Tigers Host Zebras in District Game

Tigers, still seeking win for the year, will host the Zebras Friday night in the annual Homecoming game, and are high for that initial win year.

The two teams have met six times previously, with the Tigers winning five and the Zebras one victory in all of the con-

tests. In 1968, the Tigers won 22-6, came back in 1969 with a 31-0 win, in 1970 it was 47-6, and in 1971, the locals took the Zebras by a 33-12 count. The worst licking handed out by the Tigers was in 1972 when the Zebras went down 52-7, and the locals won 21-14 last year.

Grandview's season record was not available, but they have one win and a loss for action in district play. The Zebras dropped a decision to Whitney, and came back last week to down Itasca by a 27-12 count.

The Zebras are led by Butch Johnson, who scored on runs of one, 43, and 41 yards in the winning effort last week. Johnson also passed for a conversion point. The do-everything back scored both of the Zebras' touchdowns in their losing effort against the Tigers last year.

Game time Friday will be 8 o'clock.

Former Resident Killed in California Oil Field Accident

Services for Herbert Maurice Gregory, 44, of Ventura, Calif., formerly of Hico, who was killed Thursday, Oct. 17 in an accident on Getty Oil Field site near Chatsworth, were held at 11 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 20 in Ventura, with the Rev. Jack Coker officiating. Burial was in Ivy Lawn Memorial Park.

Mr. Gregory was killed when a one-inch pressure pipe ruptured at an oil rig near Twin Lakes in Santa Susana Mountains. He had been a field supervisor with Halliburton Services for 26 years.

He was born Nov. 26, 1929 in Hall County, Texas. He had lived five years in Ventura, and 11 years in California. Mr. Gregory was a member of Petroleum Production Pioneers, the American Petroleum Institute, and the Oil Valley Baptist Church.

Surviving are his wife, Patsy; a son, Michael, and a daughter, Maureen, both of Ventura; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Gregory, a brother, Harold, and a sister, Mrs. Sue Latta, all of Midland.

Civic Club Gives \$100 to Producers

Members of Hico Civic Club last week voted unanimously to contribute \$100.00 to the Cross Timbers Milk and Beef Producers Association to help in that organization's fight against high feed prices and low-cost products.

The Association, which was organized in early September with a purpose of easing the cost-price squeeze that people in the industry are going through, has appealed to farmers, ranchers and others for funds with which to carry out their work. They have asked for a nominal \$5.00 contribution for each

100 head of livestock owned, and the response has not been overwhelming, according to a member of the association.

Money contributed to the association will be used to send delegates to Washington, or wherever necessary, to tell their story.

Landowners Given Additional Time to Secure Deer Permits

Landowners who failed to receive antlerless deer tags during the issuance period two weeks ago, will have another chance.

Joe Stevens, Texas Parks & Wildlife Biologist, said that a number of landowners failed to receive tags during the first issuance, and the Department has set Nov. 5 and 6 as dates for the additional issuance.

Parks Dept. officials will be at the courthouse in Meridian on those dates, from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m., and landowners in Hamilton, Bexar, Erath, Hood, Johnson and Somervell counties may apply for the permits during those two days.

Stevens said that if landowners are unable to pick up permits on those two days, they may send an agent with a letter of authorization and the permits will be issued.

Stevens said that several landowners failed to receive permits during the original issuance period.

Approximately 300 Hamilton County livestock producers met Tuesday night at Hamilton to organize a local segment of the Independent Cattlemen's Association.

Elected president of the county association was Everett Vandiver, Vocational Agriculture teacher at Pottsville.

The recently organized association was formed in Goliad, and a state-wide movement is underway to organize a chapter in each county in Texas.

Officers were elected at the Tuesday meeting, and plans made for future sessions. Next meeting will be Tuesday night, Nov. 5 at 7:30 at the school in Hamilton.

Ed Black, one of the producers attending the meeting Tuesday said that the association was formed to aid not only the producers, but the consumers as well.

Other information on the new organization will be given later, and everyone in this area is urged to attend the meeting Tuesday night.

Polls Open at 8 a.m., Close at 7 p.m. in Major Balloting

Tuesday, November 5, is election day in Hico, in Texas, and over the nation as candidates in several parties vie for places of prominence in government circles. The balloting will be held in Hico at the Community Center, with V. H. Jenkins as presiding judge. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

While candidates in some parts of the country are engaged in a bitter election campaign among Democrats and Republicans, Texas voters have seen only a flurry of activity in a handful of statewide races.

Foremost has been the campaign for Governor, where Jim Grabber, the Republican nominee, has made an extensive campaign to unseat incumbent Dolph Briscoe.

Almost all state races have contests, but most of the emphasis has been placed on the Governor's race, that of Lt. Governor, Comptroller, State Treasurer, and Commissioner of Agriculture.

The Republicans are not the only party making challenges in several races. Raza Unida Party has a candidate for Governor and Railroad Commissioner. The Socialist Workers Party has candidates for Governor, Lt. Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller, Land Commissioner, and Railroad Commissioner.

The American Party has only one candidate for Governor, and there is one candidate running for Congress, 11th District, on an Independent ticket.

Jenkins said this week that those persons desiring to vote a straight ticket (that is, vote for all candidates of a certain party, and for no candidates outside that party's column) may do so by placing an "X" in the square beside the name of the party of your choice at the head of the column. If you use the straight-ticket method of marking, do not mark squares besides the names of individual candidates.

Mr. Jenkins also asked voters to bring registration certificates, if they have them available. By having your registration certificate stamped in the Tuesday election, voters will not have to worry about registering to vote in the next three years.

Tigers Downed By Whitney

The visiting Whitney Wildcats turned what was supposed to be a close game into a rout last Friday night, dumping the Tigers 34-6 in a loosely played contest.

Old Man Fumble returned to the scene, and the Tigers coughed up the ball four times.

Receiving the opening kickoff, the Tigers took off like they intended to hit the win column, but the locals ran out of steam after working to the Wildcat 24.

Holding Whitney on downs, the Tigers took over at the 40 and worked to the 27 before losing their first fumble of the night.

Recovering at their own 29, the

visitors put together a 71-yard march which ended when Ronnie Whitehead hit Charles Penny with a 10-yard scoring strike.

Hico received the following kickoff and worked to the 46 before being forced to punt. Whitney's work-horse, Doug Miller, gathered the ball in at his own 12 and set sail for an 88-yard TD run and a 12-0 first half lead.

Another tumble in the third period gave Whitney an easy TD. The Wildcats recovered at the Tiger five, and Doug Miller got the TD on the first play, upping the count to 18-0.

An intercepted pass led to Whitney's next marker. Miller intercepted at the 40 and ran to the one, and then carried in on the next play. A pass was good for two points and the Wildcats had a 26-0 lead.

The Tigers scored their only TD on their next possession, working to the one as time ran out in the third quarter. Jimmy Helton got the one yard, and Hico was on the board.

After another Tiger fumble, Whitney went 72 yards for their final TD, with Penny getting to the end zone from a yard out.

On Hico's last possession of the game, the Tigers gave up a two-point safety to end scoring.

PANEL DISCUSSION, 'THE RIGHTS AND PROBLEMS OF WOMEN' IS CLUB PROGRAM

The Review Club met Oct. 24 at the home of Mrs. Wayne Rutledge. Refreshments were served.

Mrs. B. F. Thomas presided in the absence of Mrs. J. C. Braune. Mrs. B. C. Dayton, a district board member, reported on the Capitol District meeting at San Marcos Oct. 17. Mrs. Marvin Marshall reported that the Big Thicket Bill has been passed, making it a preserve of 85,000 acres instead of the 100,000 hoped for.

The program was a discussion on "The Rights and Problems of Women." Mrs. Bernell Jernigan was the moderator. Other members of the panel were Mrs. R. B. Jackson, Mrs. Gary Connally, and Mrs. Bryan Angell.

The following is a summary of the points brought out. From pre-history onward the division of labor was based on age and sex. However, whatever tasks were assigned to men, those tasks were superior because males performed them. Then it is easy to see why public power has been exercised by men. From earliest days women have been considered men's chattels and were neither citizens nor persons in the eyes of the law.

Some of these types of conditions still exist. In some states a woman is given a longer prison sentence than a man who commits the same crime. In one of our states a woman's driving license was taken away because her husband was involved in an auto accident. In most community property states, only the husband has sole control of the property; he can also legally dissipate the property without the wife's knowledge or consent.

Discrimination against the girls exists in the educational field. Some colleges allow a lower percentage of women to be admitted and also require higher grades of women applicants. Women are not permitted athletic scholarships, though they are great athletes. Four women won three gold medals and two bronze at the Winter Olympics in Sapporo, Japan, but no men brought home any gold medals.

In the second half of the 19th century the organizers of the women's suffrage movement were Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan B. Anthony, and Lucy Stone. Later Carrie Chapman Catt pressured all legislators and finally the 19th amendment was ratified.

The first college for girls was established by Mary Lyon in 1837. This was Mount Holyoke Seminary. The students were permitted no cosmetics and were not allowed male acquaintances unless they were retired missionaries or agents of some benevolent society. These were only two of the many ridiculous rules.

In spite of the educational barriers many women have achieved greatness; i.e., Madame Curie, George Eliot, Mary Cassatt, Eleanor Roosevelt, Golda Meir, Indira Gandhi.

Recently women have been storming the gates of the ministry. We now have a woman Rabbi. Mary Baker Eddy founded the Christian

Science Church, and Aimee Semple MacPherson founded the Church of the Foursquare Gospel.

Women are working outside the home to earn enough money to care for the family. Also a great many families are headed by women. However, women on the average earn \$3.00 for every \$5.00 earned by a man similarly employed.

The Equal Rights Amendment was introduced in Congress in 1923. It has been endorsed by Presidents Eisenhower, Kennedy, Johnson, and Nixon. It was finally passed in 1972. After ratification by 38 states it will be in force two years later. At present women can best help themselves by working for early ratification of the ERA. It is imperative that women write letters and personally contact their state legislators. They should express their views thoughtfully, intelligently, and courteously.

Women must also get in the habit of voting in every election. Although there are more women of voting age, more men actually vote.

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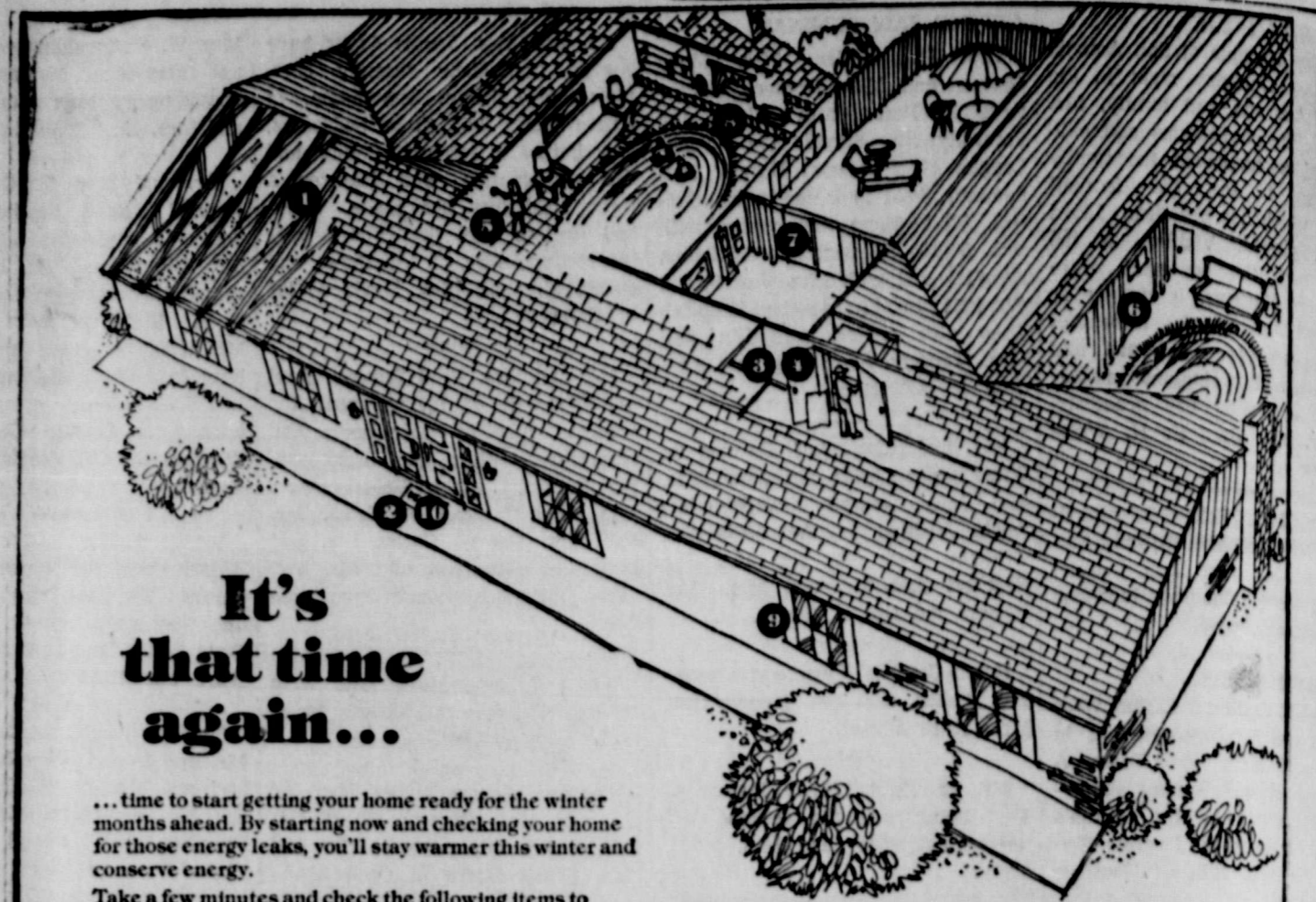
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Take a few minutes and check the following items to make sure your home will be winterized:

- 1 Insulation is most important... and can pay for itself in energy consumption savings. The usual recommendation is 6 inches of insulation for the attic and 4 inches for outside walls. Check FHA requirements for further information.
- 2 Weatherstrip doors and windows, and caulk cracks and crevices to prevent drafts and the loss of heated air.
- 3 Maintain heating equipment for maximum efficiency by having it checked by a competent serviceman.
- 4 Dirty filters cause heating equipment to work harder and use more fuel. Check your filters every 30 days. If they're the permanent type, clean them according to the manufacturer's directions. If they're the disposable type, replace them at least every 90 days.
- 5 Don't be a "thermostat jiggler". Turning the thermostat up or down doesn't cause the equipment to heat or cool faster. It simply works longer to satisfy the setting. The national conservation program calls for settings of no more than 68°F. in heating weather. If you are going to be away for several days, lower the temperature to 60°F.
- 6 Don't place curtains, furniture or other objects in front of heating registers or return air openings. This blocks the flow of warm air.
- 7 Open blinds and draperies on sunny days to help heat your home during the day but close them at night to help reduce heat loss.
- 8 Keep the fireplace damper closed when the fireplace is not in use.
- 9 Storm doors and windows are not customarily used in this part of the country, but they do reduce heat loss. As a temporary substitute, a sheet of clear plastic stapled or tacked over screen doors or windows works well.
- 10 Keep the opening and closing of doors to a minimum to reduce the loss of warm air.

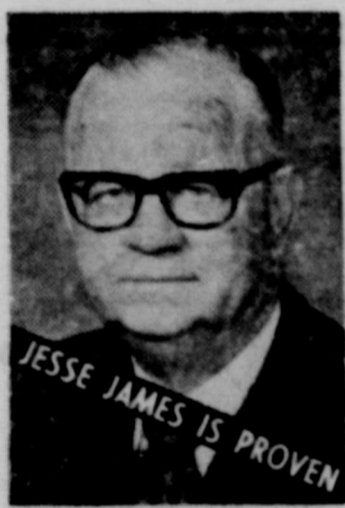
