Reunion Pageant, Parade Committee Chairmen Named

With the 88th Annual Old Settlers Reunion only four weeks away, committees have been busy making plans and preparations for the event, dates for which are July 31, August 1, 2 and 3.

Matt Ware will be in charge of the popular homecoming, which is the oldest in the state, and the event will be kicked off with the traditional parade. Parade Chairman this year is Rev. Doyle Henderson, pastor of the Methodist Church. Rev. Henderson has contacted Fort Hood to supply a military band to lead the parade, also the Waco Shriners, all surrounding towns and other organizations, inviting their entries. No official confirmations had been received from contacts yet, but are expected in the next few days.

Mr. Ware said that entertainment had already been booked for all four nights of the Reunion, with the first night featuring a home-

town band, The Rhythm Masters, who will play under the pavilion. Thursday night, Tony Douglas and The Shrimpers will be the featured band, and Friday night is reserved for the Miss Reunion Contest. Saturday, final night of the four-day event, Joe Paul Nichols and His Five Pennies will be featured entertainer.

Beauty Contest. Mrs. Jerry Casey has been appointed chairman of the popular Miss Reunion Contest, and will be assisted by Mrs. Edd Schneider, Mrs. Leldon Clifton and Mrs. Floyd Clifton, with possibly others named later.

In announcing rules for the contest, Mrs. Casey said "It's time to start making plans to enter the Miss Reunion Contest." Entry blanks will be placed in all stores in Hico. Merchants may secure their own entry or may contact Mrs. Casey for a list of senior division girls that would like to be in the

pageant but haven't secured a sponsor. Girls wishing to enter, but do not have a sponsor may fill out an entry blank and mail to Mrs. Casey or leave at Casey's TV and a sponsor will be provided.

Following is a list of rules for the pageant:

1. Two divisions will be held, a Little Miss for girls age 3-6, and the regular senior division for girls age 14-18.
2. Both divisions are open to any area girl. Local area is considered to be Hico and Iredell School Districts.
3. The young division is open to girls age 3 through 6. They will not be sponsored but must be entered by parents and pay a registration fee of \$3.00 to Mrs. Casey, or leave at Casey's TV.
4. Senior division is open to local area girls age 14 through 18. The contestants must be sponsored by a Hico business firm or area organization.
5. Deadline for entry is Saturday noon, July 27.
6. Older contestants will be judged in formal wear, and younger girls will be judged in street dress attire.
7. Entries will be judged on poise, personality and beauty.
8. Registration fee of \$4.00 must be paid in advance with entry blank, and contestants will not be qualified until fee has been paid.

Regular Council Meeting Held

Hico City Council, meeting in regular session Monday night, spent a busy 2½ hour session on general city business.

First order was hearing a request from a representative of the men's softball team for permission to use City Park for a dance to be held Aug. 23. The request was granted.

Mr. and Mrs. O. F. King, who hold the contract for city trash pickup, requested that their contract be renewed, citing the August expiration date of the original pact between them and the City. The contract was renewed by unanimous vote.

Three representatives from the Fire Department, Chief Don Ross, Ronnie Mayfield and Tommie Johnson also appeared before the council with several requests. First request was for continuation of the work to remove the back wall of fire station to the adjoining building to give more storage space. Second was a request to install a truck fill line in the station. Both projects were approved by the council several months ago, but the work has not been completed.

The firemen also asked for four new joints of 2½-inch hose to replace faulty sections on the city truck. Council authorized the hose ordered. Chief Ross told of some of the plans being made by the department, foremost of which was acquiring a panel truck to carry needed small equipment. Ross said that the department planned to purchase the truck with monies raised through benefit dances, contributions, etc.

Harry Hudson, Hico Postmaster since 1971, retired June 30 after 26 years in the postal service.

Mr. Hudson was appointed Postmaster April 3, 1971, after serving as Officer in Charge of the local office since Aug. 1, 1970. He succeeded Robert Jackson.

G. M. Bullard, clerk, has been named Officer in Charge at the local office and he will serve in that capacity until a Postmaster is appointed.

Hudson's postal career began in 1948 when he was named substitute clerk. He continued in that capacity until other clerks retired or transferred, and became chief clerk.

A native of Hico, Hudson is a graduate of University of Texas,

and served from 1942 until 1945 with the U.S. Navy, attaining the rank of lieutenant.

The retiree was honored with a dinner Monday evening, July 1 in the dining room of the Koffee Kup Cafe, hosted by postal employees.

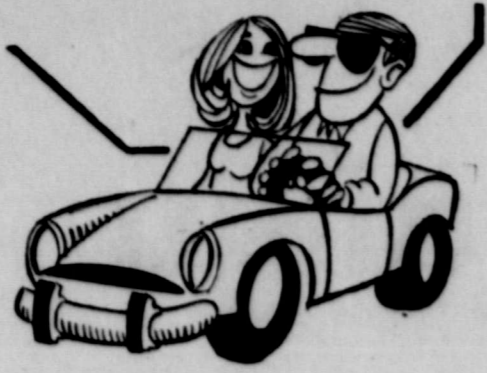


END CLINIC — The Hico School Cheerleaders attended the second session of the annual Tarleton State University Cheerleaders Clinic held

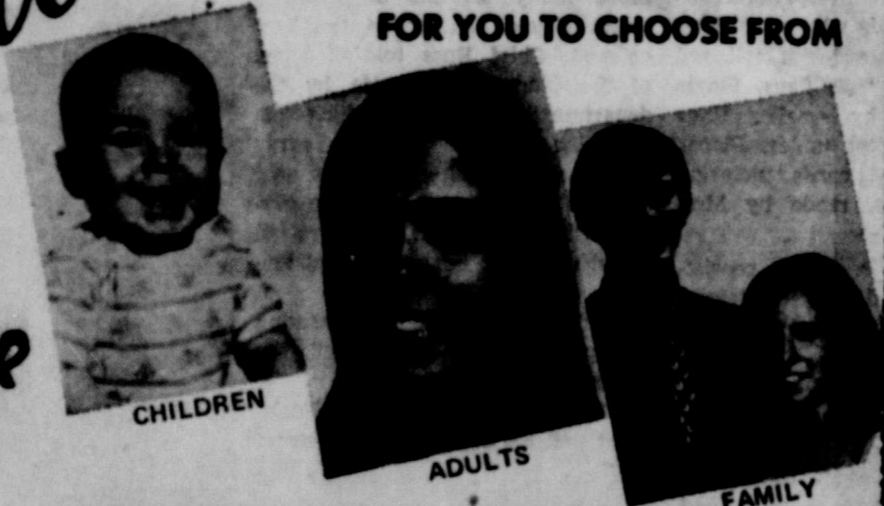

On the Home Range

Homemade snack crackers provide taste treats at a fraction of the cost of store-bought ones. Simply prepare them from ordinary soda crackers.

First, separate crackers and place on a cookie sheet. Brush with melted margarine or butter, or slightly diluted egg white, and add topping. Toast in a 400-degree oven until slightly brown.

Possible toppings include season-

ed salt, poppy seeds, sesame seeds, parmesan cheese or any other desired flavoring.

Bread sticks and other shapes can be prepared similarly, using inexpensive refrigerator biscuits that come in a tube.

First, cut each biscuit into four pieces. Shape each as desired, into a ball, bread stick or knot.

Coat with margarine or egg white, and top with seeds or seasoning, such as sesame or poppy seeds, garlic salt or vegetable flakes.

Or, divide a bread slice into strips for another type of bread stick. Roll each in melted butter or margarine, add topping, and toast in oven, turning once to brown both sides.

Although inexpensive enough to use every day, these crackers and bread sticks are great for guests and special occasions.

From primarily work clothes, denim has come into its own as the "darling" of male and female fashions.

However, denim's popularity isn't limited to the U.S. It has branched out around the world in the so-called "American Look."

Currently produced at a rate of 400 million yards a year, U.S. denim producers could sell 100 million yards more if they had the capacity, manpower and time to produce it.

Denim, a shortened form of "Serges de Nimes," means a product of Nimes, a city in France.

Mrs. Boone Named Chairman for 'Breath Of Life' Campaign

Mrs. Bob Boone has been named chairman in Hico of the September Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung-damaging diseases, according to Kenneth J. Machintosh, president of the Dallas Area Chapter, National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation.

Mrs. Boone will head local volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis and bronchiectasis.

Approximately one of every 1,500 babies is born with cystic fibrosis, which is still incurable. The disease is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene. 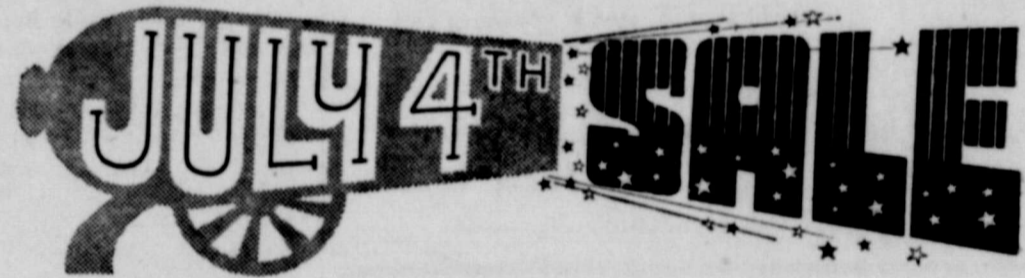

Items of Interest From Iredell . . .

By MRS. VINITA BLAKLEY

IREDELL, BOSQUE COUNTY

Some interesting notes from "Bosque Territory," a history of an Agrarian Community, by William C. Pool, copyrighted in 1964, read as follows:

Iredell, located on the Bosque River 16 miles northwest of Meridian, originated in the late 1850's when Ward Keeler settled near the site and Manse Walker built a cabin about two miles below the town on the north side of the river near the confluence of Walker Creek and the Bosque.

Named for Keeler, the son of Ward Keeler, the settlement was moved in 1880 from its original site near the Walker homestead to the south bank of the Bosque near the Texas Central Railroad station. Later in the same year a flood completely destroyed the village. Twenty-seven business houses and homes washed down the Bosque and the town was rebuilt on higher ground.

Other pioneer residents of Iredell included George Washington Roberts, who came to Bosque County in 1867 as a farmer and Baptist minister. (Roberts organized a Baptist Church near Iredell in 1868); William Mingus, who located near the town in 1867 and established a "crude log cabin, sixteen by sixteen," later replaced by a "box house where he kept a stage tavern for travelers."

Joseph B. Parks and Frances Conoley, both businessmen, and Dr. M. B. Grace, the pioneer physician

of the community.

In early 1882 Iredell was described in an article written for "Texas Siftings," a publication produced at that time in Austin. The editors of the periodical described Iredell as follows:

Iredell is the only town on the Texas Central Railroad in Bosque County, west of Morgan. This village is pleasantly located on both sides of the Bosque River, has some 350 inhabitants, a half dozen general merchandise houses and one drug store, two hotels, one blacksmith shop, one livery stable, two steam cotton gins, one of the best mills, and decidedly the best school in Bosque County. Professor R. J. Richey and B. J. Word certainly deserve credit for overcoming former sectarian bickerings and dissensions in the community, and as it were being order out of chaos, and placing upon a solid base one of the best regulated and most progressive schools in Central Texas. There is also an abundance of fine water, splendid stone, female beauty and "fleas" in Iredell, also a brass band.

These few notes from the book show how prosperous Iredell once was and will always live up to the slogan, "Iredell, the little city with a big heart."

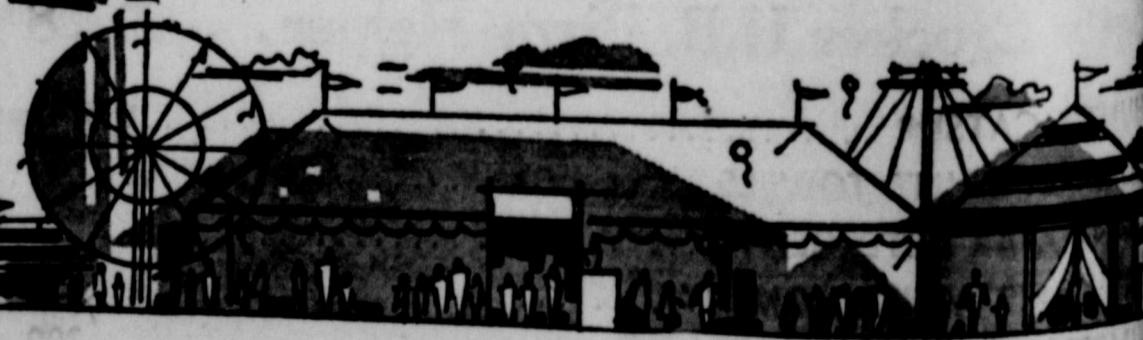

County Agent Reports

By JOE ALLEN

A large number of Fall webworms are in evidence in pecan trees in Hamilton County. Fall webworm spends the winter in pupae stage. The deep reddish-brown pupae is about half inch in length with a thin, net-like cocoon around it. The overwintering pupae may be found in bark fissures on a tree trunk or limb, under stones or soil litter, under roofing tile or wall boards, or inside garages and storehouses.

Fall webworm moth emerges from the overwintering pupae stage in May or early June. The adult moth is white in color with some moths having the forewings spotted with black dots. The moth's body is about one inch in length with a wing span of about one and a half inches.

The female moth deposits her eggs on the underside of the leaf in a cluster. Rarely are eggs deposited on the front side of the leaf. Egg clusters are light green in coloration when first deposited on the leaf. The female covers the eggs with soft hair from her body.

Eggs of the first generation hatch in 7 to 14 days. The newly hatched webworms are small in size and are a yellowish-tan in color with the body covered with fine hairs.

Young worms start feeding immediately on the leaf that harbor the egg cluster. The small worms form a small structure of webbing over the leaves. As feeding progresses, additional webbing is spun to cover adjacent leaves.

At first the worms eat just the surface of the leaf they are on, but after a week or two they eat all but the toughest of the leaves that they have covered with their webbing.

The grown webworm is about 1 1/2 inches in length. Worms are usually light tan in color, with reddish warts on their body that have brownish hairs emerging from them. The head is reddish brown in color.

The first generation fall webworm feeds for 4 to 5 weeks before reaching maturity. All feeding is done inside the web.

Malathion or Sevin sprays will provide effective control. Read the label carefully before applying a treatment.


