Hamilton County Voters Favor Dolph; Dislike Betting

Hamilton County voters expressed a strong opinion at the polls in the May 4 Primary, showing that they liked Dolph Briscoe as Governor, while indicating a dislike for the issue of pari-mutuel betting.

Gov. Briscoe won overwhelming approval among county residents, polling 1624 votes to Farenthold's 290. W. H. Posey got 29 votes, and Steve Alexander garnered 32.

On the betting issue, Hamilton County rejected the proposal 1300 to 631.

In the only race affecting all of Hamilton County, Genevieve Clark won a clear-cut victory over two opponents. Mrs. Clark, incumbent County Clerk, polled 1001 votes to win the newly combined office of County-District Clerk. Mrs. Betty Harris challenged with 723 votes, and Clarence Schaeider received 273

for the post. Mrs. Clark had a 5-vote margin over her two opponents, avoiding a runoff.

Hico voters followed the trend of the overall county balking by giving Briscoe a 177-vote total. Farenthold received 36, Posey one, and Alexander two.

Hicoans voted against the betting issue, 167 to 71, and favored Mrs. Clark with 141 votes. Mrs. Harris received 79, and Mr. Schneider 18.

Council Grants Rate Increase, Frown on City Park Dancing

A rate increase for a service company, delinquent taxes, committee appointments, and curtailment of dances at City Park were major topics of discussion at the regular City Council meeting Monday night.

On the first count, Councilmen granted a rate increase to Warner Cable TV, who had requested the increase at a previous meeting, but the Council's decision was postponed until Monday. Mack Spurlock, manager of Warner for Hico, Stephenville and Dublin, presented

the rate proposal, which increases local fees from \$5.00 to \$6.00 per month for single connects, and from 50c to \$1.00 for each additional outlet. Also approved was an increase in installation fees from \$7.50 to \$12.50.

The Council voted unanimously to grant the increases. New rates will be effective with July billing.

On the matter of delinquent taxes, Council members authorized the City Secretary to submit the list to the law firm of McMullen, Connally and Vance for collection.

Curtailed of the open dances which have been held in City Park came in for a major share of discussion during the three-hour meeting.

After discussing the pros and cons, members voted to require a license for anyone who wishes to stage a dance without first being granted this permission.

Standing committees were also appointed by Mayor O. L. Davis, as follows:

Other action by the Council included election of Wayne Rutledge as Mayor Pro-Tem; and discussions on the local nightwatchman situation, water and sewer projects, street improvements, and proposed Revenue Sharing spending for the fiscal year.

L. J. Chaney Involved In Accident Near Cleburne Last Week

Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Chaney were involved in a pickup-car accident Thursday morning, May 2, about 11 o'clock near the edge of Cleburne as they were enroute home from Fort Worth.

Mr. Chaney, driver of the car, was attempting a left hand turn at a highway crossover when his car was hit from the rear by a pickup driven by a Burleson man.

The Chaney's were conveyed to Cleburne Memorial Hospital for observation, where Mr. Chaney was released and Mrs. Chaney remained a patient until Tuesday of this week. She received a severe neck whiplash and bruises. The driver of the pickup was uninjured.

Both vehicles received considerable damage.

Wiley C. Roberts, 72, of Killeen passed away in Temple Wednesday, May 1 following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services for Mr. Roberts were held at 2 p.m. Friday, May 3, in the Harper-Calasek Funeral Chapel in Killeen, with interment in Killeen Memorial Park. Elder F. C. Huggins conducted the services.

Mr. Roberts was a former Hico resident, having moved from here to Killeen in 1943. He retired from the Civil Service in 1967 after 31 years service with the Post Engineers. He was a World War I Veteran and a member of the Primitive Baptist Church.

HERO Honorary Memberships were presented to Mr. Bill Howard and Mrs. Floyd Clifton.

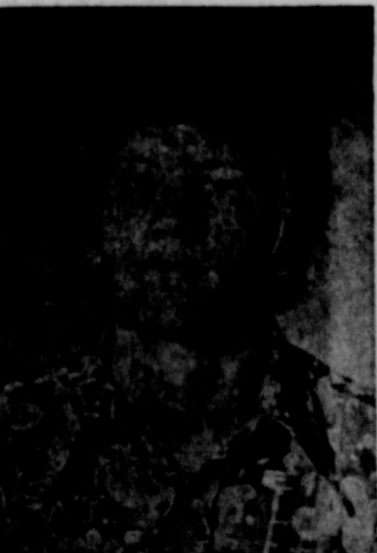
