She quoted from a remark made recently in Sweden in which it was said that America is the best place in which to live today, with better living conditions, more money in salaries, less taxes, and the best working conditions of any place in the world. After telling several other anecdotes Mrs. Randals concluded her remarks by reading the now-famous commentary by Canadian Gordon St. Claire, in which he praises America's actions and wishes her well.

For her topic, Mrs. Morse Ross was also endeavoring to answer a question, "What is Needed to Defend America?"

Mrs. Ross stated that hers is a very timely subject that is getting coverage every day. She indicated that the U.S. has a very great need for improved cooperation between herself and her NATO allies. In recent months Europeans have had a tendency to drag their feet and are putting pressure on this country to reduce her arms. 


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
