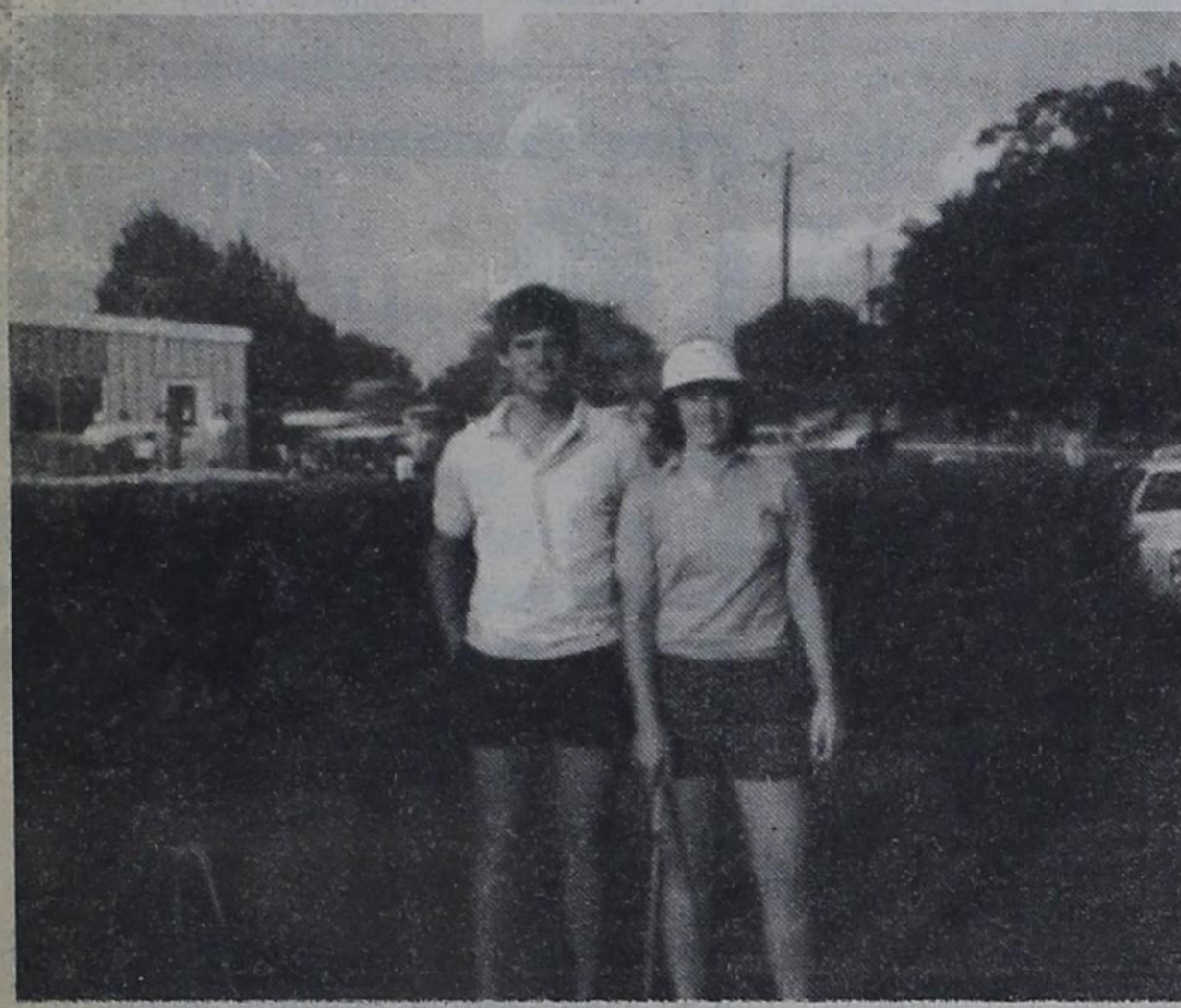

Limbaugh Arrested- Awaits Trial on Escape Charge

Clifton Limbaugh of Malakoff, who escaped from the Callahan County Jail on August 15, 1981, has been picked up and brought back to Callahan County.
 Limbaugh was convicted of auto theft in July 1981. He received a sentence of 4 years at TDC in Huntsville.
 On August 15, 1981, Limbaugh and his partner Cane escaped from jail at midnight while being transported to Hunts-

ville.
 Cane was picked up in Alabama about 2 weeks later and brought back to Callahan County.
 Limbaugh was arrested on May 6, 1982 in Malakoff. He was transported back to Callahan County on May 7, 1982 by Sheriff Bill Skinner.
 Limbaugh is now awaiting to be tried for escape.

Ricky had a very successful track season and broke several meet records, his best being at the Texas Relays in Austin going against all classes of schools, he won the discus with a toss of 187'3". This toss ranked him in the top 8 discus throwers in the United States in all classes of high schools.

His best shot put came at District at Hamlin with 59'6".

Ricky's two-first place wins at the State Track Meet placed Baird 7th in all class 2A schools in the state with his 20 points.

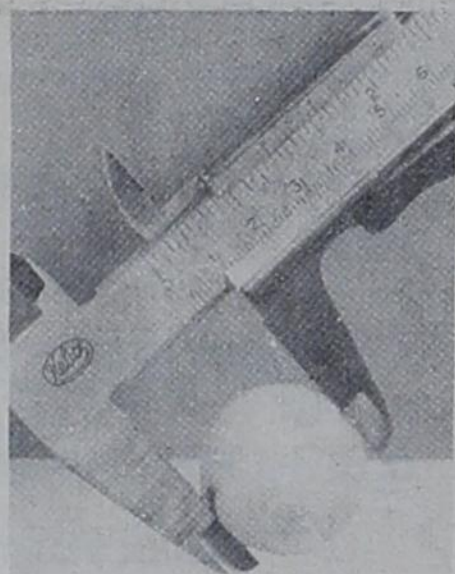

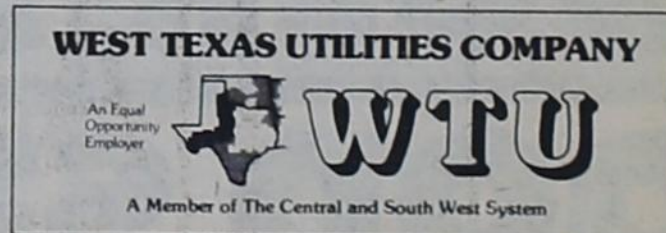

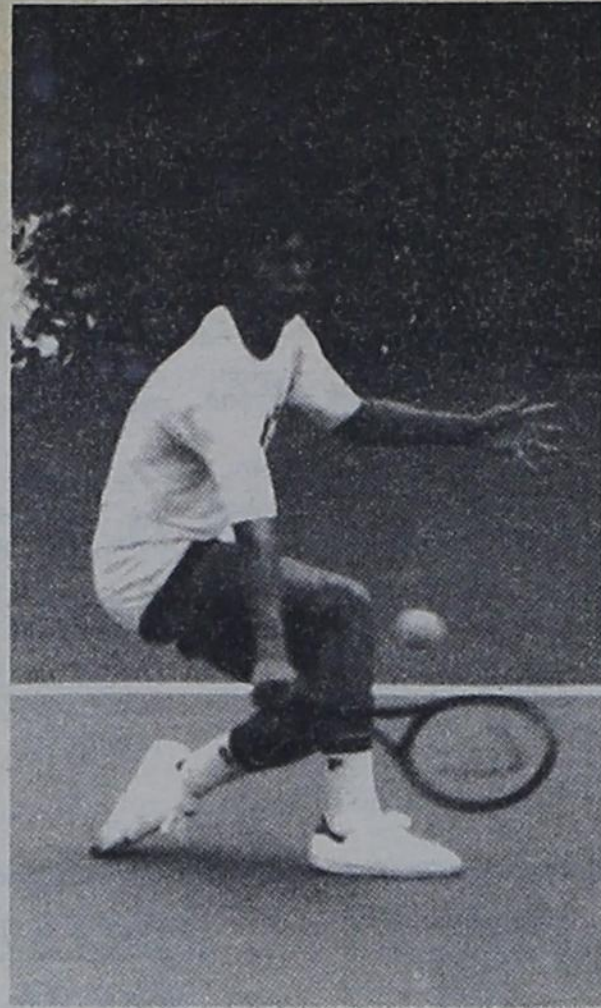
Dyer Wins Third Striaght Championship In Austin

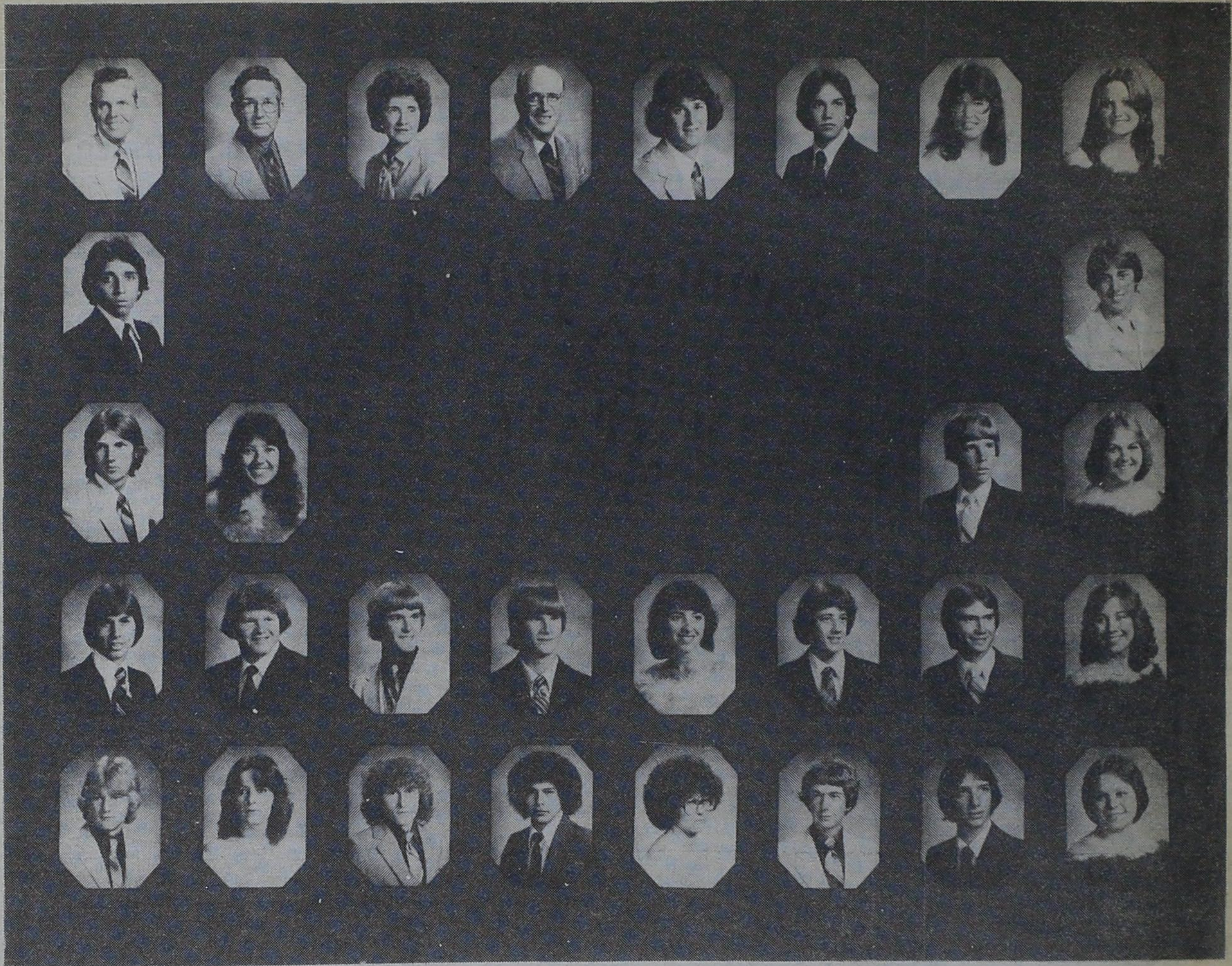
