





# Weekend Weather Helps Push Texas Violence Toll Upward

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS — Bad weekend weather conspired with Texans who killed themselves and each other at a constant pace over the big state.

The Associated Press began its regular weekend count of violent deaths at 6 p.m. Friday and continued the grim toll until midnight Sunday.

By midnight Sunday, 31 persons were dead, 17 of them killed in traffic accidents. Six other persons died at the end of a gun barrel.

Here is how some died.

Four persons died and two were injured in a post-midnight crash near Austin Sunday. The victims were identified by the Texas Department of Public Safety as Marietta Jonas Forehand, 42, of Austin; her daughter, Linda Forehand, 17, of Austin; Miss Forehand's fiancé, Billy Hunnicutt, 20, of Dripping Springs; and Buford Hicks, 42, of Lockhart.

**Head-On Crash**

Officers said the cars driven by Hicks and Hunnicutt crashed head-on after one crossed the median strip. The third car then piled into the wreckage. Alma Schattenberg and Frederick Schattenberg, both of Austin, were injured in the third car. She was reported in serious condition and he was treated and released.

Three youth died Sunday when fire swept a mobile home in the Tarrant County of Kennedale south of Fort Worth. Police, who said the trio had partied and set off fireworks earlier, identified the victims as David Thomas Church, 19, and Tommy D. Teague, 19, who lived in the house, and Cecil Wayne Drago, 19, a visitor from Fort Worth.

Four truckers died in the Texas Panhandle Saturday when two trailer trucks met head-on southwest of Dalhart in an ice-coated U.S. 54.

Investigators identified the dead men as Willie T. Lyons, 42, and his son, Robert, 21, both of Oxford, Kan.; Russell E. Garland, 34, of Valinda, Calif.; and Leonard F. Claycamp, 56, of Garden Grove, Calif.

One of the large trucks burst into flames following the collision.

A bar operator shot and killed Johnny Brown, Jr., 31, at Houston Friday night during what police said was an attempted robbery.

Police said two of Brown's companions fled on foot after the shooting.

**Shot To Death**

At San Angelo, a prominent local physician, Dr. Aubrey L. Lewis, 75, was found shot to death behind a hospital Friday night. Police said robbery was the motive for his death.

The body of a middle-aged man was found in a ditch Saturday near Jourdan in South Texas, leaving police with a mystery as to his identity. The man had a gash on his head and had been set afire.

A car careened out of control Friday night near San Augustine, struck a bridge abutment on Texas 103 and killed three people.

The dead were Johnny B. Lindsey, 20, of King Hill, La.; Florence Smith, 19, and one-year-old Dwayne Wallace, both of Houston.

Three other persons were injured.

Police said an 18-month old girl at Dallas drowned while playing Saturday night in a water-filled diaper pail. The child was Chiquita Jones.

Two cars ran together Saturday on U.S. 87 near San Antonio, killing William Thomas Hood, 37, and an unidentified Ft. Hood soldier.

Police said a car sped away from a Dallas hospital in the wee hours Saturday after dropping off a man in front of the hospital. Doctors said the unidentified man died of alcoholism.

Frank Rice, 37, was gunned down Saturday in a Houston area.

# FLIGHT PLANS HALTED—Houston Firemen Will Truck Relief Supplies

HOUSTON (AP) — Firemen here, foiled by a federal agency in their plan to fly 90,000 pounds of relief supplies to earthquake victims in Nicaragua, start Tuesday on a 3,000-mile overland drive to Managua.

Men of the Houston Fire Department have collected the relief supplies, mostly food, and had been shipping it to Managua by chartered airplane. But Friday, inspectors for the Federal Aviation Administration refused to let the plane take off.

So firemen have rounded up five large trucks and plan to drive through Mexico and Central America on the Pan American Highway.

The men of the fire department have been shipping supplies collected from Houston residents since shortly after the quake. Their first plane load landed only 24 hours after the devastation which killed at least 3,000 persons and destroyed the capital city of Nicaragua.

But Friday, the FAA said their cargo plane, chartered from Air Cargo International of Miami, Fla., lacked radio equipment and other necessary gear for international flights.

Lance Dreyer, president of the air cargo firm, said the plane had recently passed FAA inspection. He said he was renting to the firemen for only \$3,000 a flight, just enough to pay insurance, maintenance and flight crews.

Rene Cardenas, a volunteer disaster worker at the Nicaraguan consulate here, said other commercial airlines wanted \$6,000 to \$7,000 for each trip and only about \$30,000 had been collected from Houstonians for transportation. "We would use all of it in only three or four flights if we had to charter planes from other countries," he said.

But Capt. Leon Fress, who is coordinating the relief effort for the Fire Department, stepped in and rounded up trucks for the journey.

Fress said firemen on vacation would man the trucks which would drive non-stop. He estimated the trip would take three days.

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**Police Seize Two, Ton Of Marijuana**

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — State narcotics agents Sunday arrested two Dallas men with a ton of marijuana valued at \$250,000 to \$300,000 in what the agents claimed was one of the biggest marijuana operations in Texas.

Charged with marijuana possession were James C. Mapes, 23, and Karl S. Wesch, 22.

Officers said they found the pair on Lake Travis, about 30 miles west of Austin.

# Wayne Speaks Out

PINE MOUNTAIN, Ga. (AP) — Veteran cowboy movie star John Wayne says that senators who voted recently to cut off U.S. funding of the Vietnam war were in effect "giving aid and comfort to the enemy."

"They would have been tarred and feathered in the old days," Wayne said in a weekend news conference at nearby Callaway Gardens, where he addressed a convention of the Georgia Cattlemen's Association.

The antiwar senators, he said, "didn't find fault with (the late) President John F. Kennedy when he started it, they didn't find fault with the gentleman from Texas (former President Lyndon B. Johnson) when he sent all the men over there and then didn't have the courage to end it."

Wayne said the opposition of the senators to President Nixon's Vietnam policy was purely political.

"And I hate politics," said the towering actor.

"The American people elected a 'decent, moral' President, he said, and they 'should be satisfied with what he does in the first few days of office.'"

# Quints 'Doing Fine'

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — The center-for-premature-and-high-risk babies.

Even Thomas Allen, the first born who had developed a respiratory problem, was being fed orally and was being given oxygen "just once in a while," the spokesman said Sunday night.








The father has shuttled back and forth from Evanston to Highland Park, where his wife Lynn, 26, was recovering from 16-hours' labor.

used more widely than in the United States, a medical team reported in 1970 that, of 78 pregnancies that followed treatment with the drug, 31 resulted in multiple births.




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# U.S. Planes Hit Da Nang By Mistake

SAIGON (AP) — An American flight leader mistakenly guided five U.S. fighter-bombers into an accidental attack on the Da Nang Air Base today.

Ten Americans and one Vietnamese were reported wounded by shrapnel or injured while running for cover. No deaths were reported. The western part of the base where the bombs hit is thinly populated.

The U.S. Command reported that about half a dozen U.S. AC119 gunships and one helicopter were lightly damaged by flying shrapnel and four fuel tanks were destroyed.

The command first reported the explosions at 8:20 a.m. as an enemy shelling attack. Seven hours later, it announced that an investigation showed five Air Force, Navy and Marine fighter-bombers "flying above a heavy overcast accidentally dropped 34 500-pound bombs at Da Nang Air Base."

The intended target was suspected North Vietnamese and Viet Cong positions near Da Nang. The flight leader reportedly ordered the bombs dropped at the wrong map coordinates.

The planes — an Air Force F4 Phantom, two Marine F4s and two Navy A7 Corsairs — came from two bases in Thailand and from a carrier off the coast, and the pilots may have been unfamiliar with the Da Nang area.

The U.S. Command reported continued heavy aerial assaults on North Vietnam's southern panhandle with the object of slowing war materiel moving down to South Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia.

Forty-five B52s dropped about 1,300 tons of bombs, and there were 124 strikes by fighter-bombers during the 24-hour period ending at 8 a.m. today.

Red Attacks Decline

North Vietnamese and Viet Cong attacks in South Vietnam dropped from an average of 100 per day during the last five days to 77 for the 24 hours ending at dawn today, the Saigon command said. Sixty of the attacks were carried out by rockets and mortars and involved no infantry assaults, headquarters said.

U.S. spokesmen reported the loss of the 33rd American aircraft in operations against North Vietnam since Dec. 18, when the air war was stepped up in an attempt to force Hanoi to agree to President Nixon's peace terms.

An Air Force F4 Phantom returning from a combat mission in the north crashed in northeast Thailand, but the two crewmen ejected safely.

# Texas GI Draws Eight Years Plus Dishonorable Discharge

SAIGON (AP) — A U.S. Army judge sentenced Lawrence R. Tanner Jr. to eight years in prison and a dishonorable discharge today for kidnapping three other servicemen at gunpoint and trying to kill the military police who arrested him.

Tanner, 20, pleaded guilty to those charges, plus others of theft; misappropriation of a jeep, an M16 rifle and a pistol; threatening the life of five soldiers, and possession of 53 vials of heroin and two ounces of marijuana.

Tanner lists Orange, Tex., as his hometown but grew up in Saudi Arabia, where his father is a plant manager for the Arabian American Oil Co.

The soldier last Sept. 12 held several men at gunpoint in his unit's orderly room at the Long Binh base, then forced four of them to accompany him as hostages on a 12-mile jeep ride to Saigon.

At the time, he was a material witness in a "fragg" case, and the drugs had been found in his room Sept. 1. He testified in his trial that he bought the drugs in Saigon and was addicted to heroin. He said his friend in Saigon. In the process, he had tried unsuccessfully to get into the Army's detoxification program.

Tanner was captured at the home of a Vietnamese girl several shots that chipped off some cement. The cement injured two Army investigators trying to arrest the youth.

Tanner freed three of his hostages before the shootout, and none of the four was injured. He was charged with kidnaping only three.

One of the hostages was the unit's executive officer, 1st Lt. Lonnie E. Weck of Nyack, N.Y., who testified that Tanner told him he wanted to get out of the country.

## CIGARETTE ADS BANNED—Tobacco Industry Promoting Little Cigars On Air Waves

Prohibited from advertising cigarettes on television and radio, the U.S. tobacco industry is now vigorously promoting the cigarette-like little cigars on the nation's airways.

The selling campaign is so successful that public interest groups which helped force cigarettes off the air for health reasons two years ago now are planning a major fight to ban the little cigar.

In Washington last week, Sen. Frank Moss, a Utah Democrat, announced that he would introduce legislation to ban broadcast advertising of little cigars.

Market analysts believe that little cigars represent a potential \$100-million annual sales that could be reached quickly if the product can be widely advertised.

The outcome of the battle is expected to affect significantly the future marketing of tobacco products.

The ban on broadcast cigarette advertising has had no noticeable effect on the smoking habits of Americans. In 1971, industry's big 1972 sales growth — 547.2 billion — was sold. Sales have continued high this year.

The little cigar was marketed in America for 50 years without controversy. Then along came the modern version: A product of the same size and shape as a cigarette, often manufactured on the same machine, with a similar cellulose filter and selling in soft packs of 20.

A spokesman for R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co., manufacturer of the best-selling Winston, said the wrapper of the little cigar is made mainly of reconstituted tobacco and is brown and the filler is made of cigar tobaccos and air-cured tobaccos. The commercial is designed to produce a hard-to-inhale alkaline smoke rather than the acid smoke from flu-cured cigarette tobaccos.

Winchester is the latest entrant in the little cigar field. It has been propelled to the top by a nationwide television campaign featuring a cowboy-type smoker with a pencil-thin mustache, effortlessly stealing girls from nonsmokers.

Reynolds won't discuss figures, but some market researchers see Winchester soon selling a potential three billion units annually, based on test marketing. This is only a fraction of the annual cigarette sales, but it's three times more than the current little cigar consumption.

The little cigar was the cigar of choice for the big 1972 sales growth. It was before Reynolds launched its massive national advertising campaign.

The success of Winchester is expected to bring newer brands on the market. Currently there are more than 20 brands — 11 of them manufactured on the same machine, with a

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## Marcos Stalls Plebiscite On Filipino Constitution

MANILA (AP) — President Ferdinand E. Marcos has postponed the plebiscite on the new Philippine constitution and suspended news media comment on the charter while his supporters rally the public behind him.

Marcos announced in a broadcast Sunday that the vote, previously scheduled for Jan. 15, would be held after "national consultations" in some 32,000 citizens' assemblies now being held by local leaders.

To permit discussion of the new constitution, Marcos had eased the censorship put into effect when he proclaimed martial law Sept. 22. But he charged that his enemies were using the debate for subversion and influence peddling.

Charging that there is a "slipping back to the habits of the old society," he said "members of the Maoist New Peoples Army were killed, 30 Communists were arrested and arms, propaganda, He accused university students and faculty members of spreading stories that six judges resigned after declaring his martial law decrees unconstitutional.

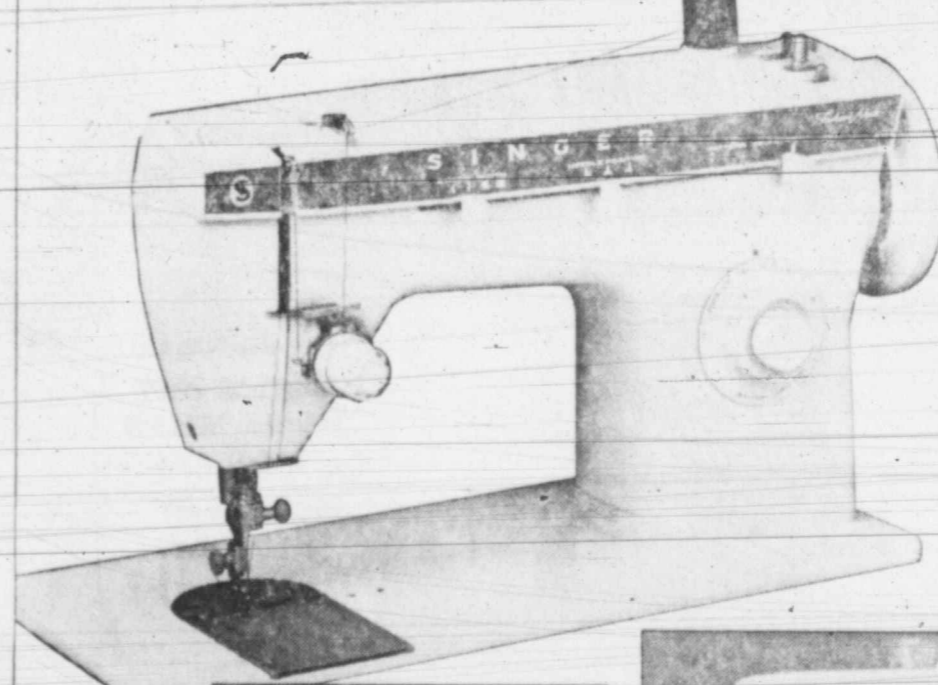
He also said Lim Seng, a Chinese sentenced to life imprisonment for manufacturing heroin, would be executed "as a warning to all."

"We have committed ourselves to this revolution of change. We have burned our bridges behind us. We shall be humane, but we shall not relent," Marcos said.

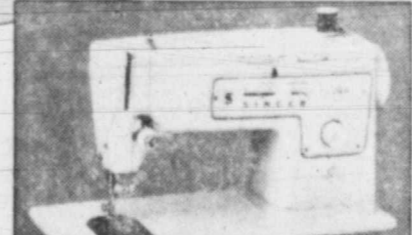

## Rumors Fly On Housing Moratorium

HOUSTON (AP) — There was speculation rumored plans by President Nixon to slap an 18-month moratorium on federally assisted housing programs would be clarified today in a speech by Secretary of Housing and Urban Development George Romney.

Stanley Waranch, president of the National Association of Home Builders, says the trade group has "very serious concern for what has been rumored."

**Romney Speaks Today**  
The Norfolk, Va., builder said at a Sunday news conference he did not want to prejudice any announcement Romney might make before the association's 29th convention this afternoon but added that such a moratorium would be disastrous and catastrophic to those unable to find adequate housing.

Waranch said he had received no response from a Wednesday request for an appointment to discuss the rumored moratorium with Nixon.

The homebuilder then sidestepped a question when asked if he could state a percentage cutback the industry could live with.

"That is part of the reason we would like to see the President but we wouldn't want to talk about it first through the news media," Waranch said.

**Criticism In Congress, Press**  
He blamed a possible moratorium on the President's efforts to limit federal spending to \$250 billion and to criticism "in the Congress and in the press" of subsidized housing.

Waranch expressed a fear that Romney's announcement could be "a matter of words not recognizing what effect a moratorium would have on those unable to find adequate housing."

He said a moratorium would not have too much impact on 1973's projected completion of 2.1 million housing units, compared with 2.3 million in 1972 and 2 million in 1971.

"The impact would start developing in the last half of the year and the effect in 1974 would be disastrous," he said.

Waranch promised the fight would be carried to Congress unless the matter is resolved at the White House level.

**No Substitute Plan Ready**  
"I can't visualize Congress sitting down and playing dead," he said. "Those in Congress who are concerned about housing and America won't permit this to happen."

He acknowledged the industry at present does not have a better plan to offer as a substitute for the subsidized programs.

"And I don't think the administration has either, but it is a travesty on the American people to junk them without a better plan," Waranch said.

Romney was to speak at a convention session on the 93rd Congress and prospects for housing. Appearing with him was to be Senator John Sparkman, D-Ala., chairman of the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs.

Waranch said Sparkman already has sent Nixon a Letter protesting the reported moratorium.

## Six Plead Guilty In Grocery Thefts From Lackland AFB

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Federal prosecutors have obtained guilty pleas from six men, including one who was accused of masterminding thefts of groceries valued perhaps at as much as \$84,000 from the Lackland Air Force Base commissary warehouse.

Mario R. Escobedo, 35, the alleged mastermind, pleaded guilty to one felony count in a 14-count indictment also naming the other five men.

The other five pleaded guilty to misdemeanors. They were: Arthur L. Van Brandt, 36; Fredrico Vasquez Jr., 31; Jesse M. Garcia, 26; Miguel A. De La Torre, 53; and Joe A. Vidales, 38.

Sentencing was set for March 19 by U.S. District Court Judge D. W. Suttle, who heard the pleas Friday.

The original indictment claimed the thefts occurred in a 13-month period in 1970 and 1971. Prosecutors said an audit of the commissary showed shortages of \$84,000 more than expected, but said the Air Force could not determine how much ended up in the hands of the six defendants.

# Cold Paralyzes Parts Of Nation

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS: Snow, sleet and freezing rain glazed areas from Tennessee and the lower Ohio Valley to the Atlantic early today, causing hazardous driving conditions and downing trees and power lines.

Missouri, Oklahoma and Kansas residents were again looking for snow shovels, wondering where to pile the latest 4 to 10 inches on top of last week's accumulation. Three thousand electric customers in Kansas City were shivering again early today as power lines snapped.

Moist air from the Gulf of Mexico clashed with cold air over North Carolina and Tennessee Sunday, dumping 7 inches of snow at some spots. U.S. 441 across the Smoky mountains into North Carolina was closed.

At least two deaths in Georgia and one in Tennessee were caused in part by icy roads, and 17 persons were injured slightly when an ice-laden tree toppled onto U.S. 61 near Land, Miss., forcing a Grayhound bus off the road.

Northern Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and western South Carolina were blanketed with snow and sleet. Flashflood warnings were issued for north Georgia as the Gulf system brought more rain. Ice warnings were posted for the area.

Snow whitened most of the central Plains and mid-Mississippi Valley. Travelers advisories were posted for Kansas, Kentucky, Illinois, southern Indiana and Louisiana.

Kansas City reported a total of 15 inches of snow so far this winter, most of it coming the past week.

Elsewhere, a band of freezing drizzle hit central Texas, snow flurries were swirling over the northern Midwest and Great

## Radial Tire Future Predicted

NEW YORK (AP) — Radial tire sales will grow from 15 million in 1972 to 41 million in 1975, according to a projection by Alan R. Kerivan, vice president of Owens-Corning Fiberglass Corp.

"Of these 41 million radials, approximately six million will use fiber glass tire cord," he said.

The traditional automobile tire is called bias-ply. Bias-ply tires have their cords running at angles of about 35 degrees to the line of travel. On radial tires, the piles run at 90 degrees to the direction of travel, which is said to give much better performance to the tires.

Cuts Life Expectancy LONDON (AP) — Road accidents cut a year from the life expectancy of males, compared with only a month for all infectious diseases, says Dr. John Havard, undersecretary of the British Medical Association.

He told a Royal Society of Health congress that nearly half the male deaths in countries where the auto is common were among drivers in the 15 to 24 age group.

ODESSA—The sixth and final performance of the Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse Show Championship Rodeo closed the annual event Saturday night in the Ector County Coliseum before its largest crowd of the week, about 4,000 spectators.

## Moyer Ordered To Trial Despite Having No Lawyer

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Former Rep. Hudson Moyer of Amarillo was ordered to trial today despite his failure to get a lawyer to represent him.

Moyer's theft trial has been postponed three times, and he sought another delay after two Austin attorneys—Roy Minton and Charles Burton—refused to take his case for a \$5,000 fee because they already were scheduled to try a murder case today.

State District Court Judge Mace Thurman denied Moyer's motion and ordered jury selection to begin before lunch.

Dist. Atty. Bob Smith said he had tried to be "reasonable with him (Moyer)."

"I don't know what to do to get him in the court with counsel," Smith said.

Moyer said in a motion for postponement that Minton and Burton demanded \$5,000 in cash before they would accept the case. Moyer said he was unable to raise the money until Jan. 3, the day after Minton and Burton made the commitment on the murder case.

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# Only 5,000 Men Will Be Drafted

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird told Congress today the Pentagon plans to draft only 5,000 men before the induction authority expires next June 30.

This is far below the "less than 10,000" figure he used last November.

In his final report to the House Armed Services Committee before giving up his Cabinet post, Laird said plans are to draft fewer than 2,500 in March and an average of 1,000 in each of the following three months. No draft calls were issued for January and February.

Calls for 50,000 men were issued last year and 48,000 were inducted.

The wind-down draft calls could bring attempts by thousands of men seeking to delay the deadline. Draft officials expect many to appeal for change of their I-A status or for postponements. They cannot be drafted while such appeals are pending.

A man must be given 30 days' notice to report and usually appeals cannot be cleared up in that time.

Presumably the 2,500-or-fewer March call will be filled by men in the extended-priority group. These are men who lost deferments late in 1972 and who have lottery numbers up to last year's callup ceiling, No. 95.

They may be drafted until April 1. Too, conscientious objectors may be assigned civilian duty if their numbers are within the ceiling.

**Funseth Takes  
Tourney Crown

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Rod Funseth, who admits to some occasional negative thinking, called his wife, Sandi, after the third round of the \$135,000 Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open golf tournament.

"I've got a 17-stroke lead over last place," the curly-haired, soft-spoken Funseth told her.

Sandi, no negative thinker, promptly put two bottles of champagne on ice.

She had the right instincts. Funseth, who has made a 12-year career as a supporting player to the likes of Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus and Lee Trevino, scored a solid, methodical, almost pedestrian three-stroke victory Sunday in the event that opens a 12-month schedule on the pro tour.

"I'm so negative, if I had a 10-stroke lead, I'd be afraid I was going to fall and break a leg," the 39-year-old Funseth said. "Sandi's a lot different, just the opposite. She gets so mad at me sometimes."

Not this time.

Funseth stroked irons to within almost tap-in distance for consecutive birdies on the eighth and ninth holes, parred the last nine in routine fashion as he pumped shot after shot to the middle of the green and finished with a two-under-par 69 for a 276 total on the 7,028-yard Riviera Country Club course.

It was only the second career victory—the other was in the

1965 Phoenix open—for Funseth, who has collected a flock of course records only to blow the advantage. This time he collected \$27,000.

Second place ended up in a four-way tie among Don Bies—Funseth's long-time roommate—Australian David Graham, Dave Hill and Tom Weiskopf, all at 279. Graham had a 71 with Hill, Weiskopf and Bies all at 69.

Jack Nicklaus, winner of \$320,000 when he took player of the year honors in 1972, really didn't get it going as he three-putted twice en route to a final 70 for 280.

Arnold Palmer wasn't a factor. He had his best round, a 69, in the mild, overcast weather of the final day and finished with a 286. Sixty-year-old Sam Snead, just one stroke back starting the last round, bogeyed both of the par threes on the front nine and faded back with a 73-281.

British Open champion Lee Trevino failed to qualify for the final two rounds.

## UCLA Keeps Rolling

### Kiddy Korps Post Two Cage Upsets

By TED MEIER. Associated Press Sports Writer. UCLA's national collegiate basketball champions keep rolling along with 55 straight victories so maybe you haven't heard about Arizona's Kiddy Korps. The Arizona Kiddy Korps, so-called because of four freshmen starters, muscled their way into national prominence over the weekend while mighty UCLA was running up an 87-61 score on Oregon State for their 55th in a row. On Friday the Kiddy Korps upset Texas-El Paso 79-73 and demonstrated it was no fluke by upsetting New Mexico, one of the Top Twenty in the Associated Press rankings, with a come-from-behind 83-73 victory Saturday night. That put Arizona, which lost 20 of 26 games last season, into a first place tie in the Western Athletic Conference over the pre-season favorite Brigham Young. Coniel Norman, one of the four frosh, threw in 34 points against the Lobos and led a 24-12 spurt that put the Wildcats ahead after they trailed by 41-36 at halftime.

### Paterno Likes Penn State; Doesn't Care About Pros

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (AP) — Joe Paterno, admitting he wants to be more than a football coach who has to win to remain employed, says that was why he decided not to jump to the National Football League. Ending weeks of speculation, Paterno shocked many people Saturday morning when he told newsmen, "I've decided to remain at Penn State." The 46-year-old Paterno rejected an offer to become coach-general manager of the New England Patriots of the NFL. The offer included a stock interest in the franchise. A source close to the university said the total package was just short of \$1.25 million over five years. Paterno said his main reason for turning down the plush Patriots' offer was an aversion to becoming a coach whose life revolved around winning and losing. He envisioned himself as more than just a coach. He said he'd rather influence young men than build a professional football winner. "When I analyzed the situation at Penn State," Paterno said, "I realized that I've always hoped that I could work on a campus where the approach by the administration toward athletics was such that I could be a little more than just a football coach. And that's what Penn State has allowed me to be."

Norm Ellenberger, New Mexico coach, called Norman one of the premier shooters in the country. "You need a canoe paddle to guard him," Ellenberger said. "Unfortunately we didn't have one." "These kids are proving something to themselves that not many kids their age get to do," said Arizona Coach Fred Snowden, referring to Norman, Eric Money, Al Fleming and Jim Rappis. "They're learning they have to be adults now." Snowden said Saturday's game with Arizona State on the road at Tempe "is going to be a real barn burner. It could be the civil war all over again." Arizona State also beat New Mexico and Texas-El Paso over the weekend to tie Arizona for the lead in the WAC. Minnesota and Southwestern Louisiana, two of the Top Ten in last week's AP ratings, were knocked out of the unbeaten ranks on Saturday. Iowa upset the No. 6 Gophers 65-62 in overtime on Rick Williams' layup and Glenn Angeli's two foul shots in the closing seconds. Jacksonville clouted the No. 8 Ragin' Cajuns 120-78.

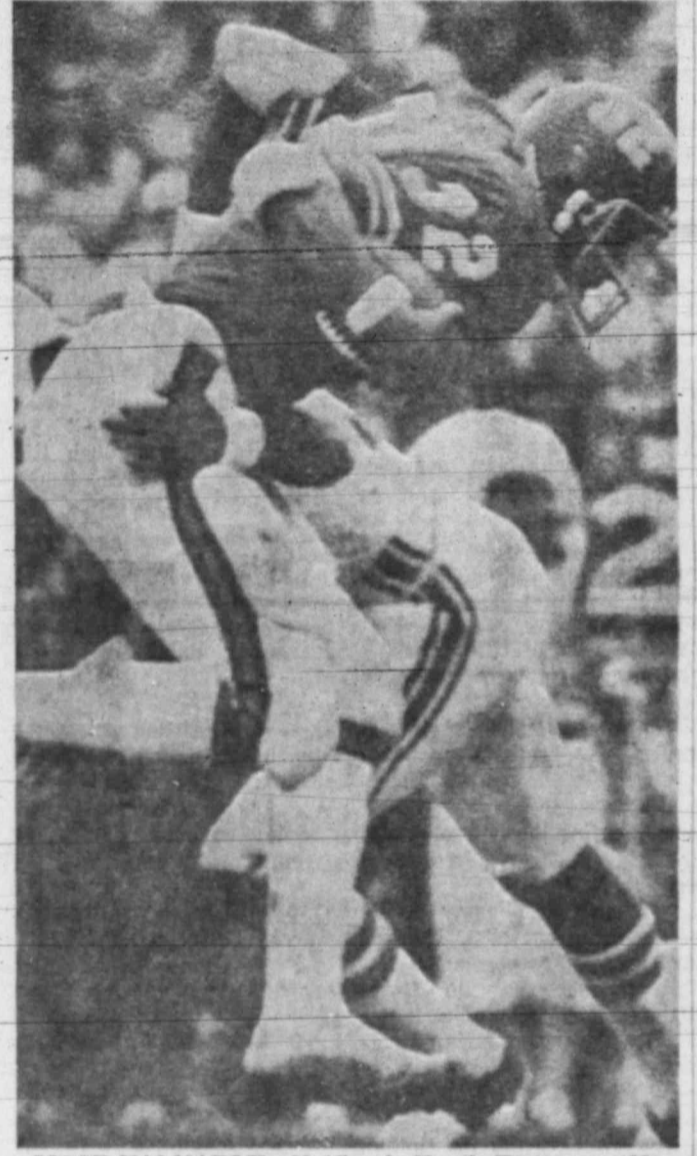

# New Orleans Sniping Recalls 1966 Tragedy At UT

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The sniping incident Sunday in New Orleans was not the first such tragedy in recent years to involve a large number of victims.

Charles Whitman killed his wife, his mother and then stationed himself on the observation deck of The University of Texas Tower.

27th floor, Whitman had a clear field of vision which permitted him to kill 13 persons and wound 31 others.

He had carried an arsenal of rifles and pistols to the tower, spraying bullets across the campus at anyone who moved. Ninety-two minutes after the slaughter began, Whitman died in a shower of bullets from police who had crept up and surprised him from behind.

The 25-year-old Whitman, from Lake Worth, Fla., died crumpled against a wall of the tower's observation deck, still clutching an M-1 carbine.

"His finger was still on the trigger," Allen J. Crum, an ex-Air Force sergeant recalled later.

Angry at Whitman's disregard for life, Crum joined three law officers to corner the sick and depressed sniper.

Whitman started firing at 11:48 a.m. and fired away until he was killed.

Austin Police Chief Bob Miles said he believed Whitman wanted to wait two minutes later to begin firing during a class break when the wide malls around the tower would be jammed with students.

But he encountered a family of tourists and a receptionist and shot them to get his foot-

locker of weapons to the deck.

Even now, more than six years later, there are those who remember the day vividly.

Robert Heard, a Capitol reporter for The Associated Press, and Dr. D. M. Huffman, a young university professor, each carry a steel rod from the shoulder to the elbow to remind them of what police called Whitman's "absolutely fantastic aim."

In terrific pain, with two-thirds of his shoulder muscle blown through a hole in his back, Heard dictated a story to Garth Jones, boss of the Austin AP office.

The end came when Crum fired a rifle shot at Whitman "to let him know we were there."

One of the policemen emptied his pistol and another fired twice with a shotgun.

## Marine Helicopter Acts As Gunship For Officers

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — Time after time throughout the night, the big helicopter hovered over the roof of the hotel, acting as a gunship for police sharpshooters doing battle with snipers holed up on the roof.

Over and over, Lt. Col. C.H. Pitman turned on the chopper's powerful landing lights, illuminating the roof of the 18-story Downtown Howard Johnson Hotel, and the police gunners aboard let the lead fly.

It was bad weather for it. Misting rain. Poor visibility. The sky came down to the 30th floor, and tops of taller buildings near the hotel disappeared into the cloud ceiling.

The Marine crew of four didn't get into the shooting, restricting its role to providing police with a gun platform.

Thousands of bullets were fired at the target — a one-room concrete structure squatting above the hotel's emergency stairwell at one end of the rectangular roof. It was like a fortress bunker.

Until the Marine chopper was pressed into emergency service as a makeshift gunship, the snipers were in an almost impregnable position.

But three police gunners

aboard the chopper concentrated their fire and finally ripped a hole in the windowless wall of the bunker.

Then, on every pass, they aimed their AR15 automatic rifles into the hole so that bullets ricocheted inside.

On each pass, the Sikorsky hovered about two minutes while they emptied clip after clip of 5.56mm bullets — small but of high velocity — mixed with bright red streaks of tracers. "I just don't see how they can survive those ricochets," said Frank Buras, one of the gunners.

They did it, it developed, by ducking part-way down the stairs when the chopper swept by for a sortie.

At one point Sunday, one of the snipers darted out of the stairway opening in the bunker to get a better shot at the helicopter. The gunners zeroed in on him. He tried to run, zig-zagging across the roof, but was cut down by a fusillade of bullets.

Each time the Sikorsky landed in a parking lot, two crewmen went over every inch of it with flashlights. After 20 passes they had found several bullet holes but no serious damage.

## POLICE SAY—

### Snipers, Blazes May Be Connected

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Officials say there were "indications" of possible connections between Sunday's sniper shootings from a New Orleans hotel and earlier violence in the city.

—The snipers at the Howard Johnson Hotel struck one week after Police Cadet Alfred Harrell, 19, was killed by an unseen sniper as Harrell stood outside police headquarters.

—The fires set by the hotel snipers came six days after two fires, in which arson also is suspected, destroyed downtown warehouses.

—Arson is suspected in a fire Nov. 29 at the Rault Center, a 17-story office-apartment building across the street from the hotel. Five persons died as a result of that blaze.

—Six persons died in a July 1971 fire at the same Howard Johnson Hotel. Authorities said that blaze was the result of arson, but no one ever was charged.

Police Supt. Clarence Giarrusso said the Dec. 31 shooting of Harrell had "overtones" of being carried out by a militant group.

Giarrusso said the attack on Harrell had been "well planned" and there appeared to be "some relation" between that shooting and the wounding of a fellow officer a few minutes later as he responded to a burglar alarm at a warehouse.

The offense is believed to have occurred between 7-10 p.m. Saturday, while Rosenbaum was away from home.

## CRMWD Production Records Are Shattered During '72

BIG SPRING — Production records were shattered by the Colorado River Municipal Water District during 1972. The district delivered almost 18½ billion gallons of water, four billion more than the previous year.

Most of the increase came in deliveries for oil and industrial uses, almost 2.5 million gallons more, and municipal customers used more than 1.5 billion gallons over the 1971 figures.

The 1972 deliveries stood at 14,560,545,991 as compared with 11,493,616,386 gallons the year

before, an increase of 27.01 per cent. Of this amount, 12,496,099,000 gallons went to municipal customers as compared with 10,863,894,452 in 1971, up 14.02 per cent. The oil and industrial customers used 5,997,511,386 gallons in 1972, compared with 3,696,651,539 the previous year, an increase of 62.24 per cent.

By cities, deliveries were: Odessa 4,579,880,000 in 1972 and 4,288,591,000 in 1971, an increase of 6.79 per cent; Big Spring 2,695,729,000 in 1972 and 2,555,395,000 in 1971, an increase of 5.49 per cent; Snyder 801,908,000 gallons in 1972 and 806,140,000 gallons in 1971, a decrease of .52 of one per cent; Stanton 82,023,000 in 1972 compared with 39,657,000 gallons in 1971, an increase of 106.8 per cent; Midland 3,451,889,000 gallons in 1972 and 2,983,320,000 in 1971, an increase of 15.69 per cent; San Angelo 885,178,000 gallons in 1972 and 190,790,900 in 1971, an increase of 363.95 per cent.
