





#### Form Fuel Will Be Available, According To Cong. Bob Poage

Washington (Spl.)-Chairman W. R. (Bob) Poage of the House Committee on Agriculture expressed guarded optimism last week over prospects that the new fuel allocation regulations just announced by the Federal Energy Office (FEO) would assure agriculture of the fuel needed to meet food and fiber production goals.

"We are pleased that agriculture is given top priority, and is eligible for all of its actual needs," said Chairman Poage in a statement released through his Washington of

"Priorities in themselves, course, are not total assurance, The distributors have to get the supplies to pass on to the nation's farmers and ranchers. We will just hope that 'the petroleum industry will be able to produce these supplies in the quantities needed and see that they are distributed right down the line to the farm tractors, combines and other machinery."

The newly imposed regulations, as outlined by FEO officials to Chairman Poage, provided that agriculture shall get 100 percent of current requirements for gasoline, diesel oil, propane and butane. This priority also extends to such agriculture-related operations as transportation of crops and food processing as well as such activities as cattle feedlot operations. The regulations also authorize 100 percent of current requirements

operations such as crop dusting.

As originally drafted the regulations had called for farmers to receive only 110 percent of their 1972 base period consumption. Poage and the late California Congressman Charles Teague, who was ranking Minority party member of the House Agriculture Committee, jointly addressed a letter to Simon
