Mrs. Dayton Named Clubwoman of Year

Mrs. B. C. Dayton, housewife, mother of four children, and tireless community worker, and member of Hico Review Club, among other organizations, has been designated "Clubwoman of the Year" for the Capitol District, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, which is composed of 53 organizations over a wide area in Central Texas. Mrs. Dayton was nominated for the honor by the Review Club, and the award was presented at a banquet held in Killeen last week. Mrs. Dayton was selected for the honor on the basis of the Review Club's nomination, which read, in part: For the last two years, Mrs. Dayton has worked tirelessly for the school band since she is very interested in music of any sort. She is president of the Hico Band Boosters Club, and was instrumental in getting the study club to select the band as a project for the last two years. With her guidance, the Review Club has bought new music, some new instruments, repaired old instruments, and this year has helped to buy new jackets for all band members. She obtained help from the P-TA and the Civic Club by getting their membership and dues for this purpose. The Review Club has sponsored tasting teas for the last two years to raise money for this project, and Mrs. Dayton has worked valiantly for these projects. Mrs. Dayton is president of the U.M.W. of the Methodist Church; she is soloist in the choir, chairman of the Youth Department; and teaches a senior class in her church school. She has worked with Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, and this year is leader of the Cadets. She is active in Tri-County Medical Auxiliary, and has served in several offices in that organization. She is secretary of the local P-TA and active in all its work. This year she is helping to organize a Hospital Auxiliary for the community.

Mayor, Council, School Posts Up For Grabs

Routine Council Meeting Monday

First order of business at the regular meeting of Hico City Council Monday night was hearing a request from Warner Cable TV for a rate increase for Hico residents using the cable service. Mack Spurlock, manager of the Stephenville District, made the presentation to the Council, and received a "thumbs down" reply from City Dads. In its proposal, Warner had asked for an increase in monthly rates from \$5.00 to \$6.00, and an additional increase of fifty cents per month for each additional connection. Also for an increase in installation charges from \$7.50 to \$12.50. Council members expressed their opinion that this was not the proper time to propose the increase, and asked the company to present the proposition at the next regular meeting. Don Ross, Hico Fire Chief, met with the Council with two requests for improvements for the volunteer organization. First, Ross asked that the back wall of the present fire station be removed to facilitate proper storage of equipment, extending the station into the city-owned building directly behind the present building. Ross also asked the Council to consider installing an overhead fill line in the station for use in replenishing water supplies for both city and rural trucks. Council authorized both proposals, and instructed City Supt. W. R. Hampton to proceed with the work. Figures were presented on cleaning, painting and repairing the three major water storage units at City Water Works, with the low figure submitted being \$4,350.00 for all three units. Broken down, the cost figures were \$1250 for each of the two upright tanks, and \$1850.00 for the tower. Hampton was authorized to contact the company in regard to re-doing the tower only at this time. Other topics up for consideration were: street improvements; new lights for several sections of town; re-appointment of Dr. B. C. Dayton as City Health Officer; right-of-way yield signs for new streets; one city tax matter; and the matter of filling in ditches along Highway 281 near Hico Hills Inn.

Voters Have Wide Choice In Saturday Balloting

With a full slate of candidates in the City and School elections, slated Saturday, April 6, a record number of voters are expected to turn out at the polls and cast their ballots for the person or persons of their choice. Most of the interest generated in the elections has been in city politics, with the school race very quiet. Heading the list of offices to be filled is that of Mayor, where incumbent O. L. Davis is being challenged by James D. Brown. In the Council race, seven candidates are seeking three places to be filled. In the order that they appear on the ballot, Council candidates are: Jerry Casey, Louise Blair, Dean Hyles, W. C. Howard, Van Brush, Ron T. Hefner, and Gary E. Connolly. Davis, local manager for Community Public Service Co., is seeking his fourth two-year term of office as mayor, having been elected in 1968. Brown, retired apartment owner, is asking for his first term of office. Only one of the seven candidates for the Council is seeking re-election. W. C. Howard, local druggist, is asking for another term of office. The other six candidates have varied occupations. Casey is owner of Casey Television; Miss Blair owns Blair's Hardware; Mrs. Hyles owns Hyles' Dress Shop; Brush is a local stock farmer; Hefner is a building contractor; and Connolly is an attorney. School Election. In School Trustee balloting the five candidates are incumbents Guy Bulman and D. L. McCoy, and the newcomers seeking election for the first time are Don Ross, Floyd Drake and Marvin Walters. Bulman is a postal employee, McCoy is in the real estate business, Ross is associated with H & B Food Store, Drake is employed at First National Bank, and Walters is administrator of Hico City Hospital. Also on the school ballot are two other offices to be filled, that of County Trustee, Precinct 3, and County Trustee-at-Large. V. H. Jenkins of Hico is seeking re-election to another term as Precinct 3 trustee, and Lagree West of Hamilton is a candidate for re-election to the at-large post. Polling Places. Both City and School election will be held at the Community Center. Mrs. H. V. Hedges is judge for the city voting, and Mrs. L. J. Chaney will be in charge of school balloting. Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and remain open until 7:00 p.m. Voting Qualifications. Any person who has been a resident of the City of Hico for at least six months, and who is a qualified registered voter may vote in the city election. In school balloting, any person residing within the boundaries of Hico Independent School District for a period of not less than six months is eligible, provided that they have previously qualified by registering.

Monthly Income Will Be Held Here Friday

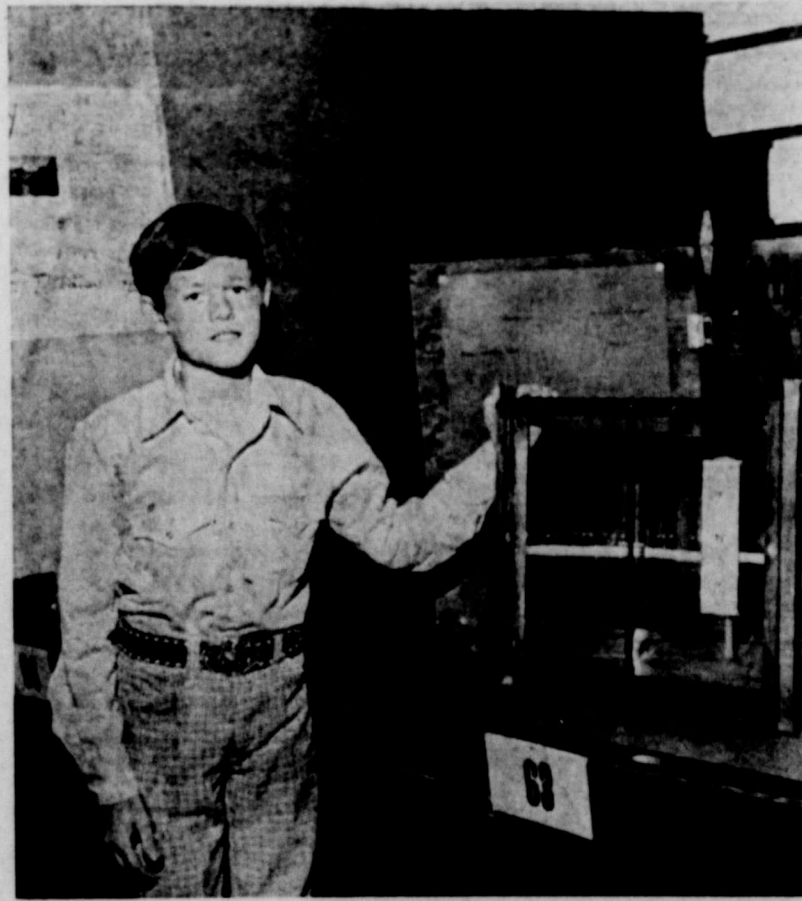

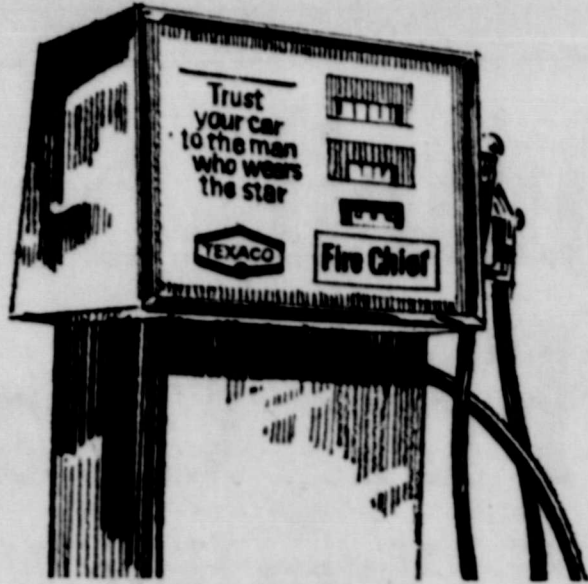

REVIEW CLUB PROGRAM PRESENTED BY MRS. ROSS AND MRS. RANDALS

Mrs. Robert Jackson opened her home to Hico Review Club members for their regular bi-monthly meeting on March 29. A refreshment plate was served as the group gathered.

In the absence of the Club President, Mrs. Bryan Angell, Mrs. J. C. Braune presided at the business session.

A report from the district convention, that was held last week in Killeen, revealed that Hico Review Club received two first place awards for programs presented during the club year.

Mrs. Marvin Marshall gave a federation report in which she revealed recent events in the struggle to get through legislation to preserve 1,000 acres in East Texas' Big Thicket. Due to a cancelled program in January, two related topics were presented. Mrs. E. H. Randals Jr. gave the first part of the program in answering the question, "What is Good About America?"

Mrs. Randals stated that the answers to the question are varied, that many good things are in evidence in our country and that many things that we criticize and find fault with are the best to be had the world over. She quoted from a remark made recently in Sweden in which it was said that America is the best place in which to live today, with better living conditions, more money in salaries, less taxes, and the best working conditions of any place in the world. She also pointed out that a place is as good as the people who live in it and related several incidents which show the inherent goodness of America.

One was about a retired teacher in the New York area who, at the age of 82 years, is still teaching typing and other skills to handicapped children and adults.

In Lenore, North Carolina, a man recently gave some acreage to a group of 4-H Club members in gratitude for the many things they had done for his daughter who was confined to an iron lung for many years.

School children in Meridan, Pa. recently sent two newly-hatched butterflies to Florida by plane so they could escape the cold weather.

In Louisville, Kentucky a bus driver received permission to change his route so that a blind man could get to and from work without making four transfers as had previously been necessary.

A 79-year-old hospital volunteer has logged over 5,000 hours of service in hospitals in the Freeport, Pa. area.

A Mini-Mart owner drives his bus into poorer sections in Louisiana and sells his goods at cost to bring help to those in need.

In Fort Worth, a hairdresser drives over 700 miles per week as she takes her services to invalids.

Two ex-medics of the Green Berets who saw service in Vietnam give one day per week to helping care for burn victims in Dallas hospitals.

After telling several other anecdotes Mrs. Randals concluded her remarks by reading the now-famous commentary by Canadian Gordon St. Claire, in which he praises America's actions and wishes her well.

For her topic, Mrs. Morse Ross was also endeavoring to answer a question, "What is Needed to Defend America?"

Mrs. Ross stated that hers is a very timely subject that is getting coverage every day. She indicated that the U.S. has a very great need for improved cooperation between herself and her NATO allies. In recent months Europeans have had a tendency to drag their feet and are putting pressure on this country to reduce her arms. In recent times we have discovered that Portugal was the only country willing to allow the U.S. to fly planes from her bases to supply Israel after recent meetings to end the oil embargo, two of the Arab countries declined to raise the boycott against the U.S. America has been very angry with French officials for their part in keeping the embargo going.

The SALT II (Strategic Arms Limitation Talks) from which Henry Kissinger has just returned have

not been particularly favorable or fruitful.

There is concern about Russia's missile strength since we have learned that Russia has flight-tested multiple, independently (target) re-entry vehicles atop two big missiles (MIRV).

A MIRV is a nuclear warhead that can deliver destruction in several spots instead of one—they can be dropped off at specific spots along the missile's route.

The U.S. has had MIRV's since 1968 and 300 of our 1000 Minutemen Missiles now have them.

At this time the USSR has no operational MIRV's but they will probably have them operational by 1975.

U.S. bombers are the key to the Strategic Air Command. There are more than 400 to Russia's 140. The U.S. is hopeful to replace B-52's with B-1's in a few years. Hundreds of tactical bombers are based in Europe and on aircraft carriers.

The U.S. can attempt to reach an agreement with Russia to cut

all strategic weapons of both powers but the U.S. will insist on ground inspection for MIRV's. Russia has never agreed to ground inspection at any time.

The U.S. has pressing needs for defense, including: A medium-size bomber fleet; Fighter planes of newer design; More air-transport planes for quicker troop movement; Keeping a superior electronic detector system; Stepping up research and shortening time from drawing board to testing; Keeping an up-to-date use of spy satellites and to continue open spy policy; Making more efficient use of the more than 80 billion dollar budget available; Correctly reading the attitudes of the American people concerning defense.

The huge proposed 85.8 million budget for 1975 shows that the U.S. is ready to go all-out in the arms race and that the money is available if it is necessary to do so and no agreement with Russia can be reached.

The key programs in response to Russia's bid for missile superiority will include:

1. Tridents—building 10 nuclear subs equipped with MIRV's; 2.

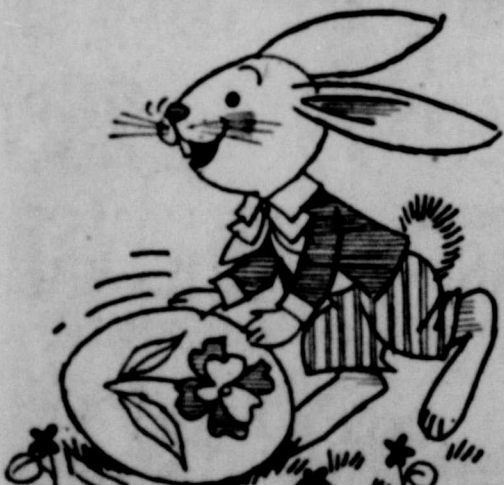

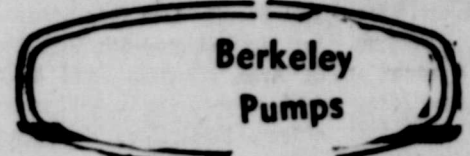
