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

Hico City Council, meeting Tuesday night instead of the regular Monday meeting date, spent a busy 21/2-hour session going over business and current problems of the city government. All memb were present with the exception of Roy Bates, who has moved to S

Major order of business was a rate increase request from Community Public Service Co., which. after lengthy discussion, was approved. The company has asked for the increase in all towns in the Central Division.

In the request, power company officials pointed out this was only the third rate increase request in 46 years, and the last increase was in 1968. The company also pointed out that during the 46 years, the local power rates had been decreased four times.

The current request calls for an average increase of 12 percent to homeowners and businesses, but local manager O. L. Davis said that the increase would be approximately six percent to those who use very little electricity. He also pointed out that the increase could be as much as 16 percent to some major users of power.

The increase, which was approved unanimously by the Council, will become effective with the next meter reading period.

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
