He said Bell's single biggest problem was finding repairmen and technicians. Our VoAg boys will never have that problem. They are learning the most effective way, by doing. Mr. Partain lectures, teaches, sets up guidelines, and enforces safety rules; but the real learning takes place in the shop. The learner re-discovers in part the material that he learns. 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
