Everybody's talking about inflation. For years Italy has been the object of many jokes, such as having to carry a bucket full of lire to buy a bag full of groceries. Will our dollars become likewise?

During the depression years our country began trading independence for government help. Government intervention meant more federal control. After World War II governmental control received strong support and led to the Employment Act of 1946. It declared the policy and responsibility of government was to promote high employment, maximum purchasing power, and growth. Since that time, legislators and voters have wrestled with the "how" of attaining these goals.

Since 1971, Phases 1, II, III and IV have been attempts to slow down the rate of inflation. We all know the disastrous results of wage and price controls in creating unnatural market situations. We well know the inequities in applying these controls, particularly in agricultural markets. Very close to home we know about the prices of meat, milk, feed; the shortage of fertilizer, wire and lumber. We have given up the free enterprise system in bits and pieces. We have forgotten that supply and demand sets fair prices. Supply and demand can no longer fluctuate honestly because of imports, exports, price fixing, crop allotments, and all the controls thereof.

When we let our legislators pass these bills, did we know what they were going to cost? Did anyone dream what the cost of social security would be four decades after its inception? (\$82.5 billion dollars this year). So we are shackled by deficit financing.

Meanwhile, back at the P-TA. Hico could well use a new school bus. Our total annual bus budget is \$16,000. After 1975, due largely to new safety and emission requirements, a new bus will cost between \$16,000 and \$40,000. Our bonded indebtedness, principal only, is \$206, 000, including \$7,000 on the Fairy School and \$19,000 on the Carlton School. Our school board financed our new Junior High building over only a five-year period at a very low interest rate. Our total annual school budget is \$284,685.

Our local ad valorem tax base is only \$6,150,000. Our tax rate is \$1.40 per \$100.00 valuation, based on er, A. E. Tucker, Eric Parks, Mickone-fourth assessed value. We all know that the assessment value is extremely low. For example, range Kati Ballard, Frank McAnaliy land is valued at \$100.00 per acre and taxed at \$25.00 per acre.
