Jackie J. Bullion, currently serving as assistant football and head track coach at LaVega High School in Waco, has been employed by the Hico Schools as head football coach for the upcoming season.

Bullion succeeds Dwain Gray, who resigned during the past school term to enter private business.

Mr. Bullion, 31, is a 1960 graduate of Brownwood High School, and received his degree from Howard Payne College in 1963. He is married, and he and his wife, Cheryl, have one daughter, Michelle, age 3½.

The new coach has a long list of experience, including coaching Junior High at Santa Anna in 1965-66; 1st assistant football, JV basketball and head baseball coach at Yorktown in 1966-67; and 1st assistant football, head basketball and tennis coach at Brookshire in 1967-69.

From 1969 to 1971 he was 1st assistant football, and head track coach at Floresville.

From Floresville, Bullion went to Lampasas where he served as 1st assistant football, JV basketball, and head track coach. He left Lampasas in 1973 to accept the La Vega position.

Mr. Bullion said that he and his family would be moving to Hico soon, and was looking forward to working with the local schools.

## Stephenville Duo Cops 2nd Annual Golf Tournament

A team composed of brothers Edward and Tommie Brooks of Stephenville blizzered Bluebonnet Country Club's links with a record 11-under par 61 last Saturday to stake themselves to a 5-shot lead going into the second day of play, and eventually won the second annual golf tournament by four shots over G. ## Iredell Masons Honored on Cent of 100th Anniversary

MRS. VINITA BLAKLEY, Sunday, June 16, Iredell No. 850, Order of the Eastern Star, honored the Iredell Masons on the occasion of its centennial anniversary.

D. Tidwell, editor of the Freeman, who is a nephew of the Iredell, gave a history of the lodge.

A plaque commemorating the centennial was presented to Wayne VanWinkle, Worshipful Master, by Donna Word, Worthy Matron. In 1873, a dispensation: Iredell Lodge was granted, and in 1874, the Charter was granted by the Grand Lodge. There were 24 members.

Members were J. Alexander R. Alford, W. B. Anderson, E. H. Bar-P. Collins, F. M. Conley,

E. C. Crawford, G. W. Daken, E. L. Deatherage, Norris Foster, W. L. Fox, G. A. Gordon, J. S. Hanna, W. V. Jones, Wm. Mingus, J. J. Morris, L. A. Ogle, G. W. Roberts, N. B. Ross, S. J. Siddall, J. M. Thompson, T. M. Tipton, and A. M. Trimble.

The first Worshipful officer was G. A. Gordon, who served as Master for the first five years. The Lodge Hall burned following a meeting on September 7, 1873, and the lodge did not meet again until March 1, 1879 when the meeting was held in the Odd Fellow Hall.

After a year the Lodge began meeting in their hall in the newly erected school building in 1880. They continued to meet there until a new school was built in 1910. The Lodge purchased the second story of the G. M. Carlton Bros. Store and continued to meet there until 1922 when the building was destroyed by fire. The present building was then purchased and the Lodge has met there since that time.

The Lodge has had many trying times, but members have been faithful to keep it going. At one time the membership totaled 88.

Due to the Lodge organization, a Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star was granted a charter for the second time at Grand Chapter in San Antonio in October, 1939. For this reason the Eastern Star decided to honor the Masons on their 100th anniversary. Approximately 100 attended.

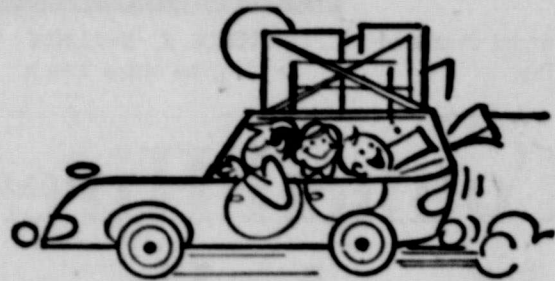

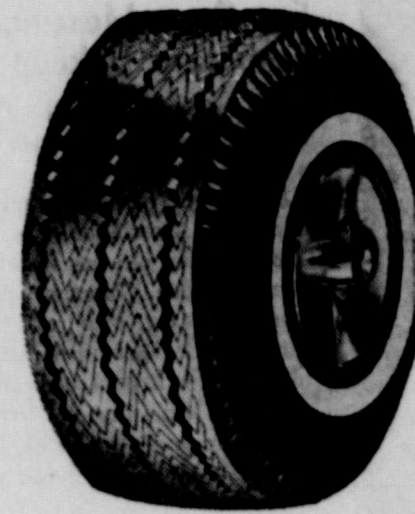

It is wise to keep a listing of all insurance policies in auto clubs, fraternal and service clubs, unions and professional organizations, so that survivors will know of all insurance in effect. A similar list of bank accounts, safe deposit box, investments and securities is also advisable.
