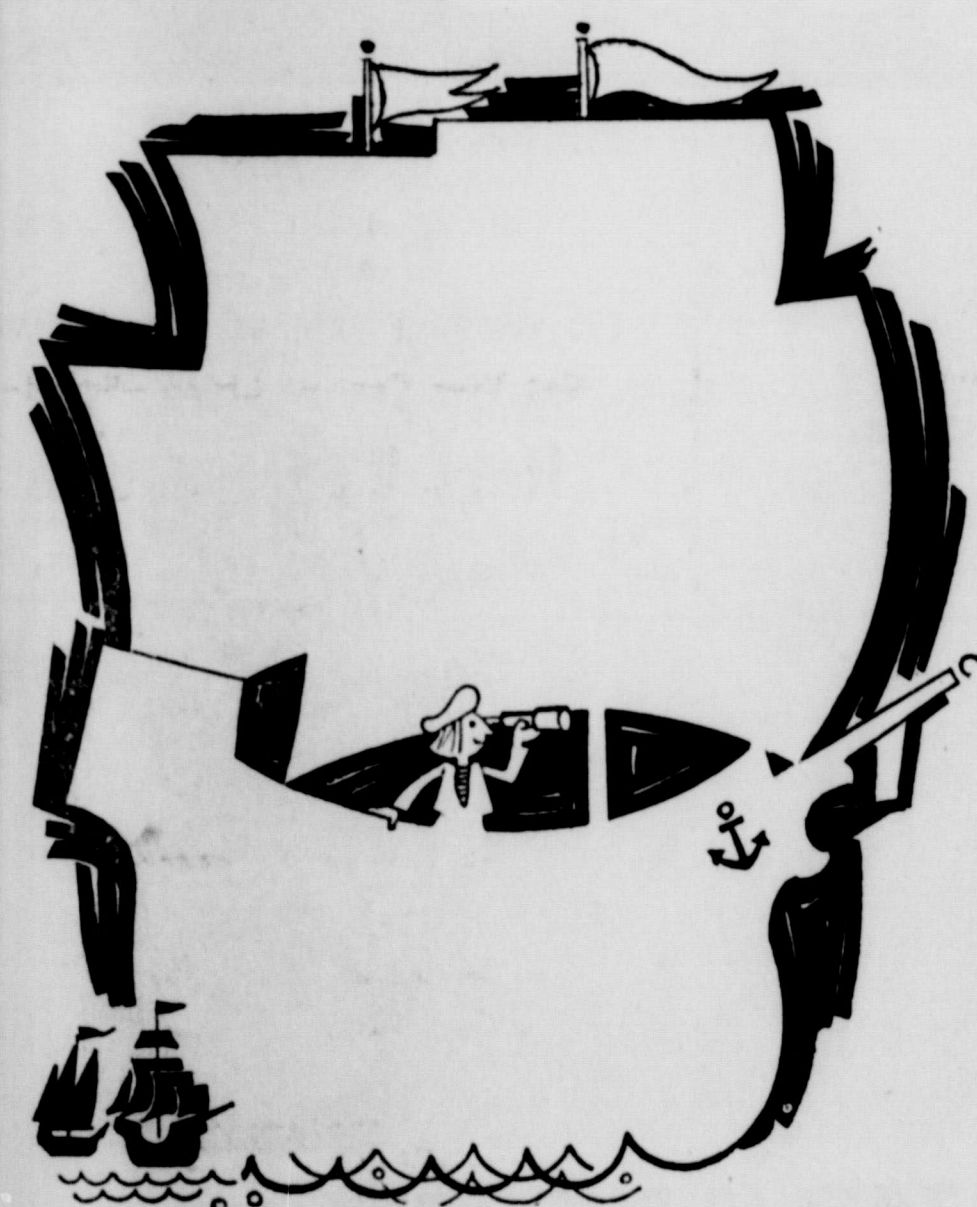

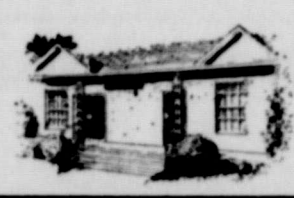

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

There is much concern and uncertainty about the supply of most nitrogen and phosphorus fertilizers for use this fall as well as next year.

Limited power sources for processing phosphates plus export contracts have caused suppliers to allocate materials to dealers in amounts lower than those of last year. It is anticipated that the shortage will continue into next year at least.

Nitrogen materials are also in short supply due to natural gas limits. If production is again limited this winter, supplies will be especially short next year.

Potash supplies look favorable if transportation is available to move them when needed.

With the anticipation of limited fertilizer supplies, it is more important than ever to base fertilization practices on soil and crop requirements. It may even be necessary to establish priorities as to where to apply the fertilizer than can be obtained.

Since the time of applying phosphorus can be varied without a high risk of reduced yields, producers should consider applying this fertilizer when it is available. Phosphorus can be applied in the fall for both forage and field crops.

However, there is less flexibility in applying nitrogen without a yield reduction or low fertilizer efficiency. If nitrogen must be applied at a time not expected to give optimum results, the rate should be increased to offset the expected reduction in available nitrogen.

A reliable soil test provides valuable information for deciding the rate fertilizer application as well as establishing the priority of each field if quantities are limited. Early sampling will give enough time to plan a sound program.
