# Enrollment Drop Small In Schools

Hico Schools opened Monday for the 1974-75 term, and when enrollment figures were compiled the tally showed the total to be six below the start of last year's session.

Enrollment through Wednesday morning was 129 in high school, as compared with 130 last year, and 254 in elementary school compared to 259 at start of the 1973 term.

Largest class in elementary school this week was the eighth grade with 41 students, and smallest was Kindergarten with 20.

In high school the sophomore

class registered 40 students to top those four grades, and the smallest number was 29 in the senior class.

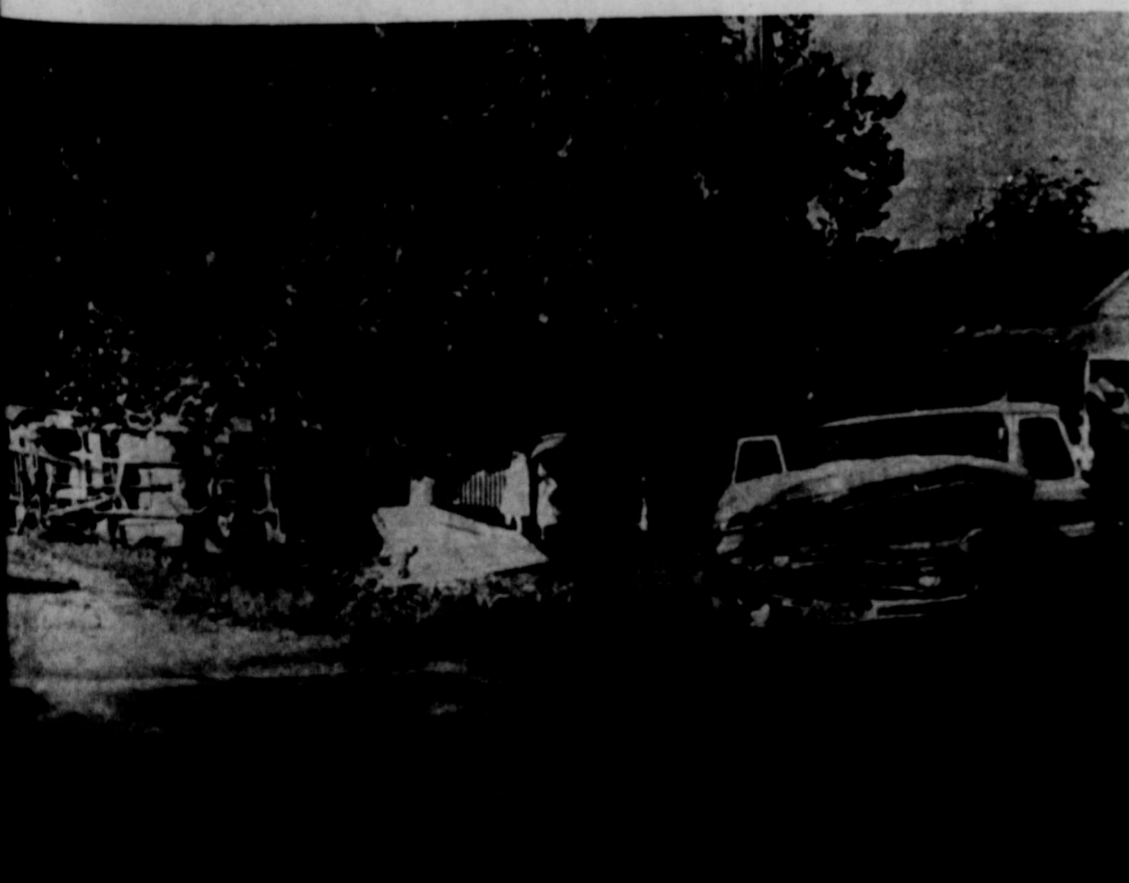
## Mother and Son Among Degree Recipients From Tarleton State

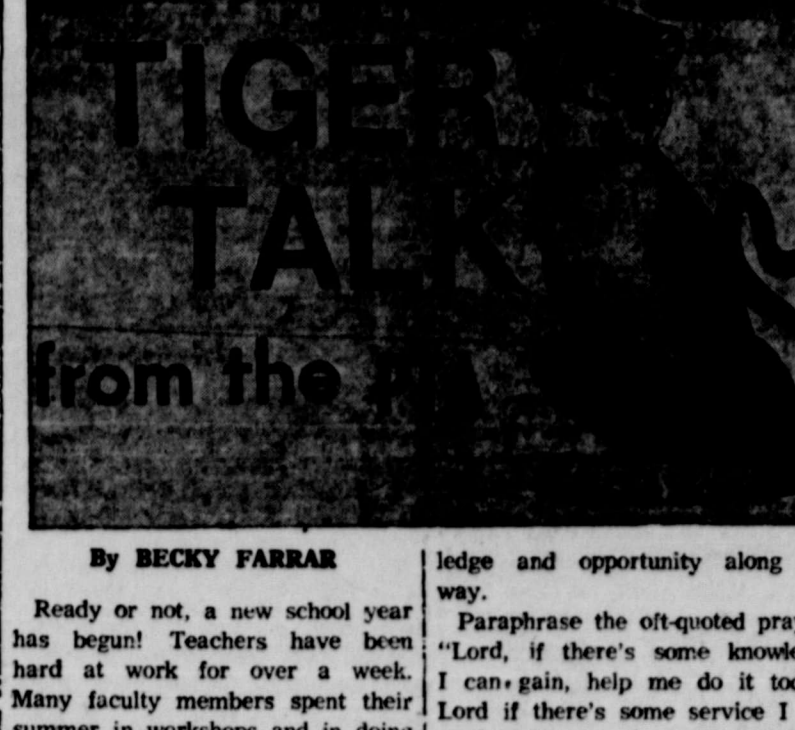

## COUNTY AGENT

Hamilton County pecan producers should be aware to the fact that a large number of Pecan Weevils are starting to attack the nutlets in the area. Mr. C. I. Thomas has reported finding a number of Pecan Weevils on the river.

The Adult Pecan Weevil usually emerge in late summer following rains such as we have had recently. You may check for Pecan Weevils by spreading canvas or any type of sheet beneath the trees and shaking lower branches. When three or more weevils per tree are found, spray should be applied. Repeat application as needed at 10-14 day intervals. Eighty percent wettable Carbaryl is recommended per 100 gallons of water.

Cases of blackleg in cattle are increasing over Texas, according

to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at A&M University. Thus cattlemen should take the necessary precautions to protect young animals from the fatal disease.

Raising calves without immunization is hazardous. Most cattlemen realize the danger of blackleg and routinely vaccinate their calves. However some become complacent

because they don't hear of leg outbreaks and therefore vaccinate.

Vaccinating calves too early cause blackleg. Calves up to months of age fail to develop lasting immunity. Vaccination be at the age of four months should be repeated annually as the animal is at least two old.

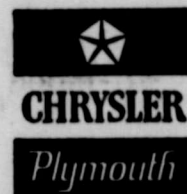

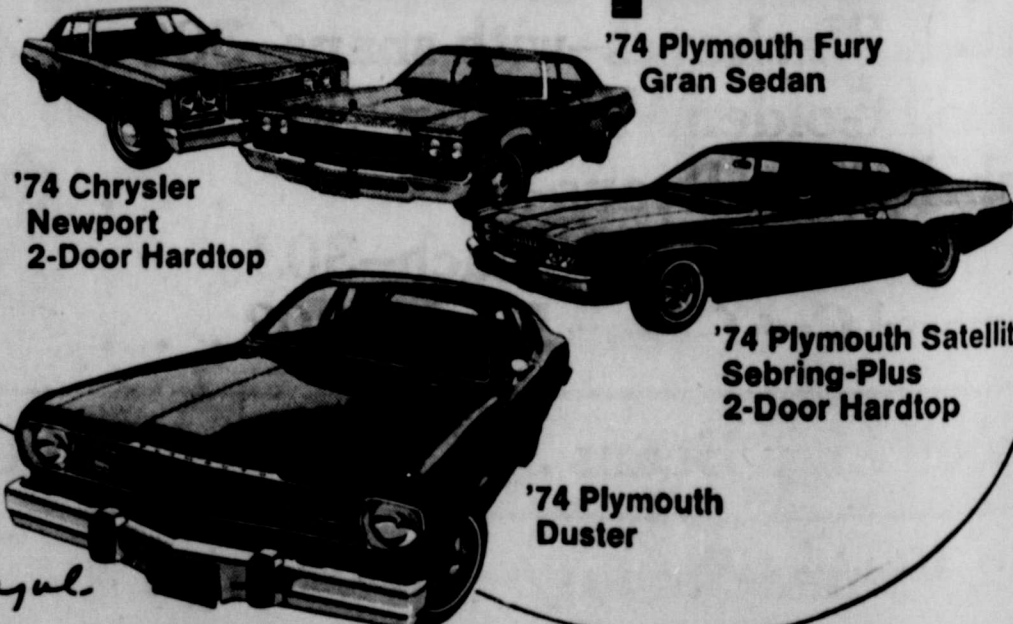

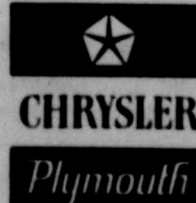
